Get Ready for Your Club Elections

Club Nominations and Elections: March is the month when your club's nominating committee should meet to propose a slate of officers for the 2023-2024 Lions year. Elections should be held by April 15 and your officers reported on the MyLCI website by May 1.

Either the club secretary or president can do this. In the Officers section for your club, be sure to choose Select Term and click on Next Year before reporting each officer for

next year. All information for your president, first vice president, second vice president, secretary, treasurer, and membership chairperson should be reported. LCI now asks each club to report an LCIF coordinator,

service chairperson, and marketing communications chairperson. Your club's directors can also be reported. It is important that each officer's information is updated before you file the report. You will probably

need to add officers' birth years in order to update their information, if the year is not already recorded with their entry. Please make sure names, addresses, phone numbers, spouses' names, and e-mail addresses are correct. It is very important that e-mail addresses for all officers are included and correct.

As you report each officer for next year, be sure to click "save" before reporting the next officer. Before you log out, click on "Club Information" and check to make sure the correct days of the month and meeting times are recorded along with the place and address of your meeting place.

Once you have finished, click on "Reports" and then "Lions Club Officer Report for Next Year." Save the report to your computer and then e-mail it as an attachment to 1st VDG Ron Guth at guthron@comcast.net so he can get a head start on his district directory for next year. The report will not include spouses' names, so when you e-mail the report to him please include in your cover note the name of the spouse of each officer.

Nominations & Elections

Nomination and Letters of Intent Must Be Received PRIOR to District Meeting on February 25th

The procedure for letters of intent and club endorsement letters for the 2023 District 25-G elections was detailed in previous newsletters. The positions include the following officer positions: District Governor, 1st Vice District Governor, and 2nd Vice District Governor. Also to be elected at the District Convention will be 3-year trustees for the following state projects: Indiana Lions Cancer Control Fund, Inc.; Vision First Indiana Lions Eye Bank, Inc.; Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc.; Indiana Lions for the Blind and Visually Impaired, Inc.; Indiana Lions for Leader Dog, Inc.; and a 3-year term for a trustee for the Indiana Lions Foundation. Each candidate must submit his/her own letter of intent to run. Those letters can be hard copies or email documents. Additionally, the Lion's home club must also submit a letter of recommendation. Both letters must be submitted to the Chairman of the Nominations and Elections Committee prior to the District Meeting on February 25th. Those letters can be hard copies or email documents. Who Can Vote at

District Convention?

Delegate Notice: In order to be certified to vote at the District Convention as a delegate or alternate, your club's dues must have been received in their entirety by both Lions Clubs International and District Cabinet Treasurer Kim Polk by February 10, 15 days before the convention.

Clubs in good standing with Lions Clubs International, the state, and district will be entitled to one delegate and one alternate for each 10 members, or major fraction thereof, who have been enrolled for at least one year and one day in the club according to the records of the international office on the first day of February. The major fraction shall be five or more members.

In addition, the District Governor and all Past District Governors who are in good standing in a club in good standing in District 25-G are entitled to one vote in addition to their club delegate quotas.

Puttin' On The Ritz

Title sound familiar? This magnificent song has been used and abused so many times that I couldn't help but join the crowd. I'm using it in the context of your Club providing a class act stage for your guest speakers.

District Governors are tasked with visiting every Club in their District. They've seen it all, from Clubs happy to see them to Clubs who seemingly consider them a nuisance. When the Governor does come, make sure he or she is the only program for that meeting. If you want the Governor to induct new members, install officers, or present awards, do tell them in advance. Advise them how much time they have to speak and when the meeting will end. Have your members primed to rise when the Governor comes to the podium. Provide a respectful introduction. At the previous meeting, remind your members not to do such distractive things as playing with cell phones, shuffling decks of cards, whispering, or napping. A small gift to the Governor is appreciated but not mandatory.

As discussed last month, the possibilities for speakers are endless. However, there are certain things you can do to make sure this is a good experience for all speakers and Lions.

First, make sure the speaker knows what sort of space you will be using: large or small, microphone or no microphone, and your ability to provide equipment for PowerPoint presentations or not. Be sure they know how much time they have for their speech and where on the agenda they are.

Second, greet the speaker and assist with any set up. Show them where they will sit and with whom they will be sitting. If they are not familiar with the glorious art of Tail Twisting, explain it to them. Actually give them the amount of time you told them they had for their presentation. Providing a small memento afterward is not out of line. Do not desert the speaker the second the meeting is over. And above all, learn how to pronounce their name(s) and position(s).

Third, prepare the Club. Hopefully, you have a Club culture of welcoming and including speakers. Hopefully, you have enough communication so that members know who is coming and the topic of their speech. Hopefully, your Club treats the speaker respectfully and does not engage in distractive behavior. Having an audience looking at the speaker instead of doodling on placemats is encouraging to the speaker. Lead the applause after the speech. Have a question ready if there is time for questions. Be sure to thank the speaker. And I hope that you ask if they would consider joining the Club.

Being a Lions Club speaker is not difficult, but it goes much better if the speaker perceives that the audience is listening and cares. I suppose it all goes back to the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you".

Showing common courtesies, attention, and support to speakers, that's Puttin' on the Ritz for any speaker.

Greetings Fellow Lions:

We are well on our way through the Lions year. I have seen many great service projects clubs are doing throughout the District. Club members should encourage your leaders to get the information out to the public by all forms of media, to show how Lions Clubs impact their communities as well as reaching out to other areas. I want to remind everyone that it is also important to report your club activities to Lions Clubs

International (LCI). All members need to let their club Secretary or Service Chairperson know what activity you worked, with the amount of time volunteering and number of people involved in the activity including non-members.

There are many reasons reporting Service Activities to LCI is important. We as Lions may think that what we do in our local communities has little bearing to LCI and therefore don't bother with filing reports. This couldn't be farther from the truth. By letting LCI know what you are accomplishing through service, they can use the information on a large scale to pave the way to partnerships with other organizations. It also enhances LCI's support in identifying projects which could be implemented in other regions of the world. Your reported activity may be one that other clubs have not considered and becomes an initiative for them to pursue. Always be proud of your club's accomplishments and tell your story to everyone. All Lions should tell our act of kindness loudly and be proud of all the good we do in our communities.

Clubs in the district can apply for the Club Excellence Award at the end of the 2022-2023 Lions year. The requirements for this award are:

- Membership: A club must at least maintain its membership count as it was at the start of the Lions year or charter a new Lions, Leo, or Branch Club;
- Service: Contribute to LCIF, start a new service project, and list three three projects participated in that were reported on MyLion;
- Leadership & Organizational Excellence: Club in good standing, not in Status Quo or Financial Suspension, District dues paid, no unpaid balance to LCI, reported club officers to LCI, and key officers participate in club officer training; and
- Marketing: Have your club's service activities published through local or social media.

The one key element to clubs not receiving this award is the lack of activities being reported on MyLion. All members encourage your club officers to file the activities report so your club can be recognized by receiving this award.



Lakeville Lions Learn About American Red Cross "Sound the Alarm" Program



At their January dinner meeting, the members of the Lakeville Lions Club heard from two local representatives of the American Red Cross. The speakers provided an overview of American Red Cross services including blood donations, first aid training, services for military and veteran families, and disaster response services, particularly for residential fires. Lions Club members learned that a residential fire occurs somewhere in the USA every 8 minutes, and that if a fire starts in your home, you may have just 2 minutes to escape. The American Red Cross "Sound the Alarm" program is an effort to improve fire safety by installing **FREE** smoke alarms in homes and apartments. Indiana Lions Foundation Trustee Lion Mary Ann Mast wrote the following to Lion "Boots":



Diabetes Screening Kits Available



Are you looking for a new service project that supports the Indiana Lions cause of Diabetes Awareness? Well, guess what? All districts in the state of Indiana have diabetes screening kits for clubs to use. The District Governor or your Diabetes Chair has the kits, provided by our State Diabetes funds. It has two systems you can use. Instructions for using both systems are included in the kit. If there is sufficient interest, I will come to your club to conduct training. The key is to get trained and set up an event (health fairs, conventions (doesn't have to be Lions), ball games, etc.). You must publicize it any way possible. Check your supplies to make sure they are not outdated (MD-25 Diabetes funds will reimburse the resupply). If you don't screen a lot of people, don't feel bad not everyone wants a finger stick. No matter the number, you may have

identified someone with Blood-Glucose problems. The benefits of this new service project are Lions Clubs visibility, helping our communities, identifying health problems, and increased membership. The project does not require many people - two to three Lions can easily conduct the screening.
