The new Lions portal is still a work in progress and if you are having issues, don't wait, ASK NOW. Ask your district governor, ask your district administrator, or call or email LCI Support services. Sometimes it is a simple fix, and at other times your request may indicate a problem that programmers need to address. It is important that we not just complain,

July 1 is also the kickoff for the Kindness Matters Contest. Care-ing Cases Project keeps growing

District C Public Relations The Care-ing Cases Special Project, started by District D PDG Kathy Lozier with funding from the Indiana Lions Foundation, has taken on a life of its own.

During the State Convention in April, a group of Lions stopped by and finished off the rest of the 350 backpacks to be given to homeless shelters, domestic abuse centers, high schools, churches, and food pantries.

Each of the seven District Governors took some back home for distribution.

In a conversation with District 25E DG Glen Georges, he was explaining how different groups reach out to them for the Care-ing Cases, which are recycled eyeglass cases filled with first aid supplies and gallon-size Ziplock bags filled with hygiene products put together and placed in a black backpack.

The project is done twice a year: January and April.

The Lions of Indiana met for the 103rd Convention April 26 to 28 at the Embassy Suites Conference Center in Noblesville. Attendees who came early were able to enjoy Topgolf in Fishers, sponsored by Vision First/ Indiana Lions Eye Bank. Attendees enjoyed the manager's reception and local restaurants before attending the opening business meeting and hospitality room.

Saturday morning, the district caucuses were held and each caucus was visited by Past International President Frank Moore as well as International Director candidates PCC Reed Fish from 25F and PDG Charlie Short from 25C.

After the second business session, delegates enjoyed a luncheon with keynote speaker Katie Stam-Irk, Miss America 2009, the only Miss America from Indiana.

The nominees for the Indiana Lion Foundation Lion of the Year were announced and PDG Merl Goldman of Washington Township Lions Club in 25F was named Lion of the Year. Several Melvin Jones Fellowships from Lions Club International Foundation were also awarded, and two new members were inducted by Past International President Moore, including our new State Administrative Secretary Ann Ninness, as part of Worldwide Induction Day.

Saturday afternoon, delegates enjoyed a number of educational sessions, including Harnessing Leadership by Lion Beth Slade of Leader Dogs for the Blind; the Global Membership Approach for clubs by Lion Jeff Kozicki, 25D Global Membership Coordinator; Charity Gaming Rules by Mark Mason of the Indiana State Gaming Commission; Parliamentary Procedure by Past District Governor Patrick Rodriguez, and LCIF Legacy Giving by Robert Kanonik of Lions Clubs International Foundation. Following those sessions, Lion Angela Mounsey of the Van Buren Lions Club led the Strides for Diabetes Walk around the Embassy Suites. Saturday night was the All-State Banquet, with a keynote from Past International President Frank Moore and the presentation of the Presidential Award and International President's Leadership award to members of each of the seven Indiana districts.
