A Message from District Governor Marlyn Fast

It has come to my last article as District Governor. I want to personally thank each of the 48 clubs of District 25-G for the hospitality given to Amanda and me during our visits to every club in the District. It has been a fantastic learning experience that I will never forget. Thank you. Your Club, Your Way! That is very true, as each club has a unique way to operate, and each is making a difference in their community, creating a positive and inviting atmosphere. Keep up the great work! "We Serve."



We have one more month to go in our LCIF 3year \$300,000,000 fund drive. As of May 20,

\$297,744,228 has been pledged and donated. We will reach the \$300 million goal by June 30, 2022. Two more clubs have been added to the District 25-G Model Club list. They are the Clay-Granger Lions Club and Dunlap Lions Club. 29 of our 48 clubs have donated to LCIF this year for a total of \$37,682.10. That is great! Clubs that have LCIF in their budget should make those donations before June 30. Can we reach 100% of our clubs donating?

Membership has been an important part of Lions this year. My personal goal was to have a net gain this year. With the help of LCI exempting the Entrance Fee of \$35.00 until June 30, it has helped clubs add members. In fact, there have been 93 new members added throughout the year, but at the same time, we have, for various reasons, let 84 members slip away. A number of clubs have told me they have people wanting to join their clubs. Let's encourage them to join by June 30 and also make sure our present members stay with us. I know we can have a net gain which we have not had since 2017 in District 25-G. New members joining in June would pay only \$3.58 in dues to LCI. New members joining in July would pay a one-time Entrance Fee of \$35, plus the Club dues.

Since our last newsletter, the Lions of District 25-G have been at the State Convention in Indianapolis with 21 attending, and the 4th District Meeting at the Culver Lions Club with 36 in attendance. These were great times for renewing old friendships and making new friendships, as well as being inspired about Lionism.

Thank you to all who helped make 2021-2022 a great Lions Year in District 25-G!

A Message from Cabinet Secretary PDG Marty Juel



If this sounds counter-intuitive, let's take a closer look. As a club secretary, log into MyLCI and do a report of your members as listed with LCI. Better yet, print it and distribute a copy to each of your board members along with this challenge: BEFORE the end of June, divide the list evenly and have board members PERSONALLY contact every member. The reason for the calls is simple. Tell your members you are checking on the information you have on file, including their address and phone number(s); email address; birthdate; and all the other information you have, or is lacking from the printout. For those members you haven't seen for a while, take this opportunity to find out the reason for their absence. You may discover a health problem or other situation that causes their inactivity.

When you check the LCI listing, make sure any family members you have are listed correctly with LCI. For example, if you have family members and do not have them classified thus with LCI, you are costing your club money!

It's common for most clubs to have two rosters with their Lions' information. The one you use in your club for mailing and emailing announcements and other news, and the one used by LCI to mail the LION Magazine. The Indiana Lions also use this database to distribute The Hoosier Lion. If you don't keep LCI updated with your members' information, they will not receive news about what Lions are doing in the state and throughout the world.

I mentioned at the beginning of this article to do this before June 30. Remember, if you have to drop a member, be sure to do it BEFORE June 30. Your club will be billed for all the members you have on record with LCI on July 1. Dropping a member on or after July 1 will NOT relieve you from paying that person's dues for the six-month period of July 1- December 31. And if your member pays his/her dues after July 1, you can simply reinstate that member.

Random Thoughts From A Random Mind: If You Don't Ask, the Answer Is Always "No"

When was the last time your Lions Club got a new member who asked to join your club, rather than being invited to join your club? It happens, but not very often. The vast majority of our members joined our Lions Club because they were asked. Perhaps they were not asked directly "Do you want to join our Lions Club". Perhaps they were invited to participate in a community service project, accepted that invitation, and as a result of that experience, expressed an interest in becoming more involved. The point is: Someone in our club **ASKED** them to become involved, even if only for an hour or two, in our efforts to improve our community and the world at large.

You don't have to be a super seller to recruit new members; you simply need to be willing to tell others about your Lions Club and invite them to join. If you wear your Lions pin everywhere you go, you might not even have to start the conversation. On more than one occasion, a stranger has seen my Lions pin or the Lions logo on my shirt and asked "What do Lions do?" I simply answered their questions, and at least one of those conversations resulted in a new member for a Lions Club in the community where the conversation occurred.

You won't get a positive response every time you ask. In fact, you will probably get more negative responses than positive responses, but don't be discouraged by those negative responses. Take a lesson from your kids or grandkids: They don't stop asking for what they want simply because you said "No" this time.

If you don't ask, the answer is always "No".

Awards: It's That Time Again!



This isn't the first time I've written about Lions awards, but I'm too lazy to look up what I wrote the first time. I hope this is different. However, this is one topic about which not enough has been written.

Having just gone through another District Convention and Multiple District Convention season, we have all seen awards being presented to multiple individuals being recognized for their achievements. After the past few tough

years, it's a real pleasure to see Lions being deservedly rewarded for the service they have provided.

Sadly, not enough people are being recognized. Far too many Lions do things quietly in their own Clubs and communities without any (or much) recognition at all. Not everyone qualifies for a Lions Clubs International award, a Multiple District award, or a District award, but everyone qualifies for a Clublevel award. Every Club can honor its own. Please check with your District Governor about which awards might be appropriate, or even check the Lions Clubs International web site to discover the vast array of honors available. Then apply.

But there is certainly nothing wrong with Club-level awards. I think these are special awards since they come from our immediate peers. Maybe you already have a tradition of Club awards, like your own Lion of the Year award, or your own system of perfect attendance awards. But feel free to create your own awards, anything from "World's Best Fish Breader" to "Club's Most Vocal Supporter of Diabetes Awareness" to "Club's Best Salesman of 2021-2022." You are limited only by your imagination and the names of those who deserve awards.

Although we all deny it, we are all secretly pleased to be thanked for our efforts. It may just be that publicly thanking a member could tip the scales between them staying or leaving. Everyone is struggling for members these days, and offering appreciation for services performed is a wonderful, and necessary, part of keeping an active Club.

The actual award need not be an Indy 500-type trophy. It could be a certificate or a gift card, but it should be given openly, respectfully, and gratefully. Don't just casually toss it in the recipient's lap. Hand it to them with a handshake and a smile. Show your appreciation. Mean your appreciation. Then continue to show your appreciation long after the award has been given. Remember, it's not about the giver, it's about the recipient.

District 25-G Donates \$4,500 to Cultivate Food Rescue

On Thursday, May 12th, District Governor Marlyn Fast delivered a check for \$4,500 to Cultivate Food Rescue to support their school backpack program. These funds will enable Cultivate to provide six backpack meals every weekend to ten elementary students for the entire school year. Cultivate rescues excess food and relies on its volunteers and staff to reprocess that food into nutritious, frozen meals.



As of December 2021, Cultivate has rescued a total of 2.1 million pounds of food and is producing over 6,000 meals a week.

The presentation of this donation was the culmination of a process which started in March when Todd Zeltwanger, Cultivate's Director of Fund Development, spoke to the attendees at the District Meeting in Leesburg. After his presentation, DG Marlyn suggested that the district should apply for a District and Club Community Impact Grant from LCIF to support the backpack program.

Google Workspace Now Operational for Indiana Lions!

Our Google Workspace system for all Indiana Lions clubs and leadership is now operational! This commercial-grade family of products will provide all clubs and officers with a standard set of online tools for communication, club management, record-keeping, cloud storage, teleconferencing, and much more, and at no charge to our association, clubs or officers.

Club, district and state officers will be receiving an activation email from inlions.org for their presidents, secretaries, treasurers, membership chairs, and marketing/communications chairs. They will have a standard email naming convention by office, like pres.acme@inlions.org, sec.acme@inlions.org, treas.acme@inlions.org etc, along with instructions on how to activate their account(s). By naming these accounts by office and function, future directories and access to our leadership will be made much simpler.

Officers above club level all have designated accounts by office too, like zone chairs at zone1A.25A@inlions.org, District Governors at dg.25B@inlions.org, and State Office at state.sec@inlions.org, and controller.md25@inlions.org. GAT team members and major state committee chairs are usually identified as gmt.25g@inlions.org, vision.25F@inlions.org, mcc.md25@inlions.org,etc

PIDs and PDGs also have free courtesy accounts on the full system, using their first initial and last name in almost all cases.

If you hold an office, please start using these accounts as soon as you can. The activation email that everyone eligible will receive has a temporary password to access the account. Change it to a personal one right away. After that, try out the chat feature, Google Meet for video conferencing, or just send a few emails on your new inlions.org gmail account.


This is the largest installation of any combined software system for Lions in the US this year. It will provide us a durable administrative support platform for many years to come and save thousands of our dues dollars to boot.

Dues Adjustment Resolution Will Be Voted on at 2022 International Convention

Dear Lion Leader,

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was postponed due to the cancellation of our 2020 convention and the move to a virtual convention in 2021 as we adapted to the pandemic. *The new dues adjustment model will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention.*

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

•\$3 increase on July 1, 2023

- •\$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- •\$2 increase on July 1, 2025

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 50,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, hybrid convention, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.

Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see.

We need you to help our members and leaders understand why this adjustment is needed. We have developed an <u>international dues adjustment FAQ and PPT</u> to help you present it to your Lions. If you have any questions on the dues adjustment resolution, please contact LCI Executive Administrator Sanjeev Ahuja.

I hope that you will see this adjustment as we do: as an investment in the future of Lions. Through your support, we can ensure that Lions are positioned for success in the future.
