



## Impossible hope

These are a couple of words with basically opposite meanings. So, let's start with the word impossible.

The dedication was a Safe Haven Baby Box. The speaker told the story of how this program started that I would like to share. She explained that she had read a story about an unwanted baby left in a city park at the end of December in 2014. Sadly, this young mother was only 2 miles from a fire station where she could have taken the baby. The speaker made it her mission to never have another unwanted baby die.

That morning I witnessed the fulfillment of her "hope." I had the privilege to meet a 2-year-old girl whose name was "Hope." Hope was the first child left at a Safe Haven Baby Box in Michigan City. Hope is now an adopted and happy little girl.

So now that you have read this story, what is my point? Make a slight change in the title of this article, from "Impossible Hope" to "I'm Possible Hope." As Lions we strive to provide the hope, the fulfillment for those who have needs that are greater than our own.

Prepaid and ordered scooters will be delivered on Friday evening, April 24, and picked up on Monday morning. Cost: \$45 for the weekend. There is a fee to deliver and pick up the scooters, but it will be divided amongst all participants.


As stated in the Indiana Lions Constitution: To be entitled to vote, delegates must have their

credentials certified by the Credentials Committee. Credential certification shall be open Friday no later than noon until 5:00 p.m., and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. The hours of certification shall be listed and shown on the Convention Program and published in The Hoosier Lion, and may include a break during the luncheon hour. Each club in good standing shall be entitled to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each 10 members or major faction thereof, who have enrolled for at least one year and one day in the club as shown by the (Continued on page 9)

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

# Election information


As a result, it's a necessary part of any organization. Please log in to www.lionsclubs.org and follow the link for member login every month.



## Service, reporting, recruiting

I'm going to break a promise by doing something I told myself I would not do. That is, I'm going to talk about numbers and why they are important. So, I hope none of you have already set your paper on fire.

Let's talk about service first. We have 61 Lions Clubs in District 25 F. We have two primary purposes as an organization. The first, of course, is service. We want to aid those in need, whether it is in the form of direct service to an individual or by a donation from funds raised that indirectly helps someone through the organization or program to which we donate.

Based on the latest report, 28 clubs have reported doing service in their communities. These clubs have performed 528 service activities, serving 73,678 people, giving 8,111 volunteer hours to do this. We want to say thank you to these clubs and all your members who have been involved in these activities. You have positively impacted many, many people, some of whom may never have received a helping hand in their lives before you stepped up.

Certainly not diminishing these efforts, the reality is that 33 clubs show no service being done. Now, I really can't believe this to be true. It is my greatest hope that it has just not been reported. It is my greatest hope because the alternative is unfathomable. In other words, as Lions we provide service, and if we are not, then why be Lions? Knowing historically that service not being done is really not an option, then I must conclude the service provided has not been reported.

Concluding that service is not being reported, there are some presumptions we could possibly look at as reasons or excuses for not doing it. One reason could be that someone just really doesn't want to do it. I just totally disregard this, as I refuse to believe anyone would not want to complete a task that is so important to Lions.

Another reason might be that maybe a person's computer skills are not the best and, for whatever reason, they are embarrassed to ask for help.

Yet another reason might be that any given person does not understand the real importance of reporting to Lions.

Finally, the problem we've all had is the difficulties with MyLion. Not understanding the importance of reporting service is both a byproduct of not being educated by folks like me and maybe having too much of a mindset that does not allow us to really see the big picture of which we are a part.

The first part of this issue I'm going to correct right now. Reporting our service at the local level happens not just in 25 F, but it happens worldwide. It is how Lions not only know how many service activities are performed and how many people are served, but it is how our organization is able to partner with big donor individuals and groups. We don't receive their funds just because we say we help people. We receive their funds because we can show them how many people are served and how their money helps fight measles, eye diseases, and disasters in our country, our state, our district, and local communities, as well as around the world.

I am sure the residents of Henryville and Kokomo certainly appreciated Lions' help when those communities were hit hard by tornadoes. This may not have been possible had our impact not been known.

Finally, as far as not asking for help and MyLion difficulties, just

ask for help. Being frustrated by MyLion and getting mad and saying, "forget it, I'm not going to report," and being embarrassed by lack of computer skills is not a reason to not ask for help in dealing with something that, once learned, is really fairly easy to do. I must believe there is not one person in your club who has good computer skills that would not be happy to help if he or she knew you needed it. At the same time, you could ask our District Secretary Andrea Feeney for help, which she would gladly give.

We have been writing this in almost every article I've had published since July, but how many of us have asked for this help? So, if you are one of the 33 clubs who have performed service activities since July, but have not reported, please, whether or not you need some help, just ask. As stated before, it will be gladly given.

Now that we have service and reporting out of the way, let's talk about recruiting.

If you have received and read February's newsletter, you know I wrote about the number 1,600 and its significance. As far as this District is concerned, the only significance of 1,600 is that is the number of net people we want to have at the end of June.

Here is something I haven't disclosed to this point: that number is the number I picked, which I really did not want to do. Early on, I talked with some people about how many new people they wanted to add to their clubs this year and how many net we could have by June. Let's just say I was underwhelmed to the point I was discouraged to ask anyone else. Consequently, I decided to do something when you are dealing with a group of volunteers. So, I set the goal. Now, there was rhyme to my reason. I did the math.

# The Zone Chair

In the District meeting roundtable discussions some members suggested more information be provided on a few of the District offices and what the responsibilities are of the positions. Detailed information is available within the Constitution and Bylaws on www.indianalions.org, under "Member Resources" on www.lionsclubs.org, or feel free to contact me. This month's office will be the Zone Chairperson (ZC). the District Governor's Advisory Committee of the Zone.

(a) The ZC in each Zone shall hold not fewer than three meetings of the District Governor's Advisory Committee during the

(d) The ZC shall encourage the Clubs in the Zone to hold interclub meetings and such social activities as golf, bowling, softball tournaments, banquets, anniversary celebrations, and special funchonoring Key Key members, installation of officers, induction of new members, outings and other similar functions. The ZC shall promote attendance at Charter Nights of newly organized clubs. It shall be the duty of the ZC to promote the annual State and International Conventions among the Clubs in the Zone and endeavor to have the Clubs represented at each of these Conventions by at least a full quota of delegates to which they are entitled.

In District F the 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors fulfill the positions of the Region chairs.

The District Governor appoints a Lion to be the ZC over a group of three to five clubs that are geographically close to each other. The ZC is a member of the District Governor's Cabinet and shall attend the regular and special meetings. There shall be a District Governor's Advisory Committee in each Zone, composed of the ZC and the Presidents and Secretaries of the Clubs in the Zone. The ZC shall be a member and the Chairperson of year, and the first of these meetings shall be held within 60 days after adjournment of the preceding International Convention.

(b) The ZC shall be the presiding officer of these meetings. The ZC shall make a report of each Advisory Committee meeting and send copies within five days thereafter to the Region Chairperson, the District Governor, and the office of the International Association of Lions Clubs.

(c) The ZC shall arrange regularly scheduled Zone Meetings (meetings to which all Lions in the Zone are invited). In these meetings they should encourage the clubs to share their activities, successes, and failures, exchange ideas regarding service activities, membership growth, leadership development, and provide important District dates and events and communications from the District Governor and LCI.

The official actions of the ZC shall be under the supervision of the District Governor.

The ZC position is an important communication link between the clubs and the District Governor. It is also a building block for those wanting to become more involved with District leadership, as well as getting in line to later become a District Governor.

It is also a little disconcerting to think we could potentially have more people than we think. This could be so because we don't have 100% of clubs reporting membership. It is important for a variety of reasons. One we don't discuss much is the effect it can have on the District's budget. If we don't have an accurate count on people, we can't know how much money we have to budget for the operation of the District. So, please, everyone needs to report. If you need help, contact the District Secretary. She can help you.

Having said all this, I still believe we can reach a net total of 1,600 people by the end of June. On March 14, we will be having our District Convention. The District will be hosting International Director Steve Thornton and his wife, Lion Rebecca. Director Thornton is from Wooster, Ohio,

## Plymouth Lions receive KidSight grant

The Plymouth Lions Club received a grant, written by Lion Penny Luckenbill, from the Marshall County Community Foundation for \$3,000 which will assist with the purchase of a new pediatric auto refractor to perform vision screenings on young school-age children in the Marshall County schools, preschools, and Head Start programs. The total cost of the new equipment is \$5,987, and with the \$3,000 grant and \$500 trade-in for our old equipment from the equipment manufacturer, the Plymouth Lions will contribute the balance of \$2,487

More than 12 million school-age children in the United States have some form of vision problem, yet only one in three has received eye care services before age 6. Left untreated, many of these problems may become permanent. Since good vision plays a vital role in a child's education, it is imperative that eye problems are detected and referred to an eye care professional as early as possible. Screening students at a young age enables early detection of vision problems and allows families to address these issues with their own eye care professional.

In 2008, the Plymouth Lions obtained a grant from the Marshall County Community Foundation to purchase our original auto refractor camera and notebook computer to perform vision screenings for young students in conjunction with the Lions Kid-Sight program. Since that time, we have screened thousands of Marshall County school children in the Argos, Bremen, and Plymouth kindergartens, preschools, and Head Start programs to help ensure their eye health and increase their chances of academic success, all at absolutely no charge.

From July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2018, the Plymouth Lions screened 400 children in 16 ses-

sions, resulting in 50 referrals. From July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019, we screened approximately 450 children in 15 sessions, with 62 referrals.

School nurses and program administrators throughout the county rely on the KidSight vision screening program that we provide free of charge. Trained volunteers from the Lions Club perform the vision screening, and the results are forwarded to the KidSight Program in Indianapolis, where they are reviewed by an ophthalmologist. If readings are outside the accepted parameters for the respective age groups, the ophthalmologist recommends that the child be referred to their own eye professional for further treatment. Members from the Argos and Bremen Lions clubs provide member volunteers to assist with screening visits at their respective schools.

The Lions Clubs International motto is "We Serve." Locally, in addition to providing KidSight vision screenings, the Plymouth Lions Club supports three scholarships to graduating seniors; purchases and distributes dictionaries to third-grade students; provides financial support to provide eye exams and glasses for needy children; and donates to a variety of organizations and causes throughout the community.

The club also supports state projects such as cancer research, diabetes awareness, speech and hearing conservation, and the Indiana Lions Eye Bank.

In 1925, Helen Keller challenged the Lions to be "Knights for Sight," and since then, the Lions have been known the world over for their service to the sight-challenged through the Leader Dog program, Lions Eye Bank program, KidSight vision screenings, and SightFirst mission programs to provide eyeglasses to Third World countries.

## Etna Green artist wins bird art award

A painting of a ruffed grouse has been chosen by a panel of judges as the winning entry in the 2019-20 California Upland Game Bird Stamp Art Contest.

The painting was created by Jeffrey Klinefelter of Etna Green.

Sponsored by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, the annual contest determined the official design for this year's California Upland Game Bird Stamp. Klinefelter also captured the top spots in the 2018-19 and 2017-18 Upland Game Bird Stamp Art Contests, as well as the 2009-10 California Duck Stamp Contest.

Artists submitted an original depiction of ruffed grouse (Bonasa umbellus). These medium-bodied forest dwellers are the only member of the genus Bonasa and have a range extending across North America. In California, they inhabit riparian and conifer forests in the northwestern portion of the state.

Ruffed grouse have intricately barred or variegated plumage in shades of brown and gray, depending on environmental variables, with a conspicuous neck "ruff" and dark tail banding they use to attract mates. Their most notable courtship ritual, however, is their "drum display" - a low-frequency booming sound created by beating their wings against their bodies, according to a news release from the CDFW. Contest entries were judged by a panel of experts selected for their knowledge in the fields of ornithology, conservation, art, and printing. Designs were judged on originality, artistic composition, anatomical accuracv. and suitability for reproduction as a stamp and print. The judges praised the composition and fine detail of the painting, specifically noting the accuracy of the feathers. They cited the excellent coloration with "good barring on the belly and speckle on the back" that blends nicely with the autumnal aspen forest in the background. The panel also appreciated the inflight depiction, which allowed a

full display of the grouse's intricate plumage, something Klinefelter found challenging yet rewarding.

"Ruffed grouse are agile fliers and I thought painting them in flight would make a good picture," he said. "The plumage blends well with the background - they have cryptic coloration."

He went on to say that, while he has only seen ruffed grouse in captivity, he enjoyed imagining them in their native California habitat. approximately 17,000 stamps. Any individual who purchases

an upland game bird validation may request their free collectable stamp by visiting www.wildlife.ca.gov/licensing/c ollector-stamps. An order form is also available on the website for collectors who do not purchase a hunting license or upland game bird validation, or for hunters who wish to purchase additional collectible stamps

Broderick Crawford of Clayton, Ga., placed second. Mark Thone of Shakopee, Minn., placed third. Buck Spencer of Junction City, Ore., received honorable mention.

An upland game bird validation is required for hunting migratory and resident upland game birds in California. The validation replaces the stamp through CDFW's Automated License Data System, but the stamp is still produced and available to hunters upon request. Monies generated from upland game bird validation sales are dedicated solely to upland game bird-related conservation projects, hunting opportunities, and outreach and education. CDFW annually sells about 170,000 upland game bird distributes validations and

meetible stamps.

# **2020 State Convention proposed** amendments and explanations

2020 STATE CONVENTION, APRIL 26, 2020

 Strike out indicates current language in Article is being removed.

· Underline indicates additional language added.

#### AMENDMENT #1 CONSTITUTION **ARTICLE V, SECTION 1 State Council**

Article V, Section 1: The State Council shall be composed of the District Governors and one (1) immediate current or Past District Governor who shall serve as Council Chairperson.

Proposal from Riley Township Lions Club to change Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution.

Explanation: The amendment puts MD 25 in compliance of Lions Clubs International Bylaws Article VIII Section 2 which reads: "The council of governors shall also include one current or past district governor who shall serve as council chairperson." This amendment was adopted at the 2014 Lions Clubs International Convention.

This amendment would follow the intent of the Lions Clubs International to allow any past district governor to submit their name for consideration as Council Chair to the Council of Governors elect. It does not change the

current voting method of selecting the Council Chair. Article V, Section 7 of the MD 25 Constitution allows language to be placed in the Policy Manual to set the procedure on interviewing a limited number of candidates, if necessary, for Council Chair.

#### AMENDMENT #2: **BY-LAWS** ARTICLE XII **State Committees**

Section 2. The District Governors of each District shall appoint a **District** Global Leadership Team (GLT) Coordinator for the District and the District Coordinators shall collectively serve as the Multiple District Global Leadership Team under the Multiple District 25 appointed Three Year Coordinator. At the expiration of the term of the Multiple District Coordinator, the State Council shall name a Lion to serve as Three Year Multiple District Coordinator.

Section 3. The District Governors of each District shall appoint **District** Global Membership Team (GMT) Coordinator for the District and the District Coordinators shall collectively serve as the Multiple District Global Membership Team under the Multiple District 25 appointed Three Year Coordinator. At the expiration of the term of the Multiple District Coordinator, the State Council shall name a Lion

to serve as Three Year Multiple District Coordinator.

Section 4. The District Governors of each District shall appoint a **District** Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator for the District and the District Coordinators shall collectively serve as the Multiple District Global Service Team under the Multiple District 25 appointed Three Year Coordinator. At the expiration of the term of the Multiple District Coordinator, the State Council shall name a Lion to serve as Three Year Multiple District Coordinator.

Explanation: This amendment is offered by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee based on changes at Lions Clubs International's reorganization of the Multiple District Global Action Team. This Amendment strikes "three" from the description of the term which Lions Clubs International reduced to a one-year appointment. This is a housekeeping item to bring our By-Laws up-to-date with Lions Clubs International.

#### AMENDMENT #3 CONSTITUTION **ARTICLE XIII** Sections 5, 6, and 7

Section 5. (a) All Amendments must be received from the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, by the State Council of Governors, no later than one week before the 3rd Council meeting. The State Council of Governors will review all amendments that have been properly submitted under Sections 2 and 3 of this Article, and will see that the requirements of the Committee's review under Section 3 of this Article have been met and that all properly submitted and reviewed proposed amendments will be published in the State Lions newspaper and listed on the ballot at the State Convention.

(b) If a proposed amendment conflicts with the International Constitution and By-laws, it will be returned to the person submitting it and not accepted until said conflict has been corrected.

Section 6. Proposed amend-ments shall be presented to the members of the Lions Clubs of Indiana at least thirty (30) days prior to the State Convention by publication in the February issue of the Multiple District Newsletter. Alternative publications options, if needed, include the February issue of each District Governor's District Newsletter, or a mass mailing (or emailing). Amendments will also be available on the Lions of Indiana, Inc. website by February 28. Upon request, any Indiana Lion may receive a printed copy from the State Office after February 28th.

Section 7. All proposals for amendments shall be numbered when published in the State Newspaper, and such proposals will be presented to the delegates at the State Convention by paper ballot bearing the published number and a short title or digest to identify the proposal. Any title or digest used on the ballot will be prepared in advance by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for the use of the Nominations and Elections Committee. Voting on the proposed amendments shall be on the last day of the Convention during regular voting hours. No amendments will be accepted or considered from the floor.

Explanation: Amendment #3 proposed by the Washington Township Lions Club and clarified by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee modifies Article XIII, Sections 5, 6, and 7 of the Constitution. This amendment is being offered for the sole purpose of providing more flexibility in notifying the Lions of Indiana of proposed amendments should an unforeseen problem with the publication of the "Hoosier Lion" occur.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues by \$3 effective July 2021, raising dues to \$46, then adjusted annually for U.S. inflation thereafter. We will use a three-year inflation average not to exceed 3% or be lower than 1.5%.

#### Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 48,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, international meetings, language services, technology, foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as a new online learning platform, development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.

### Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy, and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see.

We need you to help our members and leaders understand why this adjustment is needed. We have developed an international dues adjustment FAQ and PPT to help you present it to your Lions.

I hope that you will see this adjustment as we do: as an investment in the future of Lions. Through your support, we can ensure that Lions are positioned for success in the future.

How are your club's finances set up? Do you have two funds an administrative fund and a project or activities fund - as required by Lions Clubs International?

Administrative funds are used for the day-to-day operations of the club:

· Printing and mailing newsletters

· Stationery and postage for the president, secretary, and treasurer

- · Meals for guests
- Speaker gifts

· Sending members to conventions and district meetings • Paying dues

• Any other day-do-day operation expenses

Monies in this fund can be generated through dues collection, donations from club members, tail twisting, and fundraising events such as a 50/50 raffle or silent or live auction held at club meetings. Raising funds for the administrative funds can be fun and entertaining. Be creative!

www.lionsclubs.org, click on "Resources for Members," then "Legal." You will then scroll to "Standard Form Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws," download that document, and save it to your computer.

Each club was chartered by, and is under the jurisdiction of, The International Association of Lions Clubs and must abide by that Constitution and By-Laws, which states:

Article VIII - Board of Directors, Section 3, (g):

"It shall not authorize, nor permit, the expenditure, for any administrative purpose, of the net income of projects or activities of this club by which funds are raised from the public."

Section 3, (h):

"It shall maintain at least two (2) separate funds governed by generally accepted accounting practices. The first fund shall be established to record administrative monies such as dues, tail twisting fines, and other internally raised club funds.

"A second fund shall be established to record activity or public funds raised by asking support from the public. Disbursement from such funds shall be in strict compliance with Section (g) of this article." This money can only be spent on service projects. It cannot be used for the general operation of a Lions club or for paying district, state, or international dues. Some Lions have the misconception that 10% of the net proceeds from a public fundraiser can be used for administrative expenses. That is not true!

It is permissible, but not necessary, for a club to have two separate bank accounts. All funds may be deposited in and drawn from one account, as long as the club treasurer keeps accurate and separate records for each fund. Each club should have a current copy of the "Standard Form Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws."

# Hearing loss and you

#### Part I

Hearing loss is a problem for many people! In fact, it is number three on the disability list, affecting 20-30% of all people between ages of 20 and 55. Beyond 55 the percentage affected by hearing loss increases dramatically. Major problems associated with hearing loss include poor communication with family and friends, poor prospects for education and employment, invisibility, and even depression. Reasons given for not addressing hearing loss are: lack of knowledge ("I hear perfectly well"), financial concerns ("Hearing aids cost too blamed much"), and social stigma, ("I don't want anyone to know that I can't hear").

As Lions we try to help others connect to the world by helping them with connective services such as eyeglasses and hearing aids. That is who we are - We Serve. But wait. What if "them" are, in fact, "us"? What better way to recruit ambassadors for our programs than to help our own?

Hearing loss could be a reason why some Lions no longer attend meetings. Being unable to understand what is being said may cause embarrassment, particularly if the listener misunderstands what was said and then voices an opinion unrelated to the topic of conversation. I have had that experience - and it is not fun.

The result of such a negative hearing experience may be invisibility, where a person withdraws from social contact, becomes a recluse, and is essentially lost to society. Helen Keller said, "Vision connects us to things. Hearing connects us to people." If you cannot hear, you are disconnected.

At least three steps are required to address hearing loss: first, identify the problem; second, diagnose the extent and cause of the problem; and finally, treat the condition as needed.

In my next article I will describe screening as the first step and discuss how it differs from diagnosis. Then there will be a paragraph on diagnosis, and finally some information on treatments.

You are most welcome to contact me at any time by email or telephone.

#### Part II

The three steps required to address hearing loss are: first, determine that hearing loss exists; second, diagnose the extent and cause of hearing loss; and finally, treat the hearing loss

Identifying hearing loss may be called screening, and frequently there is no formal procedure at all. Your wife, children, or someone close to you may tell you directly that you "flat-out" have a hearing problem. Others may say you frequently ask them to repeat what has been said. You may turn up the TV or stereo volume such that it bothers others. You respond to questions or comments inappropriately. Your thought may be: "It's not my problem. If you would just speak up and stop talking like you've got a mouth full of gravel, I could understand you quite well." That may earn you a laugh or two, but it may be the embarrassment that convinces you to get a "nonbiased" opinion.


Denial doesn't work. It's just the first step in the five stages of hearing loss. These steps include

• Denial. "It's not my problem"; anger that others don't share your opinion, resulting in a loss of friends.

• Bargaining. Praying to hear a grandchild or understand the preacher.

· Depression. Realizing that your friends are leaving and your prayers have not yet been answered.

· Finally, acceptance. Understanding that you have hearing loss and vowing to use every tool available to hear as well as possible.



On average it takes an individual five to seven years to move through these stages. Getting an opinion about your hearing from someone you trust is the beginning of acceptance. Make no mistake! Acceptance will not necessarily improve your hearing. However, it will improve your attitude, and allow people to start liking you again.

Screening may be done by a physician, an audiologist, or virtually anyone who has access to appropriate equipment. One device used is the Ero-Scan, which depends upon auditory acoustic emissions. It requires no responses from the individual, which makes it effective for all ages. An "earbud" delivers a calibrated tone to the ear, which triggers a response from hair cells in the cochlea. Hair cells respond to this tone, and if a response is not detected, the tone was not "heard.'

Remember, hearing screening suggests only that a hearing problem exists. It should nudge you to seek professional help, to determine if your hearing loss is caused by congestion from a cold, wax in the ear, ossification of bones in the middle ear, loss of hair cells in the cochlea, a tumor on the 8th cranial nerve, or something else. These conditions should be treated by a specialist.

Remember, screening is focused on identifying a problem and motivating an individual to address that problem. Diagnosis is left to a professional clinician such as an ENT, otologist, or audiologist.

We will explore some treatments for hearing loss next time.


