
In their "Purple Jackets" are the Indiana Lions District Governors Elect. They will become District Governors starting July 1 when they take their oaths to serve.

We would like to congratulate Council Chair Elect Bob Hrdy, the Governors Elect, the 1st Vice and 2nd Vice District Governors Elect and wish them a successful year.

Our International Convention in Boston is fast approaching. We hope many of you have registered and plan to attend. There is still time to register. As an International Convention Delegate, you will need the proper documentation and a government picture ID in order to vote.

Your club secretary can assign you as a delegate through the MYLCI website under the My Lions Club tab and then print out the "Club Delegate Confirmation." You should also receive an email from Lions International with your confirmation number. Your club must be in good standing for your members to vote!

At our 2022 International Convention in Montreal, Canada, Lions from around the world voted for an increase in dues beginning July 1, 2023. International dues will increase by \$3 on July 1, 2023, with another \$2 increase on July 1, 2024, and a \$2 increase on July 1, 2025. The last dues increase was in July of 2011.

A note from Immediate Past International President Douglas X. Alexander stated, "The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar our members contribute."

He also wrote, "A dues adjust-

ment will allow Lions International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MYLION. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum. such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership."

This past month, the Heritage Lions Club has been collecting various items needed for the Charis House in Fort Wayne. The Charis House is a unit of the Rescue Mission that helps women and children facing a homeless crisis, providing a safe haven for women and children as they recover from trauma, addiction, and self-defeating choices they have made in the past. The program provides spiritual, emotional, physical, and educational needs for these women and children.

When the Lions contacted the Charis House, they expressed some specific needs of these women as they enter the facility, as they usually bring nothing of their own. These include leggings and T-shirts, which they can wear both to sleep in and wear during the day. They also needed towels, washcloths, and personal hygiene products.

The Lions were able to purchase 50 pairs of new leggings, 75 T-shirts, 24 towels, and 36 washcloths. They also purchased several bottles of shampoo, con-







Bedford Lions complete construction of 300th ramp

Bedford Lions Club members started building wheelchair ramps in 1989, but they didn't realize how successful a project it would become. The ramp building project has not only been one of our most popular projects, it has been one of our most satisfying for members in the long history of the club.

They also didn't imagine the number of appreciative individuals they would assist and the impact the project would have on those people's lives.

In July of 1989 the Lions heard about a local woman who was confined to a wheelchair and had been able to get out of her home only once in six years. Building her a ramp would be a great World Service Day Project for the Lions to donate time and serve their community. The Lions decided to construct a wooden wheelchair ramp from her porch to the ground to improve her quality of life.

The first ramp, which was 18 feet long, was made from plywood sheets placed on wooden framing covered with carpeting and this type construction was continued until 2004, when the Lions started using 5/4 deck boards with no carpeting to cover the wooden framing and that construction continues today. There are no professional carpenters among the Lions who work on the ramps, but you couldn't tell that by the great work turned out by this caring group. In most cases they are senior citizens taking pride in aiding other senior citizens. Since that first ramp, members have now donated their time and effort in building 300 wheelchair ramps and 50 handrails of various lengths, donating more than 11,600 hours to people in need in the Bedford area. In the last 10 years the Lions ramp builders have averaged building 15 ramps per year.

ramps and the club will contribute a portion of expenses toward the required building materials from its ramp building fund, if the family is unable to afford them. Over the years the Lions ramp building fund has received assistance from various individuals, many local churches, organizations, and other grant sources in the community. Lengths of the ramps have ranged from 8 feet to 86 feet with many platforms, direction changes, and sturdy handrails. Most ramps are finished in a day with an average of six to 10 Lions working four to six hours each to complete a ramp. One 86-foot ramp built in 2015 took two days and 164 man-hours to complete. The Bedford Lions Club was honored in 2000 with a story and photo in an issue of "The Lion," the official magazine of Lions Clubs International, about their ramp building project. In addition the local club in 2002 received an award from their Lions Club District for the Lions District Most Outstanding Project and later that year was honored at the

Indiana Lions Club's State Convention with a Lions Club's State of Indiana Activities Award for the best Lions project in the state. The Bedford Lions Club were also asked to have an informational booth at the 2011 Indiana Lions Club's State Convention to guide other Lions Clubs in the state how to build wheelchair ramps in their communities. Various dedicated Lions have served as the ramp project chairmen over the years and along with present chairman Ken Brumbaugh have all done a fantastic job of living the Lions motto "We Serve." Lion Brumbaugh summarized this project very well in saying, "We all really enjoy the camaraderie of working together for someone in need. This is a great way to serve our community through the Lions Club. We all have a warm feeling in our hearts when a ramp is finished and the person we built it for uses it for the first time. That person's smile makes all the hard work worth it and gives us the incentive to help the next person in need by building another ramp."

The Lions always donate all the labor in the construction of the

Longtime eye care mission ophthalmologist speaks at Arcola Lions





(Continued from page 7) He visited Sumatra soon after the 2004 tsunami killed 280,000 people. He also visited Haiti right after their devastating 2010 earthquake killed approximately 250,000 people. He cannot return to Haiti, however, as the country is now run by gangs. He also cannot return to Myanmar (Burma) since the government was overthrown by a military coup in 2021.

"The best kind of mission work involves creating connections that build with each visit. The goal is to develop long-term and mutually beneficial relationships that improve the existing situation in an underserved location and to facilitate these changes in a sustainable way," said the medical director of an eye institute. Alcon, a global eye care corporation, has donated \$200,000 worth of supplies several times to support Dr. Purdy's overseas work. "Medical mission teams work side-by-side with local eye care professionals to provide handson training, while also helping to increase patient awareness about the need for proper eye care." (Alcon)

On his recent trip to Honduras, Dr. Purdy, Rolando Yuga of the Honduras Lions Club, and Jim Brockmann of Changing Footprints loaded a container at a Bluffton warehouse. Included in the shipment were eight donated surgical microscopes, five cataract phacoemulsification machines, an Alcon Accurus posterior vitrectomy unit, an autoclave, a YAG laser, five OR patient carts, several storage cabinets, 40 boxes of Alcon eve surgery mission supplies for Dr. Purdy's February mission, donated orthopedic surgery instruments, four complete dental office suites, and much more. The microscopes and surgical chairs were donated by hospitals updating their equipment. The dental equipment was donated by dentists who retired and dissolved their practices. There were 30,000 eyeglasses for the El Salvador Lions Club boxed and organized by the Wanatah Lions Club and the Arcola Lions Club. There were also 1,680 pairs of used shoes gathered by Jim Brockmann and his Changing Footprints group.

Dr. Purdy used his many slides to show before and after pictures of some of the thousands of eye patients he has helped. He described how he often encounters unusual deformations around the eye socket in both young children and adults, and he often must get creative to solve those problems, such as using a drill from his basement for a procedure. He told many funny stories. Once he found a vendor at an eve convention that sold generic prosthetic eyeballs for \$2 each (a "good" prosthetic eye can run \$3,000). He bought a whole bag of them in various sizes. Another time a boy was afraid to tell his mother what he had done to hurt his eye. Dr. Purdy removed several large pieces of wood from around the boy's swollen eye. Only then would the boy tell his mother he had fallen on a stick.

Helen Keller said this at the Lions Club International convention in 1925: "The opportunity I bring to you, Lions, is this ... Will vou not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you. Lions, you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind. Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?" Dr. Purdy has been living these words by his lifelong quest to improve the sight of the disadvantaged.
