Check your club's members' classification

It may sound early, but it is a great time to check your club's roster with the listing of your club's members at LCI. Why? You might be paying TOO MUCH! For example, if you have family members in your club, if they are not listed as a family member at LCI, then you are paying the full amount of LCI dues. Changing this will reduce your dues liability at the next billing period in July. Another thing to consider is getting your dues billing for the 2021-2022 Lions' year ready now. Most clubs usually wait too long to send out dues notices. Consider sending them out in May, giving your members over a month to make payment. Remember, after July 1, you can no longer drop a member without paying the first half dues to LCI. If your club prints a directory of club members, giving yourself some extra time to review and update addresses and other information will help you have the directory ready to print and distribute by the time the new Lions' year begins on July 1.

District Officer/Trustee Positions Open for Nominations

Letters of intent and club endorsement letters for the 2021 District 25-G elections are now being accepted for the following officer positions: District Governor, 1st Vice District Governor, and 2nd Vice District Governor. Also to be elected at the District Convention will be trustees for the following state projects: Indiana Lions Cancer Control Fund, Inc. (there are two open positions : 3-year term and 2-year term); Vision First Indiana Lions Eye Bank, Inc. (3-year term); Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing, Inc. (3-year term); Indiana Lions for the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, Inc. (there are two open positions : 3-year term and 2-year term); Indiana Lions for Leader Dog, Inc. (3-year term); and there is a 3-year term for a trustee for the Indiana Lions Foundation. Each candidate must submit his/her own letter of intent to run. Additionally, the Lion's home club must also submit a letter of recommendation. Both letters must be submitted to the Chairman of the Nominations and Elections Committee prior to the District Meeting on February 13th. How To Lose A Perfectly Good Lion Member



"Not another one!" a Board member complains when yet another resignation letter is received and presented for action. "This is the fourth one already this year!"

Sound familiar? Unfortunately, it is all too familiar in many clubs, that sinking feeling that another good Lion has decided not to stay in the club. Sure, there are perfectly good reasons why Lions leave: moving away, illnesses, job changes, even death, for instance. But sometimes we don't do much to help entice members to remain. We even

encourage them to leave. The 2011 Lions Clubs International Study done by the IU Center on Philanthropy found that the main reason people join a Lions Club is to make a difference in their local community (93% of men, 89% of women). Unfortunately, we don't always help maintain their motivation, and members leave. How are we encouraging Lions to leave?

- 1. Conduct unproductive meetings. How often do we sit around and hash out obvious answers without coming to a conclusion, or appoint another committee? Lions leave the meeting feeling that nothing was accomplished, or that the two most powerful people in the club were competing again.
- 2. Underutilize the skills and interests of club members. A new Lion may join due to promises that the Club would follow up with his ideas, and nothing ever happens. Or worse, simply resisting the contributions or ideas of new members. Watch the YouTube video of a Lions Club pancake breakfast: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=W6jJiaeuE-Q</u>. Recognize your own club there?
- 3. Create an atmosphere of club politics. Pressing the Lion to join one of the factions in the club if they want to get anywhere with their ideas. If you aren't for me, you are against me. Sit on my side of the room. Don't talk to those people.
- 4. Don't provide any more information than necessary. Board members may need to know, but "ordinary" members don't need to know the details of what's happening in the club or district. They aren't part of the privileged few. Don't spend the money earned by sales efforts.
- 5. Create lots of rules for club members to follow. This allows tradition to rule, even though younger Lions may not be interested in tradition yet. And it gives lots of opportunities for Tail Twisters to fine unsuspecting members.
- 6. Keep with "the way we always do it." New members can't be trusted to make good pancake batter or sell tickets, but they can wash tables and dishes. Don't allow new members to take over jobs from older or infirm members. Make them observers while they gain seniority.
- 7. Allow Tail Twisters to get too personal or vicious. Tail Twisting should be fun, not punitive, offensive, or allowed to fine for personal infirmities. Keep it light, informative, and good for laughs.
- 8. Provide criticism instead of constructive feedback. It's always easier to be critical than grateful or constructive. But if you continually undercut or criticize the efforts of Lions members, why would they want to stay?

I can think of even more reasons and examples, and I know you can as well. Instead of business as usual, let's concentrate on keeping Lions rather than allowing them to exit from the back door almost as fast as they enter the front door. Let me know what's working for you.

Eyeglass Recycling: Work Continues To Prepare for 2021 Mission



The 2020 eyeglass mission trip to Mexico was canceled due to the COVID-19 situation. More than 14,000 pairs of recycled eyeglasses were sent to the Lions in Huanimaro and Abasolo, Mexico and will be used by them at a later date. It is expected they will have a session sometime around May, if conditions are suitable. There will not be any Lions from Indiana participating at that time.

Work for the 2021 eyeglass mission is continuing, with the collection, sorting, washing, filing, and packaging of eyeglasses at the district's eyeglass processing center in Dunlap. Shortly, we will hold more ultrasound cleaning sessions, and volunteers will be

needed. Each two-hour session requires five Lions. The district's eyeglass mission team leaders are starting to assemble a team to go to Mexico in late September through early October. Any Lion in the district who is interested in being on this team is encouraged to send their name and a short letter explaining their interest in the project to *PDG Marty Juel, 3204 Village Court, Goshen, IN 46528*. Potential participants need to be in good health and able to stand for prolonged periods during the daylong work sessions. The date being considered is September 25 through October 3, 2021. The mission will be held in Salamanca, Mexico in the state of Guanajuato.

This year's Mid-Winter Conference will be a trailblazer on many fronts in Indiana Lions leadership history. Most significant will be the online format, being the first such leadership opportunity offered to Lions throughout the state.

Of course, there will be several items missing from the conference due the uncertainties of what restrictions the coronavirus might have by the January 23, 2021 date. Gone are the numerous displays by state projects, the silent auction, other Lion-sponsored programs and projects, as well as the opportunities for personal, one-on-one interactions among Lions and visitors to the MWC.

This year the conference will have four seminars, allowing all attendees to attend. Earlier this year, past MWC attendees were surveyed to help the organizing committee plan and schedule seminar topics that were identified as the most interesting and useful. The list was narrowed to four in an attempt to respond to the requests of nearly 100 previous MWC attendees.

The 2021 MWC will begin at 9:30 a.m. with an introduction by a special LCI guest. Seminars will be at 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m. and 2 p.m., with a one-hour break for lunch. The conference will conclude at 3:15 p.m., allowing all attendees to return home by, well of course, 3:15 p.m. There will be NO SNOW cancellations.

The four topics follow.

- **Conducting and attending online meetings and seminars** Lion Jennifer Drapalik, a seasoned organizer and moderator of several online meetings, including Zoom, the one that will be used to host this year's MWC, will de-myth the mysteries of setting up, hosting and handling other details in holding a successful online meeting.
- **Everything you want to know about recruiting new Lions** PDG Charles Short will moderate this panel discussion, featuring winning programs and tactics from successful club marketers, area specialists, and recruiters from around Indiana and the Great Lakes Region. Special guest Dave Wineman, LCI's North American Membership Initiative Regional Chair will be on the panel.
- **The 'magic' of membership retention** PCC Ross Drapalik will talk about the two most significant reasons Lions leave our organization: They are either 'pulled' away or we 'push' them away from our organization. His powerful presentation has received recognition from those groups where his seminar was given.
- **Putting 'FUN' in FUNdraising** Even with restrictions imposed on clubs by the Covid-19 pandemic, PDG Mary Jane Bodnar will moderate this discussion that will feature several innovative fundraising projects that have proven to be profitable as well as FUN. MWC participants are encouraged to share their experiences.

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Mentioned earlier was the 'no registration fee' feature of this year's MWC. Holding our conferences previously was extremely costly. Several years ago, we were forced to move our conferences from the school buildings in Plainfield, which severely restricted our ability to expand the conference and required travel from hotel facilities to the conference location. Few hotels matched our needs in terms of meeting rooms, banquet areas and affordable overnight accommodations. In addition, hotels required our use of their food service. The MWC had to highly subsidize previous conferences to bring the cost to their previous registration fees. This year's MWC virtual conference eliminates all these associated costs and will allow the first NO FEE conference of its type in Indiana Lions history.

Even with no fees required, ALL MWC ATTENDEES <u>must pre-register for the conference</u>, so the committee can ensure there is enough capacity in the Zoom meeting to accommodate those who want to attend. An online registration form is available at <u>https://bit.ly/in-lions-mwc-2021-reg</u>. Facebook posts on the MWC page, <u>https://www.facebook.com/IndianaLionsMidWinterConference</u>, will also have links to the registration form. All Lions who register will receive additional information about how to login to the MWC, including the password required. For those who need additional information about how to participate in a Zoom meeting format, a FAQ sheet will be available. The MWC Zoom meeting is available to Lions via either a computer, a tablet or smartphone with an internet connection, or through a regular telephone.

Black tie or pajamas, the choice is yours! But the decision to attend the virtual MWC requires registration. Make your decision and complete your online registration NOW.

PROJECT IDEAS DIABETES

LEARN

- Work with a healthcare professional to organize an educational talk about diabetes, pre-diabetes, prevention and management at your club or district meeting.
- Facilitate a discussion about diabetes to encourage club members to share their personal connections to the disease.
- Visit/explore the website of your national diabetes association and other organizations to learn more about diabetes.
- Share a low glycemic index snack at your club meeting and ask a nutritionist or diabetes educator to teach club members and their families about interpreting food labels.
- Sign-up for MyLION and learn how Lions and Leos are getting involved in diabetes service.
- Download an app that educates and encourages healthy lifestyle choices. Invite club members to participate in a healthy lifestyles related challenge.

ACT // BEGINNER

- Donate a diabetes magazine subscription or diabetes-related books to your local library.
- Invite a role model with diabetes to a local school to talk about healthy lifestyle choices.
- Sponsor a child to attend a diabetes camp and/or supply a camp with needed supplies.
- Post monthly notices on your club or district website and social media accounts, sharing available community resources for people with or at risk of diabetes.
- Write about healthy lifestyle choices in your community or school newspaper.
- Organize a Strides: Lions for Diabetes Awareness event in your community.
- Develop a list of patient resources and services and distribute them to Lions and the public.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Partner with healthcare professionals to organize a screening for diabetes, diabetic retinopathy and diabetic foot.
- Promote diabetes prevention through social media campaigns or radio announcements.
- Volunteer for a day at a diabetes camp. Visit www.diabetescamps.org to find a camp near you.
- Sponsor a healthy cooking demonstration for people with diabetes and pre-diabetes.
- Organize a weekly walking club at your place of work and share a healthy snack afterwards.
- Bring fresh fruits or vegetables to an elementary school classroom to encourage children to try a variety of healthy foods.
- Collaborate with a healthcare professional to organize a physical activity and promote exercise.
- Donate needed exercise equipment to a community center or school.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Organize a community support group for people diagnosed with diabetes and their families.
- Work with a healthcare professional to organize a mentorship program, pairing a younger person with diabetes with an older mentor.
- Organize a school or community vegetable garden to encourage healthy eating.
- Establish a fitness room or ongoing fitness class at a community center or school.
- Sponsor a training program for community healthcare workers to learn about screening, community support programs and prevention of diabetes complications.
