Get ready for your club elections



Club Nominations and Elections: March is the month when your club's nominating committee should meet to propose a slate of officers for the 2023-2024 Lions year. Elections should be held by April 15 and your officers reported on the MyLCI website by May 1.

Either the club secretary or president can do this. In the <u>Officers</u> section for your club, be sure to choose <u>Select Term</u> and click on <u>Next Year</u> before

reporting each officer for next year.

All information for your president, first vice president, second vice president, secretary, treasurer, and membership chairperson should be reported. LCI now asks each club to report an LCIF coordinator, service chairperson and marketing communications chairperson. Your club's directors can also be reported.

It is *important that each officer's information is updated before you file the report.* You will probably need to add officers' birth years in order to update their information if the year is not already recorded with their entry. Please make sure names, addresses, phone numbers, spouses' names and e-mail addresses are correct. It is *very important that e-mail addresses for all officers are included and correct.*

As you report each officer for next year, be sure to click "save" before reporting the next officer. Before you log out, click on "Club Information" and check to make sure the correct days of the month and meeting times are recorded along with the place and address of your meeting place.

Once you have finished, click on "Reports" and then "Lions Club Officer Report for Next Year." Save the report to your computer and then e-mail it as an attachment to 1st VDG Ron Guth at **guthron@comcast.net** so he can get a head start on his district directory for next year. The report

will not include spouses' names, so when you e-mail the report to him, please include in your cover note the name of the spouse of each officer.

Election Rules



Who Can Vote at District Convention?

Delegate Notice: In order to be certified to vote at the District Convention as a delegate or alternate, your club's dues must have been received in their entirety by both Lions Clubs International and District Cabinet Treasurer Kim Polk by February 17, 15 days before the convention.

Clubs in good standing with Lions Clubs International, the state, and district will be entitled to one delegate and one alternate for each 10 members, or major fraction thereof, who have been enrolled for at least one year and one day in the club according to the records of the international office on the first day of February. The major fraction shall be five or more members.

In addition, the District Governor and all Past District Governors who are in good standing in a club in good standing in District 25-G are entitled to one vote in addition to their club delegate quotas.

Another month has gone by and clubs have been very busy working on their service activities, fund raising events, and attending functions to learn more about Lionism. IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR ALREADY?



PDG Paul Russell can check, but I am sure I write this same kind of article every Spring. Yes, it's about elections for the coming Club year. This is a reminder that Club elections aren't optional, even if the same people are going to stay in the same offices another year. The Standard Form Lions Club Constitution & Bylaws says that a Club shall hold an election each April. It then goes on to note that there is also a reporting deadline. There are several

reasons for this April deadline. First, it gives the incoming District Governor time to gather all the names, meeting places, and meeting times he (or she) needs to be an effective District Governor and to create the new District Directory in a timely manner. And the second reason is that it gives Lions International that same time to update their records to be as accurate as possible. Do you want to be the one that holds up the District and International?

At our District Convention on March 4th, we elect District officers for the coming year. Even though there might not be any tight races, let's be sure all Clubs are represented. This is an important piece of business, and not just because we are doing it in front of a visiting International Director. But being elected is another big step for the First Vice District Governor to become the District Governor Elect. Then comes his headache of finding Zone Chairs, committee chairs, committee members. How about lending him a hand by volunteering for a job before he has to ask you? I'm sure you would be much appreciated. The work is never insurmountable, and it gives you a great opportunity to see how Districts operate, the problems and issues we face, and the missed opportunities because no one wants to take on a job. And it might just challenge you to take a greater responsibility in District administration. Our District has been blessed with many, many capable members, but not everyone steps forward to help. How can you do something to change that?

And if you have other ideas, there are also trustee or committee member positions available on the Multiple District level. Some of these positions have been vacant for years for lack of willing Lions. Again, how can you help?

If you don't think you have enough leadership skills, there is the Indiana Lions Leadership Institute on April 14-16 in Indianapolis. Typically all your expenses are paid except for your transportation costs to and from the Institute. Each District is allotted a limited number of seats at the Institute, and I understand we have at least one seat open from 25-G. You can also be put on a "stand by" list in case another District doesn't fill their allotment. If you are interested, call District Governor Brian right away to reserve your seat. If not this year, then next year. It's a weekend you won't regret.

But first, get your Club's Nominating Committee working so that you can have your Club election in April. Be sure to follow your Club's protocol for announcing candidates, and work to involve new people in new positions. Don't forget, April will be here before you know it!

Camp Ray Bird Executive Director Speaks to Madison Township Lions Club

The guest speaker at our February 14th dinner meeting was Mr. Mitch Machir, the Executive Director of Camp Ray Bird located at 25765 Edison Road, South Bend, Indian. He worked as a boys counselor during his college years and has served as Executive Director for the past four years.

This is a faith-based camp that is "dedicated to sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ with Michiana children and teens, nurturing those believers, and preparing them for participation in local churches. Ray Bird Ministries specializes in serving families who could not otherwise afford meaningful camping experiences."



The camp serves approximately 800 children, ages 8-15, over 8 weeks for mostly low income, ethnically-diverse children. The cost per camper ranges from \$30 to \$500 and is determined by household income. The majority of campers are from the South Bend area.

The camp is funded through donations. The Madison Township Lions Club donated \$500 to the camp.

Syracuse Lions Club Celebrates Trailblazer in Vision Research

The Syracuse Lions Club hosted fellow Lion Brian Bussard from the Baugo Township Lions Club, at their dinner/program meeting on Monday, February 27. A year ago in early February, Lion Brian became the pilot participant in groundbreaking vision research, receiving the first Intracortical Visual Prosthesis (IVP) implant. This artificial vision implant connects directly to the visual cortex, offering future hope to individuals who are totally blind as a result of complete functional loss of retinas and optic nerves. Lion Brian experienced multiple retinal detachments beginning in high school and resulting in complete loss of sight by 2016. In 2018 his blindness was determined to be permanent due to subsequent loss of optic nerve function. While Brian's contribution to this research as a pioneering volunteer is not likely to benefit him personally, he believes it may someday help restore some form of vision to others, demonstrating ultimate commitment to the Lions motto, "We Serve". In his presentation to the Syracuse Lions he described his experience: "Being in this experimental program knowing that you will probably never benefit from it in your lifetime is like planting trees knowing you will never enjoy the shade of those trees but someone else may."

Opportunities for Service

Here's an opportunity to learn more about district eyeglass recycling.

The Lions of District 25-G have a very active eyeglass recycling program. The project began more than 40 years ago and for many years we operated out of a double-wide trailer located near LaPaz. In 2015, we relocated to a more spacious facility in Dunlap, between Goshen and Elkhart.

Our effort is one of the very few fully vertical integrated eyeglass programs in the country. We collect, sort, clean, read prescriptions, package, and ship nearly 15,000 pairs of glasses each year for an eyeglass mission in Mexico. We also select the mission city, assemble and train a team of more than 20 Lions, and partner with a Mexican Lions Club in this mission.

One of our biggest concerns is that there are still many clubs in our district that are apparently unaware of this program, even though we frequently have articles in our district newsletter and give reports at every district meeting held during the year.



We also travel to district Lions Clubs and give programs. The result is those clubs are astonished at how extensive our recycling program is. To facilitate clubs in their eyeglass collection efforts, we developed a unique collection bucket to help clubs collect glasses. These buckets are much sturdier and hold more glasses than the cardboard boxes available through LCI and much more convenient than the older wooden boxes that were made more than 15 years ago.

This recycling program relies on contributions from clubs and individuals in order to fund all the expenses to operate. We have no regular income and we do not receive funding from the district. Club support is vital for this effort to continue providing eyeglasses at no charge to needy individuals in our Mexican mission locations.

We also depend on Lions to help during the yearlong process, including washing glasses using our new, state-of-the-art ultrasound machine; reading and sorting eyeglasses for shipping; and performing other maintenance functions at our spacious facility. We also need Lions to help construct our new collection buckets. If you are interested in helping in these areas, contact me for details.

I would like to visit your club and give a program that details our efforts. We also welcome clubs to come and visit our facility. Arrangements will be made to accommodate such visits. Contact me to schedule a time.


State Project Update

Cancer Control Project Expanding to Address Childhood Cancer



For more than 75 years, Indiana Lions have supported cancer treatment, research, and education through our partnership between the Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana, Inc. and the Department of Radiation Oncology at the Indiana University Medical Center campus in Indianapolis. The department serves cancer patients of all ages, but the vast majority of the patients are adults.

In order to better serve pediatric cancer patients in Indiana, the Board of Trustees of the Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana, Inc. has voted unanimously to establish a partnership with the pediatric oncology programs at Riley Hospital for




