Past International Director Gene Rice passes away



Lions Clubs International and especially District 25-A lost a great leader, mentor and friend when PID Gene Rice passed away this week. Gene was born on the Rice family farm on May 13, 1932. Gene was a lifetime farmer on the Rice Family Farm, which was purchased by his grandfather in 1917.

He was a US Army Veteran, serving from 1953-1955 and spending several months in Korea.

Gene was also a dedicated member of the Lions Club International, serving in various offices from local to district level and was elected to a 2-year term on the International Board of Directors from 1975-1977. He was known as the "wedding singer" in the area, singing at hundreds of weddings and funerals over six decades. Gene also mentored many Lions encouraging them to reach out in service and achieve leadership roles at the District and Multi-District levels. I and all of District 25-A will miss his guidance and friendship.

DISTRICT GMT

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The membership growth of Lions Clubs International is a dynamic and critical focus area for the organization, with different trends observed across various regions.

Here is a summary of the current trends and strategies:

Current Membership Status and Goals

- **Global Membership:** Lions Clubs International maintains a substantial global presence with **over 1.4 million members** across 200+ countries.
- **Recent Growth:** In the period from July 2023 through June 2024, the organization reportedly **inducted nearly 150,000 NEW MEMBERS**, which represented an eight percent increase from the previous year.
- **Mission 1.5:** Lions Clubs International is actively pursuing “**Mission 1.5**,” a major strategic goal to reach **1.5 million members by June 30, 2027**. This initiative highlights the organizational drive to increase their capacity for global service by growing their membership base.

Key Focus Areas for Growth

Lions Clubs International utilizes a multi-pronged approach to recruitment and retention:

Retention is Key: Research indicates that roughly **50% of new members drop out within the first three years**. Therefore, retention is a major focus, with efforts concentrated on:

- Providing **formal orientation** for new members.
- Addressing the common reasons members leave, such as **boring meetings, club politics, and a lack of active involvement** in service projects.

Attracting New Demographic:

- **Youths:** The organization heavily promotes **Leo Clubs** (their youth wing) to develop young leaders and ensure a pipeline of future.

First Vice District Governor David Dickinsen

- **Women:** There has been a significant surge in the number of women joining the organization globally since the constitution was amended to allow their membership in 1987?

Active Recruitment & Incentives:

- Clubs are encouraged to continually invite prospective members and utilize a “ **Just Ask** ” approach.
- They use an extensive **Membership Key Awards Program** to recognize and reward individual Lions for sponsoring new members.
- New **Family Membership** options and incentives are offered to encourage group participation.

In essence, while they are the world’s largest service club organization and are experiencing solid growth in some regions, they are also actively working to address regional declines and improve members retention globally to meet their ambitious service goals.

Indiana Lions Matching Grant Application

CRITERIA:

1. The Project must be a Lions project. For instance, if your club takes on the project of funding equipment for the local fire department and raises funds from club projects, grants from non-Lion sources and solicitations in the Lions Club's name, the application will be considered. It will not be considered if the request is for a grant to be given as a part of the fire department solicitation.
2. Grants will not be given for the direct benefit of any one individual.
3. To assist 400 clubs and 10,000+ Lions, we encourage not more than one grant per Lions year per organization.
4. The applying Lions Club must give direct financial support to the project.
5. Grants are to match Lions Club direct financial support up to \$1,500.00
6. Club operation and routine maintenance expenses are not eligible for a grant: Capital Expenditures will be considered. The grant may be used for initial start-up costs and associated expenses for equipment, real estate, or improvements to real estate.
7. The club must be in good standing with the District, State and Lions Club International

We encourage organizations that receive a grant to assist the Indiana Lions Foundation Inc by one or more of the following.

- A. Purchasing a W. P. Woods Fellowship
- B. Selling tickets at the Indiana State Fair
- C. Purchasing an Indiana Lions license plate
- D. Purchasing a Brick Paver at the State Office Building

Indiana Lions Matching Grant Application

Indiana Lions Foundation Matching Grants to Indiana Lions Clubs for Local Projects

The major focus of the Indiana Lions Foundation is to support local club's community-based projects. Local clubs may apply for up to \$1,500 in matching grant funding for eligible projects. On-line application forms may be accessed at the Foundation's website (indianalionsfoundationmd25.org.)

All applications require the approval of the club president and the District Governor prior to submission to the Foundation. How are grant requests reviewed and approved? There are twenty-one trustees comprising the Foundation board: three from each of our seven districts in Multiple District 25. Those seven trustees in the second year of their three-year term make up the Grants Committee.

This Committee meets prior to each scheduled trustee meeting to review all grant applications submitted since the previous meeting. The trustees meet in February, April, June, July, September, November and December of each year.

Is there a limit to the amount of grants awarded each year? Yes, the trustees set an annual grant budget prior to each fiscal year. This budget is set based on the success of annual fundraising initiatives. The most recent grant budget was \$35,000. This amount may be adjusted upward depending on the number of applications received.

Are all clubs eligible to apply for a matching grant? Yes, as long as a club is current in meeting all of their financial obligations with their District, State and LCI. Also, each club will be limited to one grant per Lions fiscal year (July 1 – June 30).

What projects are eligible for matching grants from the Foundation? - - The project must be a club project where the club has committed funds from its fundraising activities up to \$1,500 to fund the project. For example, if your club takes on the project of funding equipment for your local fire department and raises funds for this project in the name of your club via club fundraising, grant applications and other solicitations; then a matching grant request would be considered.

If the grant is to be used only to match a monetary donation in response to fire department's charity campaign, then that request will not be considered. Grants may be awarded for initial start-up costs and associated expenses for the purchase of equipment, real estate or improvements to real estate.

For example, a club has initiated a project to purchase a used food truck to sell hot dogs and drinks at local events for fund raising, but it is known at purchase that the HVAC is inoperable and the tires unsafe. The foundation will consider a matching grant to purchase the truck and to make the truck safe and operational up to an amount of \$1,500. Perhaps the club receives a grant from a local charity to purchase the truck and then could receive a matching grant from the Foundation to make it operational.

What are some examples of projects NOT eligible for matching grants? - - - - Any project benefiting only one individual will not be considered. On-going operating and maintenance expenses are not eligible for matching grants.

Grants will not be awarded for improvements to existing capital equipment or for the normal operating expenses of that equipment. Capital equipment is defined as a depreciable asset. For example, if the food truck noted previously was already a club asset, then the purchase of new tires or upgrading of the HVAC would not be eligible.

Grants will not be awarded to maintain real estate assets or rolling equipment. Examples include: roofing, HVAC equipment, windows, electrical upgrades for real estate and brakes, tune-ups, paint, tires and engine and transmission repair or replacement for rolling stock.

Exceptions to this include replacement of equipment such as HVAC or windows if that replacement will result in energy savings exceeding 10% of past energy usage. A matching grant will not be awarded when it is intended to match a charitable monetary donation from a club to another local charity such as the fire department charity example used above.

Can a club receive two matching grants for the same project? Maybe. As an example, a club receives a matching grant for initial start-up costs for a new festival in their community. Grant requests to match a club's start-up costs for that festival in subsequent years will not be considered. However, another club took on a project to build new dug-outs at the local ball fields and received a matching grant to complete this project. The next year, the club took on a project to replace the fencing at the same ball field. This second project would be considered for a matching grant because it is effectively a new project even though at the same location.

When should a club apply for a matching grant? A club should apply during the planning and budgeting portion of the project, which presumably would be several weeks or even months before the execution of the project. The Committee may reject a request if the request is received more than six months after the project has been completed.

Should a club give recognition to the Foundation for a successful grant? Yes. The Foundation would appreciate any local publicity such as a check presentation at a club meeting made by one of that District's Trustees. In the case of the food truck example, perhaps a small decal or marker on the side of the truck acknowledging the Foundation's participation in the project could be placed.

Is there any follow-up required after a matching grant is received? The Foundation greatly appreciates receiving photos or accounts in local media about the finished project. We would appreciate receiving these within six months of project completion.

How can a club assist the Foundation? - - - - Clubs can assist the Foundation's fund raising by selling tickets at the State Fair Lions may purchase Indiana Lions license plates through the BMV Individual Lions or clubs may purchase a brick paver placed at the Lions State Office Building Purchase a W. P. Woods Fellowship Donate to a Foundation project.

Are matching grants available for disaster assistance? Yes. Grants not to exceed \$1,500 for Districts impacted by a natural disaster that has affected at least 100 people, including tornadoes and floods, are available. The grant applications must be made by the District Governor of the affected area within 30 days of the occurrence with funds spent within 30 days of receipt of funds and may be used to help meet immediate relief needs such as food, water, clothing and medical supplies. Given the urgency of these situations, the process for approval is a verbal conversation between the District Governor and the Foundation President, who will urgently poll the Foundation Board via email for rapid action.

- (1) Be an Active Member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in his/her single or sub-district.
- (2) Secure the endorsement of his/her club or a majority of the clubs in his/ her single or sub-district.
- (3) Have served or will have served at the time he/she takes office as second vice district governor:
 - (a) As president of a Lions club for a full term or major portion thereof, and a member of the board of directors of a Lions club for no less than two (2) additional years; and
 - (b) As zone chairperson, region chairperson, district global extension team coordinator, district global leadership team coordinator, district global membership team coordinator, district global service team coordinator, LCIF district coordinator, or cabinet secretary and/or treasurer for a full term or major portion thereof.
 - (c) With none of the above being accomplished concurrently.
- (4) Has not completed a full term or major portion thereof as district governor.

It was a chilly early morning when a family brought their little boy—about 8 or 9 years old—to our eyeglass mission worksite. It was clear he needed new glasses. The pair he wore was thickly taped together, the lenses scratched and thick like coke bottles. It was also evident that he faced some physical challenges. Still, he and his parents waited patiently, appearing hopeful we could help.

When it was finally the little boy's turn, we discovered his eyesight was extremely poor—legally blind. I feared we wouldn't have anything close to what he needed. But thanks to the generosity of the Lions in collecting and donating eyeglasses, we found a pair that worked for him! Seeing him leaving with his parents, relieved and smiling, was a reminder of why we do what we do: to serve, no matter who, how, or where.

But the story didn't end there. That afternoon, I glanced toward the waiting area and saw the little boy and his parents again. My heart sank. I imagined a dozen reasons why they might have returned—and feared the worst: that the glasses didn't work. Bracing myself, I walked over, unsure what I could offer next.

To my surprise, the little boy beamed at me. He tugged on my shirt, and when I bent down, he wrapped his arms around me and said, "Gracious, Señor. Gracious." Fighting back tears, I realized they had returned not with a problem, but with gratitude.

Lions from across our district have experienced the joy of transforming lives—both here at home and around the world and have their stories too. Just ask them!
