Club Contributions: Blueprint for Proper Credit

Donations to LCIF, Indiana Lions Foundation, state projects, and state and district committees

In order for your club to receive proper credit for supporting our Indiana Lions state projects and state committees it is IMPORTANT that the following procedures be followed when making donation payments.

- Send ALL state project and committee donations to: CT Kim Polk, 5378 E 975 S, LaFontaine, IN 46940.
- Write one check payable to District 25-G for the combination of all state project and committee
 donations and include a list of the entities you are supporting with the dollar amount for each.
 Example: Check is written for \$700. The included list (for this example) might read: \$100 for Indiana
 School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, \$100 for Indiana Vision First Eye Bank, \$100 for Indiana
 Lions Speech and Hearing, \$100 for Indiana Lions for Leader Dog, \$100 for Indiana Lions Cancer
 Control, \$100 for Indiana Lions Foundation, \$50 for Indiana Lions Law Camp, and \$50 for Diabetes.

CT Kim will record your donations, deposit your check, and mail checks to each of our state projects, Indiana Lions Foundation, and State Comptroller Lion Robert Yunker (for state committee donations). Her submissions will show the dollar amount your club is donating along with the name and address of the Lion in your club to receive acknowledgement. If you wish your club's donations to remain in the district for such committees as Diabetes, Kidsight, SchoolSight, or Law Camp please specify that with your submittal. If these procedures are followed, the district will have an accurate record of what clubs are giving to our state projects and state and district committees.

LCIF donations toward Melvin Jones Fellowships: If a Lion or club is making a donation to LCIF toward a MJF it should be mailed directly to LCIF with the form downloadable from www.lcif.org. Click on "Support Your Foundation" then "How To Give" then "Ways to Give." Continue to scroll down and click on "Melvin Jones Fellowship Application Form" under "Donating by Check". Save and print the form and submit it with your check, even if the recipient will be named later. This will ensure that LCIF has an accurate record of donations toward Melvin Jones Fellowships.

W. P. Woods Fellowships should be ordered directly from the Indiana Lions Foundation using the form available on the Indiana Lions Foundation website at http://IndianaLionsFoundationMD25.org/.

Richard T. Miyamoto Fellowships should be ordered directly from the Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing project. Ask one of our Speech and Hearing trustees for a Miyamoto Fellowship Application form. Contact information for the trustees is located in your club's copy of the District 25-G Directory.

Who's Got Try?



In the weeks since one of our Clydesdales, Connor, died, I've read and reread an essay by Baxter Black called "A Good Horse." It was first published in the "Western Horseman" magazine in June, 2005, but it is as valid today as it was 17 years ago. In the essay, he writes about the death of an aging horse he owned, one not known for its beauty or size, but for its being ever willing to try and keep on trying whatever it was asked to do, a trait he greatly admired. This

article, however, is not intended to be a tribute to our late Connor, whom I would characterize as having no *Try* whatsoever.

But the article reminds me of certain District 25-G Lions who have *Try*. Lions who willingly respond whenever asked to do something, even if it is out of their comfort zone. Lions who have embraced the concept of "We Serve." Lions who want to make a difference. Lions with ideas and the nerve to try them.

Every Club has Lions with *Try*. We know who they are. They are the Lions on the committees, who participate in all the activities and fundraisers, and for whom the Club is important. They are the members for which just meeting, eating, and talking are not enough.

Having Lions with *Try* puts a special responsibility on Club leaders. Instead of stifling these Lions, which so often happens, leaders need to offer these members the chance to show their *Try*. These members should be encouraged, supported, and acknowledged. This may also mean that members with *Try* might work their Clubs out of their present comfort zones, into activities the Club might not otherwise have explored or adopted.

It's also highly possible that by allowing Lions with try to be successful, the Club may discover that there are other dynamic Lions in their midst, Lions who may have been beaten down by years of "We've never done it that way" or "We tried it once in 1993 and it didn't work". Maybe we even lost those members. Who knows how much our communities might have benefitted if we had allowed everyone with *Try* to try?

This essay isn't intended to be a plea for younger, perhaps more energetic members. It's a plea for openness, to give all members, whether young or experienced, the chance to express themselves with a reasonable hope that the Club will support their efforts. Members with *Try* might lead the Club in ways the Club had never expected, but Club members and the community might be delighted at the results.

Good horses have *Try*. Good Lions have *Try*. Good riders covet horses with *Try*. Good Clubs covet members with *Try*. Keep looking for those members with *Try*. Let them try. And ...

Let's all try.

Fountain Recognizing Lion Luella Karay Reinstalled in Elkhart Park



Several years ago, when the Elkhart Community Lions were still functioning, the club decided it wanted to do something for the City of Elkhart. The club approached the City of Elkhart and learned that the Parks Department wanted to put a drinking fountain in downtown Elkhart's Central Park, located on Main Street. The club adopted the project and began saving funds for its purchase.

In 2009, one of the club's founding members and a stalwart of the community, Lion Luella Karay, passed away. For all the work she had done to get the club organized and being an active member of the community, the members decided to dedicate the fountain in her memory. In September 2011, a dedication ceremony was well-attended by Lions from several neighboring clubs as well as the community at large.

A few years ago, the Elkhart Parks Department made plans to do an extensive makeover of Central Park, and because of the work involved, the fountain was removed and placed in storage. The makeover of the park was completed, but the fountain was not reinstalled. Lions from the former Elkhart Community Lions Club (disbanded in 2015) questioned what happened to the fountain, and after some questions, it was located. The fountain has been reinstalled and is again functioning.

District 25-G Lions at the Indiana State Fair



A quiz for used eyeglass collection projects



Is your club collecting used eyeglasses for the District 25-G recycling program? If so, take this quiz.

Which of the following items does the District 25-G eyeglass recycling program want?

- A) Eyeglass cases.
- B) Broken eyeglasses.
- C) Loose lenses, without frames.
- D) Eyeglasses with only one lens or with no lenses.
- E) Eyeglasses with badly scratched or cracked lenses.

The answers may surprise you. The ONLY items the District does not want are items A and C. Used eyeglass cases are usually extremely dirty and cannot be adequately cleaned for reuse. Further, when we package glasses for shipment to Mexico, we put glasses in plastic envelopes and put 50 pairs in a box. If we tried to include cases, we might only get 15-20 pairs in a box, requiring up to 3 times the number of boxes to ship. We currently ship approximately 13,000 pairs of glasses in about 32 large boxes (400 pair in each shipping carton). Increasing this would be cost prohibitive. Item C, loose lenses, have no value to us. We have no way to put lenses in frames and to try to match a lens with a frame is nearly impossible, unless we use a lot of duct tape!

Yes, we use broken eyeglasses, eyeglasses with only one lens or no lenses, and eyeglasses with badly scratched or cracked lenses. We send all scrap metal for recycling. This is the project's only regular income stream that pays for the project's many expenses throughout the year. So while we don't take them on our mission trips, they play an important part in keeping our program solvent. Random Thoughts From A Random Mind

Seal The Deal With A Test Drive

A few years ago, my wife and I decided it was time to replace an aging minivan. We did some research online, then visited a nearby dealership. The salesman who came out to meet us engaged us in conversation about our needs, and identified a vehicle he thought might meet our needs. But he didn't just tell us about the features, he encouraged us to get in and take a test drive, because he knows the hands-on experience of a test drive is his best sales tool. Later, as I thought about our experience at the auto dealership, I realized it was applicable to our efforts to recruit new members for our Lions Clubs.

In many cases, our individual recruiting efforts take the form of a simple question: "Would you like to come to a Lions Club meeting?" or "Would you like to join our Lions Club?". The answer to these questions is often "No", and after we've been rejected a few times, we get discouraged and quit asking.

Perhaps we should rethink our approach. Instead of simply asking someone to come to a meeting or join our club, perhaps we should invite them to participate in one of our community service projects, particularly when they have skills we need to complete that project. Ask an educator or librarian to help with a literacy project. Ask an eye care professional to help with a vision-related project. Ask a person who enjoys woodworking to help build a ramp for someone with mobility challenges. In essence, identify our prospect's interests, match those interests with the "features" of one of our community service projects, then offer our prospect a "test drive".

Hands-on experience with Lions community service is our best sales tool, so let's take a lesson from that salesman at the auto dealership and seal the deal with a test drive.

Indiana Lions Vision Services Adds Providers

The Lions of Indiana and National Vision Corporation, owner of the *America's Best* and *Eyeglass World* brands, are partnering to help increase the supply of eye exams and glasses to Lions-referred patients. This will help increase treatment options available to low-income children and adults screened by Lions vision screening programs.

Under this agreement, all twenty-seven *America's Best* and *Eyeglass World* stores located in Indiana will provide three to five appointments per week per store. Patients are referred from area Lions clubs through their district Vision Services chairs to the closest available National Vision location. There is only one *America's Best* location in District 25-G: 1725 East University Drive, Granger. There are no *Eyeglass World* locations in District 25-G; the nearest one is in District 25-B at 333 East Coliseum Boulvevard, Fort Wayne.

Qualifying patients will meet Lions qualification of 200% of household federal poverty line, be at risk for loss of work, are enrolled as a student, or have significant personal safety risk due to uncorrected vision.

Patients will be accepted on a first-come, first served basis. Club referral to the eye care stores will be coordinated by the Lions district Vision Services chair. There will be no charge to patients for provided exams or glasses provided under the agreement.


