Invite a U.S. Veteran to Join Your Club

Did you know that since the *Involve a U.S. Veteran* pilot program began in 2013, over 90% of veterans who joined a Lions Club are still involved with their club? Show your support by inviting veterans to participate in your club activities, such as your next club meeting or next service project.

The *Involve a U.S. Veteran* program waives the charter or entrance fee for any qualifying veteran who joins a new or existing Lions club. Eligible veterans include retired U.S. military personnel or honorably-discharged members of the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard Services, Marines, National Guard, Navy or Reserves. Those currently serving in the National Guard or Reserves are also eligible. This special pilot program is offered only in the United States.





Indiana Lions Foundation Needs Your Help Please volunteer to work at the Indiana State Fair

The Indiana Lions Foundation provides ticket sellers and ticket scanners at four gates at the Indiana State Fair. The fair runs Friday August 5th—Sunday, August 21st. Over 600 shifts need to be filled over this 17 day period. This is the single largest fundraiser for the Foundation and the money is used to provide Foundation Grants to individual clubs.

Working at the State Fair as a ticket seller or scanner is much easier than it has been in the past. The computer terminals worked very well last year and selling tickets requires pushing only three buttons. Scanning tickets requires only that the worker hold the hand held scanner over the bar-coded ticket and press the trigger.

Most positions are sitting and two of the four gates have air conditioned booths for the ticket sellers. Only the Tunnel Gate may require standing, although that is not normally a busy gate.

Two shifts are available to work. The morning shift is 7:30 a.m.—3:00 p.m.. The afternoon shift is 1:30 p.m.—9:00/9:30 p.m..

In return for working the Indiana Lions Foundation is offering W.P. Woods Fellowship credits for workers—one credit for the morning shift and two credits for the afternoon shift. It takes 10 credits to earn a regular W.P. Woods and 12 credits for the Centennial Plate. Bring a car load of Lions and friends and join us at the Fair this year.

2016 State Fair Workers Needed

Gate 11 2 sellers 2 scanners each shift each day

*Gate 12 4 sellers 3 scanners each shift Mon, Wed, Thur

*Gate 12 6 sellers 3 scanners Day shift Tues, Fri, Sat, Sun

*Gate 12 5 sellers 3 scanners Night Shift Tues, Fri, Sat. Sun

Gate 18 2 sellers 2 scanners each shift each day

Tunnel Gate 2 sellers each shift each day Workers at this gate will need to be able to work with vehicle traffic, however it is a very low volume position.

All positions on gates 11, 12 and 18 allow workers to be seated while working. Sellers on Gates 11 and 18 are located inside an air conditioned building.

*The numbers on gate 12 are different according to higher volumes on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Tuesday.


