CT Ron will record your donations, deposit your check, and periodically mail checks to each of our 5 state projects, Indiana Lions Foundation. and State Comptroller Lion Robert Yunker (for State Committee donations.)

His submissions will show the dollar amount your club is donating along with the name and address of the Lion in your club to receive acknowledgement.

If you wish your club's donations to remain in the district for such committees as Diabetes, Kidsight, SchoolSight, or Law Camp please specify that with your submittal.

If these procedures are followed the district will have an accurate record of what clubs are giving to our state projects and state and district committees.

LCIF Donations toward Melvin Jones Fellowships:

If a Lion or club is making a donation to LCIF toward a MJF it should be mailed directly to LCIF with the form downloadable from www.lcif.org. Click on "Support Your Foundation" then "How To Give" then "Ways to Give." Continue to scroll down and click on

"Melvin Jones Fellowship Application Form"

under

"Donating by Check."

Save and print the form and submit it with your check (even if the recipient will be named later.)

This will ensure that LCIF has an accurate record of donations toward Melvin Jones Fellowships.

NAMI stands for North American Membership Initiative, the child of two future Lions Clubs International Presidents, IVPs Brian Sheehan and Judge Haynes Townsend. They reminded us that while Lionism is growing throughout the world, it is actually decreasing in the United States and Canada.

North America has already lost seats on the Board of Directors. The last time the United States showed a positive growth

- Develop a member recruitment team that can focus on all aspects of member recruitment.

Lions,

The year is already one quarter over. I'm sure you are all doing many service projects in your communities. It's important that we continue to incorporate new ideas in helping with community needs.

I am interested in what types of projects each club is doing as Lions. Please send me a service project your club is doing that may be different than normal for most clubs. was 1983. Canada's last year of positive growth was 1984. Something like 53% of all Lions Districts around the US and Canada have less than the requisite 1,250 members.

Admittedly, times have changed, with many other demands on the time of men and women, inhibiting their desire to join just one more organization. Lions is not the only organization with dwindling enrollment. Surveys show that attendance at Lions Club meetings is down 58% in the past 25 years. And yet it appears that getting new members is not all that difficult. It's keeping them that is the hard part.

Vice Presidents Sheehan and Townsend received permission from the Executive Board to try something new for membership, and they contacted nine Districts around the United States and Canada, each of which was suffering from dwindling membership.

Each of these Districts, together with the Clubs within those Districts, was

2nd - Create a Growth Plan that works for your club. This includes developing an action-oriented plan that clearly outlines your recruitment efforts.

- Determine who will be recruiting.
- Determine where you focus your recruiting efforts.
- Gather the materials you will need for your outreach.
- Set and promote your informational meeting.
- 3rd Implement your growth plan.
 - Reach out to target members as outline in steps one and two.

I am available to offer ideas if you're looking for ways to continue being active.

Remember the motto of Lions is "**WE SERVE**". In order to serve our communities, it takes Members. Once we have Members, we need Leaders to keep us focused on our objective to serve.

Service projects are the way to getting new members. Ask nonmembers you know what their interests are and when you have a encouraged to devise their own growth and retention plans under a general umbrella. No two Districts have to have identical processes. And yet all of these nine Districts have now shown positive growth.

NAMI has not yet been unveiled to the entire United States or Canada, although February, 2020 is the target date for doing so. In my opinion, it will be highly interesting to hear the details from the successful nine Districts, and to see how many Districts in Indiana adopt this process.

For our GMTs and GLTs, this is an important opportunity to prove that Lionism in Indiana is growing, not fading away.

And I suppose if you beg hard enough, PDG Paul will show you the picture he took of me in front of Myra's Brothel Museum in Butte, Montana. Sadly, it was closed.

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Million Meal Movement service project scheduled at the 2020 MWC

The Million Mile Movement (MMM), an Indianapolis-based not-for-profit, has a two-fold vision to feed the hungry and teach the importance of volunteerism. Annually millions of meals are distributed to hungry families throughout Indiana by thousands of volunteers.

At the Friday night event at the Crowne Plaza, Lions will work to package precisely measured meals that will be given to agencies in Indiana.

In a two-hour period, thousands of meals will be packaged, consisting of high-energy meals with vitamins and minerals, dried vegetables, protein, and rice. The meals will be distributed to food banks along with written instructions for their use.

In Indiana alone, 1 million people, including one if five children, don't know where they'll get their next meal.

Attendees at this year's Friday night service project at the Mid-Winter Conference, scheduled for Jan. 10 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel at the Indianapolis International airport, will have an opportunity help provide an answer for hungry Hoosiers.



Since the MMM was founded in 2007, over 28 million meals were packaged and distributed. The program has been highly refined, and each volunteer at a typical food packaging event can prepare 200 meals in an hour.

Each meal costs \$.27 to feed an individual. MWC event organizers are hoping to have more than 100 volunteers at the Friday night packing, resulting in more than 20,000 meals prepared.

Additionally, a seminar session on Saturday, January 11 will feature representatives from the Million Meal Movement who will detail how local Lions Clubs can develop partnerships in their own communities. The MMM is an excellent new service project that involves volunteers to meet the needs of over 1 million children and adults throughout Indiana.



William is in the company of Jane Wallace, an 80 year old white female, 5 feet 1 inch tall, 100 pounds, with gray hair and brown eyes.

William is missing from Plymouth, Indiana which is 127 miles north of Indianapolis and was hot seen on Sanday, September 29, 2019, at 9:00 am. He is believed to be in extreme danger and may require medical assistance.

Each year approximately 500 athletes, from various states and countries, compete in this 400-meter swim / 12-bike ride / 5K run event.

The Culver Lions provide roughly half of the 60+

The Culver Lions recently purchased optical equipment so that we could offer kids Eye screenings at the Culver Elementary and Middle Schools.

We recently conducted 237 screenings on 1st, 3rd and 8th graders. If there is an issue, the equipment provides a referral that the Lions provide the school and they, in turn, forward to the parents for their review and action.

In this last round of screenings there were 77 referrals or opportunities for the parents to consult with an optometrist and potentially make a difference in the child's ability to see clearly!



How Does the World See YOU?

The word of how Lions help those with vision issues has traveled across our district, and a request has been made to help a young girl of 13 years old to get assistance for new prosthetic, acrylic eye globes. Since this request is not something that the Indiana Eye Bank can fund, due to it not improving the eyesight of the young lady, we are working with the company to see if we can count on them to reduce the cost of the prosthetics, allowing club donations to help offset a majority of the financial cost.

Both mother and daughter sent us their request. Below is the letter our District received from Kylah:

Hello!

My name is Kylah Cook. I am 13 years old and I go to Edgewood Middle School where I am in 7th grade. I wanted to write to you to tell you a little about myself.

I love to read, sing, create stories and ride horses. I work hard and I am a pretty good student in school even though I think math can be hard at times. I sing in the school choir and I am also in the community choir. I am always coming up with new stories to tell, mostly about animals. Sometimes I write my stories down too. My family tells me I might be an author one day, but I'm not sure. I also love to ride horses. I have been riding since I was 5.

I am also completely blind, and I have been since birth. When I was about 18 months old, I met my ocularist, Dr. Kathy. She started the process for my prosthetic lenses. She also helped my family through the process of having my natural eyes removed and fake globes put in. That was done when I was 2 years old. After I healed from that surgery, I started wearing my hand painted prosthetic lenses every day. I don't remember these events because I was so little, but I have heard the stories. I have worn the prosthetic lenses every day since then. I go in every 6 months for them to be cleaned and polished and every 4-5 years I have to have them replaced because they start to wear out.

My parents have told me that insurance doesn't pay for them because it's not considered necessary. To me, they are necessary. When I am not wearing my lenses, my eyes feel sunken and weird. I cannot even open my eyelids. I can't imagine not wearing them. I think people would think it looks strange. Sometimes, people don't even realize I can't see because they think my eyes are real. My parents say this is because they are hand painted to look so real.

Thank you for reading my story. I know it's not much, but I am glad I could tell you a little about myself.

Currently, the cost of these new globes is \$6,790, of which we have already received club donations totaling \$1,200. We have already reached out the company in Indianapolis that has provided the quote for the Cook family. Pending notification from that company if they can reduce the cost, any of the remaining balance needed must be paid for by the Cook family. Would you please present this urgent need to your club's board members and ask that a donation in your club's name could be made? Any amount will help.

Communicate with your contacts closely and remember to keep an open mind!

Write a plan.

Develop a written plan that includes goals and objectives, time frame, and people and resources needed.

Implement the plan!

Involve your members and reward their successes along the way. Include progress reports in club newsletters and meetings. When the project is complete, take a moment to review the actions, including what worked and what didn't work, and identify ways to improve for the next project.
