A Message From 2nd Vice District Governor Jackie Kurley



As I pen this article, our International Convention in Boston has just wrapped up and everyone is returning highly motivated. We also just celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the Mishawaka Club - two events that really get you thinking about all the remarkable things we accomplish as Lions.

Our International President, Dr Patti Hill, talked about the environment, about service, and introduced Mission 1.5. Mission 1.5 is our goal of growing to 1.5 million members by 2027. She reminded everyone that LCIF had a lofty goal of raising 300 million dollars in a 3-year period and we exceeded that goal by 25 million dollars. She noted that whenever Lions get a challenge, we rise to the occasion.

Ok, so how do we get over this hump of 1.4 million that we have had for like the past 30 years? We ASK! I became a Lion 8 years ago, and what stayed in my mind was the phrase, "Just Ask!". At two different conferences, I witnessed us getting 2 members just because at the end of a presentation, the moderator "just asked" the presenter if they would become a Lion, and they accepted. We need to ask. I have also heard numerous stories about how it took so long for Mabel to become a Lion because no one would invite her to join. We engage with people every day of our lives. Why not start a conversation about the Lions? If you wear your pin everywhere that could spark a conversation. When someone asks, "what's new?, you can show your enthusiasm for the service project you just completed. Invite those people to a service project. Let those acquaintances see what we as Lions do and the satisfaction, we get from serving others.

Another great analogy I read was closing the back door. Folks, we not only need to get new members to increase our service to "Change the World," but we also need to quit losing our members out the back door. Obviously, we are all going to depart this earth at some time. Death is inevitable. But, please, do not let our current Lions quit us. Are we doing everything we can to make sure that our present members feel needed? Are we making sure our members have a task to do that makes them feel they are contributing to their club? I felt like I was punched in the gut when I had a member come up to me and say that she was thinking about quitting the club because she just did not feel she could contribute anything to the club. She was in declining health and felt useless to our club. First, we talked about her gift of gab and what she might be able to do to help the club. Then we talked about what she was comfortable doing without any strenuous activity. We came up with reintroducing the collection of pop tabs as a donation to Ronald McDonald House, and assisting another member with scheduling visits to other clubs. She was thrilled. She had her bucket out at every meeting reminding us to collect those tabs. She also collaborated with our club Matriarch to schedule visits, helping both remain active as members. She remained a Lion until her recent death. Calling members that have not been to a meeting lately, writing thank you cards to a guest speaker, checking members in at the meeting, or just greeting are some things our members can do to feel a part of the Lions. It is our job to make sure our Lions do not quit us.

I am sure we will be receiving a lot more information on Mission 1.5 soon. In the meantime, make sure you "Just Ask", and make sure you keep that back door closed.

Treasurer Items:

• Dues Invoices were emailed/mailed out the first part of July. Thank you to those clubs who have paid their dues. For those who have not paid by July 31, you will receive a statement requesting payment. Your prompt payment is appreciated and allows the District and Multidistrict to operate.

• Administrative vs Activities (Program) Funds:

- Administrative Funds are used for the internal running of the club. Income from dues, tail-twisting and money raised directly from members. Expenses for international dues, district dues, printing, postage and other costs related to club operations.
- Activities (Program) Funds are used to fulfill the exempt purposes and goals of the club. Income from public fundraising projects. Expenses for the direct costs of the fundraising, as well as donations and charitable activities of the club.
- Remember: Under no circumstances may the net income (from money raised through public club projects or activities) be used in any manner whatsoever for administrative expenditures, (such as compensating for club dues).
- ^o If you are a new Treasurer and were unable to attend the Officer Training in June, I would be glad to answer any questions you may have about keeping accurate records for your club.

Is It Too Late To Be A Zone Chair?



This isn't a hard question. The answer for every thinking Lion is no. And just what does a Zone Chairperson do for you?

Just to review: Every District is subdivided into Regions and Zones. In District 25-G, we have four Regions, and each Region has at least two Zones, just enough so that each Zone has no more than five or six Clubs in it. Each Zone has a Chairperson (if all the positions can be filled, which is an annual issue for

each District Governor and the Global Leadership Team Coordinator).

Zone Chairs can no longer be Past District Governors and terms are limited. Thus each District needs a steady supply of Lions interested in leadership positions who have been Presidents in their own Clubs and wanting to do still more.

Being a Zone Chairperson means more than just an annual visit to a Club, chairing a few multi-Club meetings, or even just showing up at District Cabinet meetings. Being a Zone Chair means keeping a commitment to the District and to the Clubs in the Zone to watch out for their well-being, as well as keeping the typically overly-busy District Governor apprised of what's really happening in that small part of the District.

However, this does not mean that the Zone Chair is a snitch to the Governor, nor does it mean that the Zone Chair rules the Clubs. The Zone Chair is not some sort of super President. The Zone Chair is there to provide support to each Club, to visit as often as desired, and to offer advice, not orders. For instance, the Zone Chair cannot order a Club to contribute to LCIF, but only encourage the Club to do so. The Zone Chair cannot tell you how to run your meetings, only offer suggestions as to what might make them operate more smoothly or stay within LCI rules and policies. The Zone Chair cannot order you to have a fish fry but can suggest other fundraisers that might be successful in your area, either as a single Club or as partners with another Club.

While the Zone Chair may focus on the Clubs, the Zone Chair should also pass along information from the District Governor, the Multiple District, or Lions International itself to help the Clubs become more informed as to what is happening outside of the local Club. Thus the Zone Chair becomes a discreet pipeline carrying information to and from each Club.

The Zone Chair is also equipped to help with new member inductions, officer installations, and even memorial services. Zone Chairs can provide you with tips as to who sits at head tables, the proper sequence for introducing guests, and what Lions awards are available. They can also discuss with you keeping your Club legal and that touchy guestion about what your two accounts can be used for.

All in all, the position of Zone Chair is a wonderful position. It will be one that I will miss. I've made some great friends, seen some awesome projects, and been able to present some awards that were much deserved. It has been, for me, undoubtedly the most enjoyable job I've ever had in Lions.

So be sure to check with your District Governor to volunteer your services. Don't wait for him or her to come calling. Enjoy the best year in Lions you'll ever have. How about it?

Eyeglasses Shipped for Mexican Eyeglass Mission

On June 29, more than 13,600 pairs of used eyeglasses were shipped to Mexico for this year's eyeglass mission in Uriangato, GTO Mexico. In addition, more than 4,000 pairs were shipped to Ceredil, a Lions eyeglass recycling center located in Chihuahua, Mexico. The Lion who facilitates getting our glasses over the border from El Paso operates this facility and will use these glasses to support other missions in northern Mexico. There are certain prescriptions we receive in excess of our needs each year so we periodically send them for use by Ceredil.

Our work, however, does not stop when the glasses are shipped. We are already busy collecting and processing glasses for the 2024 mission. Crews are scheduled to sort, clean, and continue reading prescriptions, and ultimately filing and packaging the eyeglasses for shipment next year.

Mishawaka Lions Celebrate A Century of Service

More than 80 Lions and guests attended the Mishawaka Lions Club's 100th Anniversary Celebration on Wednesday, July 12th at the Chicory Event Center in Mishawaka. Past Council Chair David Eisen served as the master of ceremonies and introduced Mishawaka Mayor Dave Wood, who presented a mayoral proclamation which designated the day as Mishawaka Lions Club Day. Past International Director Nick Xinopoulos of the Brownsburg Lions Club and District Governor Ron Guth of the Peru Lions Club were the guest speakers. PID Nick presented International President's Certificates of Appreciation to Lion Richard Currey, Lion Becky Wertz, Lion Colleen Hesch, and Past Council Chair Dave Eisen.

The first organizational meeting of the group that would become the Mishawaka Lions Club was held on June 23, 1923 with 13 men in attendance. The club was authorized by LCI on July 12, 1923 under a special dispensation because it did not yet have the required 25 members. The additional members were soon recruited and the Club's charter was formally presented on November 16, 1923. The Mishawaka Lions Club was the 12th Lions Club chartered in Indiana.

This screener is a new device that utilizes a new technology to more accurately and quickly detect strabismus ("cross eyed") and amblyopia ("lazy eye"). These vision defects affect an estimated 4% of the population and the sooner they are discovered, the higher the likelihood of success in correcting them. The American Academy of Family Physicians considers amblyopia "a major health problem and is the leading cause of monocular vision loss in children and young adults". The group recommends that all children between the ages of 3 and 5 be screened for the condition (Amblyopia Detection/Prevention). As Lions, vision projects have been a cornerstone project for our organization and are an important way for us to have significant impact on the local communities that we serve.

Come join us on Monday evening, August 7th, to see how to use the Blinq screener and how your club can make an impact on the lives of children in your community. It is another way for us, as Lions, to make a difference.
