Check with your local library to find out what volunteer help they could use with adult education programs or the children's department. It could be as simple as reading with an adult or child. Your local library will be able to help you select a variety of choices that might interest your club. Invite someone from the library's staff to a club meeting so your members can learn about these volunteer opportunities. The library could also direct you to other possible areas in the community where volunteers are needed for literacy programs.

The United Way in your community may also be able to help you learn about different volunteer needs in the area of literacy.

Teachers, pastors/priests, local colleges or universities are also a great source of information in finding a volunteer literacy project

will be in need of someone to take over this project and learn from Lion Greg. would like to thank DGE Al





except for "promoting" what we





A couple of states we visited twice. International Board Meetings were held in Arizona and Prague the first year, then Savannah, Ga., and Budapest the second year. Since the Public Relations Committee was addressing issues

with the Lions Magazine, and we were only 40 minutes from Augsburg, Germany, where The Lions Magazine Editor's Conference was being held, I also attended that conference.

Why did we travel out of the country? Because we ARE an International organization with a total of 34 board members. If the board meetings are always in the U.S., the Asian and European Directors must fly here...it's a long trip. It's only fair that the 14 (soon to be 11) U.S. Directors should also fly the long flights to get to a board meeting. (Next year the board meetings will be held in Nashville, Tenn., and Greece.)

Some Lions ask why meetings can't be held at Headquarters in Oakbrook, Ill. Some are, but it's all about trying to even out the travel distance for everyone -

not just the U.S. Directors. Flying today is stressful; it is not the easiest mode of transportation anymore! Just check out my Facebook page.

I can honestly say every director has a passion for Lionism. Conducting the business of an International organization is more involved than most know. Decisions must be made that some Lions may not like, or understand. But after reflection, we can only hope Lions will agree that the actions taken were for the benefit of all.

My two-year term as one of the 34 International Directors in the world may be ending...but my love of Lions is NOT ending. Thank you for allowing me to represent you. I will continue to assist wherever I can and to honor our motto of SERVE."




