In a few months, we'll be combining MyLion, MyLCI and Insights, along with some additional tools and functionality, into a unified mobile-friendly experience called the Lion Portal.

Here are a few things you need to do:

- Check your Lion Account information. Make sure your information is correct and up to date in MyLCI or your regional reporting system. This includes your name, contact information, and communication preferences.
- ◆ Confirm you have a unique email address. A unique email address (not shared with anyone else) is required for the new Lion Portal.
- Stay up-to-date. Check for news and resources at lionsclubs.org/ portal-updates or use the QR code.

A Message From 2nd Vice District Governor Warren Allender



Well, this has been an exciting several months for me. Just to backtrack for you in order that we may both, the reader and writer, arrive at the same place and time for an adventure in Lionism. Several years ago, our then Lion President, Leroy Schrock, conscripted several of us unsuspecting Lions and we went to "Banner Night". The President declared, "You know there's more to Lions than just Baugo Township Lions". He was right and it was fun. We continued to go and meet new Lions, hear their stories, and share their joys. Of course, meeting and greeting is a two-way street. Over time, requests for involvement were made at different levels and for different reasons. One such request was that I

might be a good Zone Chairperson. I was reluctant at first, but later I was convinced to give it a try. Well, I'm not sure I've been the best Zone Chair, yet I hope I have helped clubs in need of assistance.

Now, as we all know, there are inspiring individuals who come into our lives. One such person in my life is Lion Brian Bussard. He has been with Baugo Township Lions Club for a little over three years and he has been involved in all aspects of our projects, from fish fries to OC Days sausage and corn sales. He understands our motto, "We Serve". The fact that he is blind has not deterred him in the least. He has twice given programs to our club, once about his training at the Colorado School for the Blind, and a second about a research project he is in involved with. Again, he epitomizes our motto, "We Serve". His inspiration gave me the thought that perhaps I could do more to "serve" Lionism. So, when our Cabinet Secretary, PDG Marty Juel, approached me about filling this position, I thought the time was right and I should open the doors to a new adventure.

Fast forward to the Cabinet Meeting at the Leesburg Lions Club and then on to the District Convention in Argos. The keynote speaker at the convention was International Director Jeff Gans. During his final presentation, he made reference to the pin that he had given everyone, asking that we examine it closely. On it was a flock of geese flying in a "V" formation. He used the geese as a metaphor as he explained Lionism. He explained how flying in the "V" is more efficient and how the geese change leadership often to avoid burn-out, and that they are a noisy bunch, always giving encouragement. All points that we Lions should try to emulate in service to our clubs and our community. Be efficient, change leadership often, accept new ideas, and be a noisy bunch encouraging those around us. There was one point that he didn't mention, that perhaps should be made. Just a mere thirty years ago, geese almost became extinct. Their return from the brink of disaster can be attributed to the fact that people in positions of leadership recognized a problem, analyzed it, and put into practice good plans for a long-term recovery.

Lionism isn't doomed to extinction, yet we at a local, zone, district, state, national, and international level must keep our eyes on the horizon, the future, and how we can best serve at each and every level. Therefore, if you are asked to serve, please reflect on your ability to contribute, if not now, perhaps in the future. I have started on a new adventure in Lionism that has taken me from my local club, to a zone, and now onto a district level. There are a lot of clubs for me to get to know and there are a lot of members for me to meet. Together WE are on an adventure in Lionism as WE SERVE.

A Message From Cabinet Secretary PDG Marty Juel

Early action can save your club REAL \$\$\$\$

We are at the time when club secretaries should be planning their members' dues statements. Early, you say? Not really. You should be sending out dues statements by the middle of April or beginning of May to give your

members time to submit their payments in time for you to make your dues payments to LCI and the District Cabinet Treasurer for the district and Indiana Lions dues. Here's the scenario: If your members don't get their checks to you PRIOR to July 1 and you haven't determined whether the member is going to renew or not (heaven forbid!), then on July 1 or shortly after, your club **will be billed** by LCI for all members, including those who were not dropped. After July 1, if you drop a member, you are still responsible for the first six month's dues at LCI. A few years ago we were all informed that LCI would no longer give credit back on the August statements for members who were dropped in July. This is why you need additional lead time for your members to respond to your first (and second, and sometimes THIRD) dues notices, so if they did plan not to renew, you will have time to drop them from LCI BEFORE July 1. Prepare now for your club's year-end awards





If you are submitting \$1000 for a Melvin Jones Fellowship or \$500 for a W.P. Woods Fellowship or Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto Fellowship, BE SURE YOU INCLUDE THE PROPER FORM. The W.P. Woods Fellowship Form can be downloaded at https://indianalionsfoundationmd25.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/10/WP-Woods-Application_10-27-2020.pdf. A Melvin Jones Fellowship form can be downloaded at https://cdn2.webdamdb.com/

md_QHkWdKNUqy23.jpg.pdf. For a Miyamoto Fellowship application contact Speech and Hearing Trustee PDG Mary Klempay, Lion Jerry Wright, or Lion Gary Chastain. That \$500 donation can be paid over a two-year period of time.

Mail your applications and checks direct to the addresses on the forms to insure receiving your awards quickly. REMEMBER, it sometimes takes a month or longer, so be sure to apply in plenty of time so your award can be received by your planned presentation date.

LCIF guidelines state that clubs can accumulate donations toward Melvin Jones Awards. You can check with District 25-G LCIF Coordinator PDG Marlyn Fast to see if you have enough credits to use and present a Melvin Jones Fellowship.

The Indiana Lions Foundation has similar guidelines. If your club feels it can accumulate \$500 within a reasonable period of time you need to indicate with each payment your club's intention with a note stating you will supply a recipient at a later date. To learn how much your club has on deposit with the Indiana Lions Foundation, contact a Foundation trustee or Lion Mary Ann Mast, 4699 E. Fall Creek Dr., Bloomington, IN 47401. Lions can earn a \$50 credit toward a W.P. Woods Fellowship for themselves, another Lion, or their club by working a shift for the Indiana Lions Foundation at the State Fair. To work at the fair this summer you can sign up directly on the Indiana Lions Foundation link at www.indianalionsfoundationmd25.org.

These are great opportunities for your club to support our Foundation, the Indiana Lions Speech & Hearing project, and the Lions Clubs International Foundation, and honor outstanding Lions for their service at the same time.

By the time you receive this newsletter, I hope you have reported your club's officers for 2023-2024 on the MyLCI website and submitted that report to 1st Vice District Governor Ron Guth. This is urgently needed so that his district directory can be completed and sent to the printer in June.

As I wrote in last month's newsletter, International dues will increase by \$3.00 for the 2023-24 year. LCI annual dues will be \$46.00 for the 2023-24 year. Also, as your club is planning for the future, be aware that International dues will increase to \$48.00 for the year 2024-25, and then to \$50.00 in the year 2025-26. If You Don't Ask, the Answer Is Always "No"

When was the last time your Lions Club got a new member who asked to join your club, rather than being invited to join your club? It happens, but not very often. The vast majority of our members joined our Lions Club because they were asked. Perhaps they were not asked directly "Do you want to join our Lions Club". Perhaps they were invited to participate in a community service project, accepted that invitation, and as a result of that experience, expressed an interest in becoming more involved. The point is: Someone in our club asked them to become involved, even if only for an hour or two, in our efforts to improve our community and the world at large.

You don't have to be a super seller to recruit new members; you simply need to be willing to tell others about your Lions Club and invite them to join. If you wear your Lions pin everywhere you go, you might not even have to start the conversation. On more than one occasion, a stranger has seen my Lions pin or the Lions logo on my shirt and asked "What do Lions do?" I simply answered their questions, and at least one of those conversations resulted in a new member for a Lions Club in the community where the conversation occurred.

You won't get a positive response every time you ask. In fact, you will probably get more negative responses than positive responses, but don't be discouraged by those negative responses. Take a lesson from your kids or grandkids: They don't stop asking for what they want simply because you said "No" this time.

If you don't ask, the answer is always "No".

Since I tweaked my right knee about three weeks ago, I've spent way too much time in my recliner watching television. Thankfully there have been a few basketball games to watch but generally, for me, television is boring. What I hate the most are constantly repeated commercials for new wonder drugs, trucks, and personal injury attorneys. If even half the claims made in these commercials were true, the world would indeed be a better place. I understand

why there are commercials , but their content and repetitiveness make me want to boycott those products forever. It's just too much.

So why am I ranting about television? It rather reminds me of Lions. Every day I get multiple emails from Lions International, almost none of which concern me. It's just delete, delete, delete, about as fast as I can. As a long time Lion, I suppose I should care more, but multiple emails telling me to find new members or attend the international convention just don't grab my attention. Yet while I am busy deleting these emails, it actually seems harder to find information on the Lions web site. There is a vast amount of information there, but it just seems harder to find, or what is found is about six years old. I understand how difficult it is to maintain such a vast website, so Lions does have my sympathy, but maybe there are a few things that could be adjusted. Plus, I don't want to sound too much like Andy Rooney.

I would like to suggest that our local Clubs think about our own commercials. In a way, our web sites and our newsletters, electronic or print, are commercials for our Clubs. Not all Clubs have web sites, nor do all Clubs have newsletters. We need to think about our intended audiences. We need to be sure our commercials are accurate, up to date, and readable. I cringe at misspelled words (especially names), poor grammar, and information that is truly outdated. Let's focus on new news, new Lions information, and new activities. This is one way to stop being the community's best-kept secret, so let's be sure to make reading our commercials as rewarding and informative as possible. This isn't to say that we can't find room for news about new grandchildren, new hobbies, or short member biographies of WWII vets in the Club. An imaginative editor can provide ways to produce a fine commercial without boring members or outside readers, even creating anticipation for the next issue. So be imaginative, be realistic, and be important to all readers.

I'd like to share an anonymous item on writing from page 5 of the 2022 FARM SHOW Magazine (volume 46, number 6):

How to Write Good

- 1. Avoid alliteration. Always.
- 2. Prepositions are not words to end sentences with.
- 3. Avoid cliches like the plague. They're old hat.
- 4. Comparisons are as bad as cliches.
- 5. Be more or less specific.
- 6. Writers should never generalize.

Seven. Be consistent!

- 8. Don't be redundant. Don't use more words than necessary; it's highly superfluous.
- 9. Who needs rhetorical questions?
- 10. Exaggeration is a billion times worse than understatement.



News From Around the District

Eyeglass Processing Center Gets A Facelift



Recently, the district's eyeglass processing center, located at the Fairview Grange in Goshen, has been remodeled, repainted, and redecorated. Several Lions from area clubs were involved in this project. Several ceiling tiles were removed and replaced in 7 areas of the basement, which also included replacing numerous tiles with large wall panels. Many of the tiles were not salvageable and additional work had to be done to prepare them for painting. This amount is small and is used to make equipment repairs and acquisitions as well as other expenses directly related to our missions. No Lions receive any benefit from this source of income.

Not Your Classic Green Bean Casserole

Ingredients (convention size):

6# bacon—fried & cut in small pieces

10 cans green beans (drained)

10 cans corn (drained)

1/2# margarine (room temp)

7 8oz cream cheese (room temp)

4 cups mayo

4 tsp salt

1 Tbls. Pepper

5 cans French fried onions (save 2 cans for

topping)

Ingredients (family size):

1/2# bacon—fried & cut in small pieces

1 can green beans (drained)

1 can corn (drained)

2 Tbsp. margarine (room temp)

8 oz cream cheese (room temp)

1/2 cup mayo

Salt & pepper to taste

1/2 can French fried onions (save 1/2 for

topping)

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Fry bacon to crispy.

Mix together cream cheese, mayo, butter, salt, & pepper

Mix in green beans, corn, & bacon

Mix in French fried onions—3 cans for convention size, 1/4 can for family size

Bake 1 hour & check. Bake more as needed, checking every 20-30 minutes.

Does Your Club Have An Active Online Presence?

President Sheehan was elected to serve as international president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 104th International Convention, June 22 through June 28, 2022.


President Sheehan is the founder and CEO of Rural Computer Consultants, a software development company.


