Don't let the BSOD get you frustrated

Most of us have experienced Microsoft's BSOD message (Blue Screen of Death). Sometimes it's a simple fix, sometimes it takes a repair by a computer geek. We are at the time when secretaries should be planning their members' dues statements. Early, you say? Not really. You should be sending out dues statements by the middle of April or beginning of May to give your members time to submit their payments in time for you to make your dues payments to LCI and the District Cabinet Treasurer for the



district and Indiana Lions dues. Here's the scenario. If your members don't get their checks to you PRIOR to July 1 and you haven't determined whether the member is going to renew or not (heaven forbid!), then on July 1 or shortly after, your club will be billed by LCI for all members, including those who were not dropped. If you drop a member after July 1, your club is still responsible for the

first six month's dues at LCI. A few years ago we were all informed that LCI would no longer give credit back on the August statements for members who were dropped in July. This is why you need additional lead time for your members to respond to your first (and second, and sometimes THIRD) dues notices, so if they did plan not to renew, you will have time to drop them from LCI BEFORE July 1. Yesterday I received an email from Lions Clubs International President Dr. Jung-Yol Choi. I was quite flattered until I read the fine print at the end of the letter that said the same letter had been sent to probably several thousand Lions. The letter was to alert Lions that at the 2021 Lions International Convention, there will be a new dues adjustment model up for vote. Since this will be a virtual convention, many of us may have a chance to vote on this. But whether or not you avail yourself of the opportunity, every Club should be planning for its possible passage.

The model calls for a \$3.00 increase effective July 1, 2022; a second \$2.00 increase on July 1, 2023; and a third increase of \$2.00 on July 1, 2024. My job is not to lobby one way or the other. My job is to ask you to begin planning and alerting your Club that such an increase may be on the way. Some Clubs already charge dues sufficient to absorb these increases without having to raise dues, but other Clubs are only charging the actual amount and will need to raise their dues. Perhaps Club Boards of Directors should consider starting an increase a year early or doing the three increases all at once. Or perhaps you may consider another strategy. But this does give District Governor Brian something to look forward to for his second term as Governor. And I think I see Lion Amanda smiling again.

Syracuse Lions Club Signature Service: Reading Promotion

For many years, the Syracuse Lions Club has recognized the importance of literacy and has focused on promoting early reading proficiency as a core area of service to the community. Since Indiana recognizes third grade as a key transition milestone between learning to read and reading to learn, it measures reading proficiency in all third grade students in the spring semester. Syracuse Lions have long supported preparation for this critical evaluation by donating free books to third graders at Syracuse Elementary in the fall of each school year.

From 2009 through 2019 the club donated student dictionaries, recognizing that the pages of a dictionary help build vocabulary, reinforce spelling proficiency, and also provide valuable historical, geographical, and other reference information. During that 11-year period the club donated approximately 1,100 dictionaries, distributing them in September to maximize the benefit they offer. Since 2014 this effort has been chaired by Past President Barb Grumme and has involved many club members.

In 2020 the "dictionary project" underwent a change in focus and leadership, co-chaired by Lions Marie Butler-Knight and Angela Himes. According to teacher liaison, Margie Slusser, a student shift to online study resources had greatly diminished their use of printed dictionaries. The club was asked to consider

donating a book that would stimulate reading while engaging students in activity. In coordination with Slusser, the club selected a coloring/reading/activity book: My First Book About Our Amazing Earth. Publisher Dover Publications provided the book at a special discount because of its educational use. The club was unable to distribute the books to students in person for the first time ever, due to Covid-19 restrictions, but we look forward to doing this again in years to come.

A companion project which promotes both early and adult reading through book sharing began in 2016 as the Syracuse Lions Club's legacy project. Chaired by Lion Marie Butler-Knight, the club's first Little Free Library was built by Lion John Searfoss, with help from Lions Cliff Wogoman, Joe Hibschman, and Candice Fancil. It was painted by students, then installed at Wawasee Middle School in April 2017 with an initial donation of books.

Under the direction of Lion John Searfoss a second library followed in November 2017, donated with books to Syracuse Elementary School, whose students and art teachers painted and decorated the structure. The third library built by the same Lions team was decorated and painted by North Webster artist Judy Wagner and donated to the Syracuse Food Pantry in December 2018. A fourth library is under construction and scheduled for outdoor installation at the Wawasee Area Conservacy Foundation's education center and trails in the spring of 2021.

The Information and Technology Committee for the Indiana Lions is composed of a representative from each district. Regularly, the committee will provide information regarding all things technical that will help you remain safe, secure, and knowledgeable about the devices and platforms you use.

The following is the second of three parts on - Domain Names - Get One and Keep It!

Part #2 - Setting up Your Domain Registrar Account

Now that your club or district has selected and purchased a domain name, it's important to set up the domain name and account correctly. When setting up an account with a registrar and registering your domain name, you will need to provide three points of contact: Owner, Admin, and Technical.

You should always list your Lions club/district under the Owner section (this is very important as it identifies with the registrar who actually OWNS that domain name). Never change that or give it to someone else who may manage your website - it is the key to your account and you need control of it.

The Admin point of contact is primarily the contact that the registrar will use to contact you in the event of an outdated credit card or other billing or administrative issue.

The Technical contact is exactly what it sounds like: the person who can be contacted with technical questions. You may choose to put your club or district IT Chairperson as the technical contact for your domain name.

You should also set up your account for automatic renewal so that each year when the domain name is set to renew, it will automatically be charged and renewed with no down time for your website. Make it a part of your annual procedures to log into your account and make sure that all three contacts are accurate and up to date. Someone on that list may have left the organization, changed their email or phone number, etc. and it's important to keep those contact names and information current. In addition, be sure to write down the login information for your registrar account and keep that information in a secure place and known to your club/district officers.

Now it's time to make your domain name work for your club/district. We'll cover that issue in Part #3 of the series in a future newsletter.
