
Leadership leads to people promoting service, and people seeing how the Lions serve leads to Membership. It works. Believe and achieve.


Good News!

Cox Cemetery Restoration Update

A recent work session resulted in a number of bases being reset and some headstones mounted. It is beginning to look like a ceme-

There are a greater number of stones, and as we find them, we stabilize and level the base, then mount the headstones if we can find them (some have been buried). There are also a number of headstones lying flat on the ground. These are broken and need repair before they can be mounted.

Every base has a crevice. The headstone is mounted down into the crevice without mortar and is held there by gravity only. The depth is about 2.5 inches. If the headstone is broken off right at the top of the crevice, that leaves a stone "plug" that will have to be chiseled out before the headstone can be mounted. Because of the angle at the bottom, the headstone will have to be made square or the headstone will lean.

One base was buried about

12 inches deep. It was resurrected, cleaned up, reset, leveled and stabilized. The headstone, slightly buried about four feet away, was then remounted.

The headstones were cleaned with a special solution. They sparkled and looked like new.

The work on Cox Cemetery con-

The cost is \$15 per person.



The Information and Technology Committee for the Indiana Lions is composed of a representative from each District. Regularly, the Committee will provide information regarding all things technical that will help you remain safe, secure, and knowledgeable about the devices and platforms you use.

Part 1: What is a domain name, and why does my Club/District need one?

A domain name is an important component of any modern-day Club/District, especially in this new digital age.

A domain name is something used by a Club/District to identify your website. Even if you have free Club/District website through Lions Club International, your custom domain name helps to identify your Club/District and, when chosen correctly, will be easy to use in your Club/District marketing materials.

In order to obtain a domain name for your Club/District. you must purchase your domain name from an authorized Domain Name Register. There are many companies out there, but we strongly suggest using one of the popular and longstanding registrars: Domain.com (www.domain.com); GoDaddy (www.godaddy.com); or Network Solutions (www.networkso-

Purchasing a domain name is an annual purchase, although many registrars offer a multi-

lutions.com).

year purchase option. The price of a domain name will vary slightly from registrar to registrar, but on average the cost will be between \$7 to \$15 per year.

The best type of domain to purchase is always one with a .com extension, but in the case of a Lions Club/District, a .org extension is also a good selection.

Once your Club/District has decided on which registrar to use and has selected a domain name that best fits your local Club/District, it's time to set everything up properly.

Part 2: Setting up your domain registrar account

 $\bar{\text{Now}}$ that your Club or District has selected and purchased a domain name, it's important to set up the domain name and account correctly. When setting up an account with a registrar and registering your domain name, you will need to provide three points of contact: Owner. Admin, and Technical.

You should always list your Lions Club/District under the Owner section. This is very important, as it identifies with the registrar who actually owns that domain name. Never change that or give it to someone else who may manage your website; it is the key to your account and vou need control of it.

The Admin point of contact is primarily the contact the registrar will use to contact you in the event of an outdated credit card or other billing or administrative

The Technical contact is exactly what it sounds like: the person who can be contacted with technical questions. You may choose to put your Club or District IT Chairperson as the Technical contact for your domain name.

You should also set up your account for automatic renewal, so each year, when the domain name is set to renew, it will automatically be charged and renewed with no down time for your website. Make it a part of your annual procedures to log into your account and make sure all three contacts are accurate and up to date. Someone on that list may have left the organization, changed their e-mail or phone number, etc., and it's important to keep those contact names and information current.

In addition, be sure to write down the login information for your registrar account and keep

(Continued from page 6) that information in a secure place and known to your Club/District Officers

Now it's time to make your domain name work for your Club/District.

Part 3: Making my domain name work for my Club or Dis-

Now that your Club or District has purchased and set up an account with a reputable registrar, it's time to put that domain to work.

You will need to "point" your domain name to the server that hosts your Club or District website. For example, if your Club or District has a free e-Club website provided by Lions Clubs International, you can "point" your domain name to that e-Club website. What that means is when someone types in your domain name, it will redirect them to your e-Club

website automatically.

In order to set that up, you need to modify the Domain Name Server (DNS) settings for your domain at the registrar. As this is a little more technical procedure, it's best for you to get some assistance from your Club or District IT Chairperson. Once this is set up the first time, it will never have to be done again.

Be sure to also use your new domain name in the marketing materials used by your Club or

District. For example, if you have a flyer or brochure that your Club or District uses on a regular basis, be sure to feature your website address (domain name)

prominently on that document. In addition, as your Club or District sends out letters, make sure that your domain name appears in the header or footer section of every letter you send out. These will help others see your domain name and point them to your website to learn more about what activities and events your Club/District is involved in.

If your Club or District doesn't currently have a website, consider starting a free website through Lions Club International. Clubs can sign up at https://e-clubhouse.org/index.php and Districts can sign up at http://edistrict.org/index.php.

Remember also that your State IT Committee members are here to help with questions or concerns you may have.
