A registration form is printed on the back page in this issue of The Hoosier Lion.


Keynote Speaker

Districts have teamed up and the rooms will be hosted as follows: Districts A & D; Districts C & G; Districts B & E, and host District F.


Saturday night's hospitality rooms are scheduled to open at 9:15 p.m. or, if the All-State Banquet runs long, 15 minutes after it ends.

2021 State Convention Constitution and Bylaws proposed changes

Note: The following amendments will be presented, each on a separate ballot, for a "YES" or "NO" vote, at the State Conven-

> AMENDMENT #1 CONSTITUTION ARTICLE V, SECTION 1 **State Council**

Article V, Section 1: The State Council shall be composed of the District Governors and one (1) immediate current or Past District Governor who shall serve as Council Chairperson.

> AMENDMENT #2: **BY-LAWS** ARTICLE XII **State Committees**

Section 2. The District Governors of each District shall appoint a **District** Global Leadership Team (GLT) Coordinator for the District and the District Coordinators shall collectively serve as the Multiple District Global Leadership Team under the Multiple District 25 appointed Three Year Coordinator. At the expiration of the term of the Multiple District Coordinator, the State Council shall name a Lion to serve as Three Year Multiple District Coordinator.

Section 3. The District Governors of each District shall appoint a **District** Global Membership Team (GMT) Coordinator for the District and the District Coordinators shall collectively serve as the Multiple District Global Membership Team under the Multiple District 25 appointed Three Year Coordinator. At the expiration of the term of the Multiple District Coordinator, the State Council shall name a Lion to serve as Three Year Multiple District Coordinator.

Section 4. The District Governors of each District shall appoint a <u>District</u> Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator for the District and the District Coordinators shall collectively serve as the Multiple District Global Service Team under the Multiple District 25 appointed Three Year Coordinator. At the expiration of the term of the Multiple District Coordinator, the State Council shall name a Lion to serve as Three Year Multiple District Coordinator.

Explanation: This Amendment is offered by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee based on changes at Lions Clubs International's reorganization of the Multiple District Global Action Team. This Amendment strikes "three" from the description of the term which Lions Clubs International reduced to a one-year appointment. This is a housekeeping item to bring our By-Laws up-to-date with Lions Clubs International.

AMENDMENT #3 CONSTITUTION ARTICLE XIII Sections 5, 6, and 7

Section 5. (a) All Amendments must be received from the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, by the State Council of Governors, no later than one week before the 3rd Council meeting. The State Council of Governors will review all amendments that have been properly submitted under Sections 2 and 3 of this Article, and will see that the requirements of the Committee's review under Section 3 of this Article have been met and that all properly submitted and reviewed proposed amendments will be published in the State Lions newspaper and listed on the ballot at the State Convention.

(b) If a proposed amendment conflicts with the International Constitution and By-laws, it will be returned to the person submitting it and not accepted until said conflict has been corrected.

Section 6. Proposed amendments shall be presented to the members of the Lions Clubs of Indiana at least thirty (30) days prior to the State Convention by publication in the February issue

of the Multiple District Newsletter. Alternative publications options, if needed, include in each District Governor's District Newsletter, or a mass mailing (or emailing). Amendments will also be available on the Lions of Indiana, Inc. website by February 28. Upon request, any Indiana Lion may receive a printed copy from the State Office after February 28th.

Section 7. All proposals for amendments shall be numbered when published in the State Newspaper, and such proposals will be presented to the delegates at the State Convention by paper ballot bearing the published number and a short title or digest to identify the proposal. Any title or digest used on the ballot will be prepared in advance by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for the use of the Nominations and Elections Committee. Voting on the proposed amendments shall be on the last day of the Convention during regular voting hours. No amendments will be accepted or considered from the

AMENDMENT #4 CONSTITUTION ARTICLE IV, SECTION 2 STATE COUNCIL

Article IV, Section 2. The State Council shall reimburse any Lion, from the Administration Fund, when a voucher is submitted for round trip mileage expense to a State Council meeting at which the Lion is invited requested for consultation or for giving a special report as requested by the Council Chair or the Council. The Council chair shall make the request to the Lion by letter or email. Such reimbursement to be made pursuant to the Rules of Audit of the International Association of Lions Clubs.

Explanation: At the October Council meeting, a Lion who is the Chair of a State project attended the Council meeting and submitted a voucher request for payment of round-trip mileage of \$151. The Chair of the State project made a written report on the State project and sent it to the Administrative Secretary to be included in the summary of reports. When the Council Chair called for the report of the State project, the Chair went to the microphone and gave less than a two-minute presentation extolling the work of the predecessor Chair of the project.

In MD 25, there are five (5) State projects, the Indiana Lions Foundation, and 32 Standing Committees. If each Chair of the State projects, Foundation, and the 32 Standing Committees decided to submit a request for payment of round-trip mileage, say at an average of \$100, it could cause a payment of nearly \$4,000 from the Lions Administration Fund. There is reserve money in the Administration Fund because the state dues were raised by \$3.00 in 2011. The reserve funds will eventually all be budgeted for administrative expenses. When reserves reach a level of one year's expenses, it will be time for an increase in state dues.

The original intent of the bylaw was to reimburse a Lion who is summoned to appear before the Council for consultation or to give a special report.

Back to basics – because they world

Regularly, the Committee will provide information regarding all things technical that will help you remain safe, secure, and knowledgeable about the devices and platforms you use. Feel free to suggest subjects to your District Chair that you would like covered in future newsletters.

Feel helpless out in the World Wide Web? There is a lot of information, but you can do it.

Start the New Year with new security to beat back those hackers and trolls!

During recent months, there have been an increasing number of phone, text, social media, and e-mail scams. Be aware of scams that fraudulently use your local Club, the Lions Clubs International (LCI), or Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) name or logo, or other trusted and well-known names. The goal of these types of scams is to trick people into revealing personal and financial information about themselves, which can then be used to commit identity theft. If you receive a suspicious e-mail, text, check, or social media message, please follow these guide-

- Do not reply, open, or click on any attachments or links in the message.
- · Be wary of any offer to accept a check or money order in an amount greater than you are owed or requests to return money back to the check sender.
- · Do not immediately cash an unexpected or surprise check. Unless you are expecting a check, and you are absolutely certain it is meant for you, do not deposit
- Do not pay up front for a promise like a grant, debt relief, or financial assistance.

Please delete the suspicious

message and do not respond. If you wish, you may report this to local authorities in your jurisdiction for further investigation. Examples include:

- 1. Texts and Facebook notices that you have received a grant, but first need to provide personal data. LCIF does not give money to individuals.
- 2. Unexpected checks from Lions and/or LCIF that look legitimate, including correct routing numbers.
- 3. E-mails or messages from individuals you know saying they are in distress and need you to send money.
- 4. Phone calls from perpetrators posing as Lions or staff, asking for donations via phone.

Unfortunately, if you lose money in a scam, notify your bank immediately and see if they can help. Protect yourself!

- If someone contacts you via phone, text, social media, or email, no matter how legitimate he or she may seem, never give out personal information such as passwords; Social Security numbers; national ID, credit card, or bank account numbers; or driver's license or passport num-
- As a general practice, when receiving unsolicited e-mails, do not follow embedded links in emails, especially if there is any mention of updating credit card information, personal data, PIN numbers, or passwords. Delete these e-mails immediately.
- If you should be redirected to a website, verify that the URL address begins with "https://." The single letter "S" after "http" indicates that it is a secure site and is likely legitimate. If the URL is not secure, close your browser immediately.
- · If contacted by another Club Member or the Association Headquarters via e-mail, mobile text message, or social media, and there is a request for financial assistance, wire transfer, etc., do not reply to the message. Contact the Club Member or Association

staff separately via e-mail, phone, or through the MyLCI Communications Center to validate that the request is legiti-

- Always use virus protection software on your PC or MAC. (Avast, McAfee, Norton, Kaspersky, and BitDefender are a few you can choose from).
- Exercise caution when using public Wi-Fi systems in a coffeehouse, restaurant, or internet café. These public systems offer no protection from unauthorized fraudulent monitoring.
- Create strong passwords for your e-mail, social media, and other online accounts, and update your passwords often. Consider using a password manager such as LastPass (which is free), Dashlane, Keeper, or BitDefend-
- Never store passwords, banking information, or credit card numbers in your e-mail.
- If you receive an unexpected check, do not deposit it, but instead contact the source of the funds to confirm you were to receive the funds.
- If a person you do not know personally asks you to wire money on behalf of LCI or LCIF, contact the help desk.

Everyone Needs A Password Manager (From PC Magazine)

Nearly every website you visit, from dating apps to hyper-secure banking sites, insists you create a user account and think up a password. The human memory cannot keep up with dozens and dozens of these. Some folks get the bright idea to use the simplest possible passwords, things that are easy to remember, like "123456789" or "password." Others memorize one superbly random password and use it for everything. Either path is likely to make you the latest victim of identity theft.

Do not be like them — use a password manager. With a password manager, you do not have to remember that strong, unique password for every website. The password manager stores them for you and even helps you generate new, random ones. We have tested and analyzed dozens, so you can pick the password manager that best fits your needs. Not happy with your initial choice? Do not worry. Most services allow you to export your saved data or import from other products, easing the process of switching password managers.

All the products in this roundup earned at least 3 1/2 stars and all of them cost money (though you can use some of them for free if

you accept certain limitations). Most of the free tools lack the most advanced features, but they get the job done. Whether free or paid, a password manager is something everybody needs.

Secure Your Passwords On **Every Platform**

When you sign up for a password manager, one of the first things you need to do is create a master password for your account. Your master password is used to encrypt the contents of your password vault, so you should make it something difficult for anyone else to guess or find out. However, it cannot be so random that you forget it; your master password is likely unrecoverable if you do. PC Magazine offers tips on creating secure, complicated passwords for guid-

Operation KidSight Camera LCIF grant approval

Early last year our KidSight Committee saw the need to purchase additional KidSight screening equipment (cameras) to replace the old SR9 cameras. Our Vision First Indiana Lions Eye Bank Board of Directors approved that request to purchase 7 new cameras to be loaned out to each one of our Districts.

Vision First Indiana Lions Eye Bank had applied for a matching grant from LCIF through the Multiple District Council of Governors to help us purchase these

cameras. I am happy to report that our grant has approved.

This new camera has been approved by the FDA with a 97.9% accuracy rating. The company Rebion has provided a BLINQ camera to our KidSight medical director Dr. Daniel Neeley, MD.

Dr. Neeley has given us positive feedback during his use of the camera so far and he will inform us of his findings after further evaluating this new technology.

We are looking forward to getting back to a normal routine so the Lions of Indiana can start vision screening our children

set up. There are several free email providers that offer basic services to send and receive emails. Usually there are just a few steps to complete and your personal e-mail account is ready to use. If you need assistance, usually help is available from the e-mail provider.

Make sure you notify your Club Secretary about any changes with your e-mail address so your Club and LCI has your correct email address on record.

Here are a few tips you might want to remember to keep your account and personal information safe when using your e-mail account

- Make sure your passwords are unique and strong passwords that do not include any personal information and try to avoid dictionary words and common phrases. Many email providers recommend a mix of lower and uppercase letters, numbers, and symbols. In addition, never use the same password for more than one account.
- Use anti-malware software and other protective tools. Be sure your computer has some sort of trusted security software installed and set it to automatically update so you are protected against the latest risks. Ask an expert or trusted tech-savvy person if you are unsure what to install.
- Do not download unknown attachments and software. Never download documents, images, or software if you do not know and trust the source. Scammers and hackers will often disguise viruses and other malware

as "free" software tools or interesting content to download.

- Consider authorizing a trusted friend or family member to access your accounts. In case of emergency, it can be difficult or impossible for trusted friends and family to access online email, bank, and file storage accounts. Plan and work with an attorney to authorize someone
- you trust to access your accounts. • Understand "spam" filters. Spam refers to unwanted, unsolicited e-mails. Most e-mail providers have spam filters that remove these e-mails from your main inbox.
- Know the signs of a scam. If it is too good to be true, it usually is. Offers of low-priced or free big-ticket items such as vacations, electronics, and medicines are usually scam attempts. On the other hand, scammers will sometimes send you requests for money from friends' personal accounts; never reply or send funds without first verifying the request with the person in some other way.
- Understand and avoid phishing attempts. Be wary of links to sites that ask you to make a purchase or enter your payment information. One common scam, "phishing," makes a phony site look like a trusted site, then gives your information to the scammer. Look for grammatical errors, spelling mistakes, and URLs that look different from what you are used to. When in doubt, enter the web address you know to be correct directly into the URL bar.
