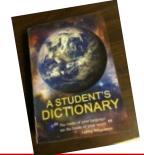
# **Bourbon Lions Club**

#### Chartered 6/25/1931

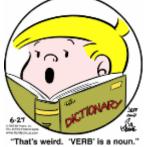

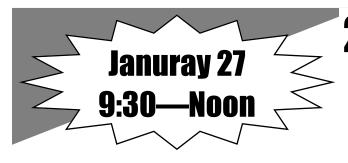

# From the Desk of Cabinet Secretary PDG Ann Haffner

#### Please share this with your Club Treasurer and Board of Directors

## Administrative and Project Funds

How are your club's finances set up? Do you have two funds—an administrative fund and a project or activities fund—as required by Lions Clubs International?

**ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDS** are used for the day to day operations of the club — printing and mailing newsletters, stationery and postage for the president, secretary and treasurer, meals for guests, speaker gifts, sending members to conventions and district meetings, paying dues, etc.

Monies in this fund can be generated through dues collection, donations from club members, tail twisting, and fundraising events such as a 50/50 raffle or silent or live auction held at club meetings. Raising funds for the administrative funds can be fun and entertaining. Be creative!

The **PROJECT OR ACTIVITIES FUND** is for money received from the general public through fundraising events and donations. This money can only be spent on service projects. It cannot be used for the general operation of a Lions club or for paying district, state, or international dues. Some Lions have the misconception that 10% of the net proceeds from a public fundraiser can be used for administrative expenses. **THAT IS NOT TRUE!** 

It is permissible, but not necessary, for a club to have two separate bank accounts. All funds may be deposited in and drawn from one account as long as the club treasurer keeps accurate and separate records for each fund.

**Each club should have a current copy of the** <u>Standard Form, Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws</u>. From the LCI website <u>www.lionsclubs.org</u> click on "Member Center," then "Resources," then "Publications and Forms," then "Legal Forms and Publications," and finally "Constitution—Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws (Revised 7/17) (la2.pdf)." Each club was chartered by and is under the jurisdiction of The International Association of Lions Clubs and must abide by that Constitution and By-Laws, which states:

Article VIII – Board of Directors, Section 3, (g) "It shall not authorize, nor permit, the expenditure, for any administrative purpose, of the net income of projects or activities of this club by which funds are raised from the public."

Section 3, (h) "It shall maintain at least two (2) separate funds governed by generally accepted accounting practices. The first fund to record administrative monies such as dues, tail twisting fines and other internally raised club funds. A second fund shall be established to record activity or public funds raised by asking support from the public. Disbursement from such funds shall be in strict compliance with Section (g) of this article."

## Lions and LCIF work together to fight measles

# **Prediabetes and diabetes**

# What is the difference between prediabetes and diabetes?

The difference between prediabetes and diabetes is in how high the blood sugar levels are. Prediabetes is when your blood sugar (or glucose) levels are higher than normal but not high enough to be diagnosed as type 2 diabetes. Look at the table on page 2 to see the levels. Did you know that about 79 million American adults age 20 and older have prediabetes?

#### What's going on in your body?

A condition called insulin resistance increases the risk of getting both prediabetes and type 2 diabetes. Insulin is a hormone that is made by the pancreas, a large gland behind the stomach. Insulin helps sugar from food move from your blood into your body's cells. Your cells need sugar for energy. Sugar from food can be sugar itself, or it can be from carbohydrates that the body turns into sugar.

When you have insulin resistance, your body produces insulin but does not use it effectively. So sugar builds up in the blood, which can lead to prediabetes or type 2 diabetes. Most people with insulin resistance aren't aware that they have it for many years, until it turns into type 2 diabetes. But the good news is that if people find out early that they have insulin resistance, they may be able to delay progression to type 2 diabetes. See the box on page 2 to find out how.

#### Who is at risk?

Some of the risks for prediabetes and diabetes include:

- Being overweight
- Being age 45 years or older
- Having a family history of diabetes
- Having high blood pressure
- Having low HDL cholesterol and high triglycerides (blood fats)
- Having a history of gestational diabetes or of giving birth to a baby weighing more than 9 pounds
- Belonging to an ethnic group at high risk for diabetes, such as Native American, African American, Hispanic, or Asian

It is important to discuss your risk factors with your doctor. If you think you may be at risk for prediabetes, see your doctor to be tested.

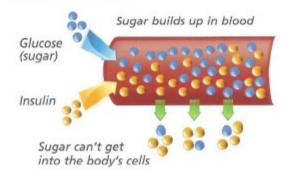

## Prediabetes and diabetes

#### How is prediabetes diagnosed?

You may have prediabetes without having any symptoms. Prediabetes is found with one of the following tests:

Fasting glucose test (FGT)— Measures blood sugar when you haven't eaten anything for at least 8 hours



- Glucose tolerance test (GTT)—Measures blood sugar after you haven't eaten anything for at least 8 hours and 2 hours after you drink a sugary drink provided by a doctor or laboratory
- A1C—Measures your average estimated blood sugar over the past 3 months

Your doctor will look for these values to diagnose prediabetes and diabetes:

	Prediabetes	Diabetes		
FGT	100-125 mg/dL	126 mg/dL or higher		
GTT	140-199 mg/dL	200 mg/dL or higher		
A1C	5.7%-6.4%	6.5% or higher		

#### How can you lower your risk for prediabetes?

There are no medicines approved by the FDA to treat prediabetes. If you have prediabetes, your blood sugar should be checked for type 2 diabetes every 1 to 2 years. According to the American Diabetes Association (ADA), if your blood sugar levels are at your target range, you should have them checked every 3 years, or more often if your doctor recommends it.

Prediabetes does not automatically turn into type 2 diabetes. You can take steps to lower your risk.

The American Diabetes Association says that you can lower your risk for type 2 diabetes by:

- Losing just 7% of your body weight (or 15 pounds if you weigh 200 pounds)
- Doing moderate physical activity (such as brisk walking) for 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week

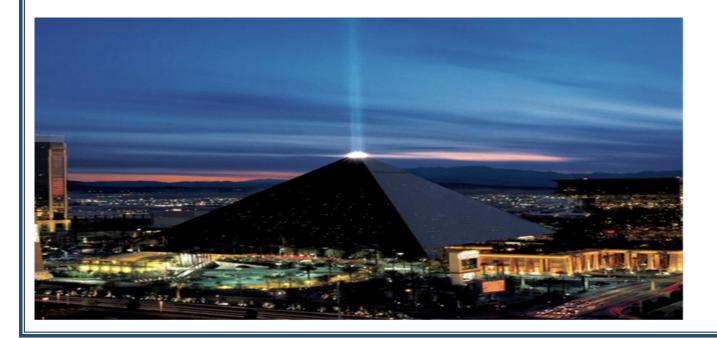
