## Helen Keller to be keynote speaker at Mid Winter confab


Most Lions can recall Helen Keller's speech at the 1925 International Convention when she challenged the Lions to be Knights of the Blind. But, many don't know Helen's story. Indiana Lions will have the opportunity to learn about Helen at the 2019 Mid Winter Conference, Jan. 11-12 in Indianapolis. Jessica Michan (Helen) will be the keynote speaker on Saturday.

In the late 19th century a little girl struggled out of the depths of fear. At the age of 2, Helen experienced a life-threatening illness. She was plunged into a dark, silent world. Anne Sullivan, a determined young teacher, would find the key to unlock Helen's prison. Through Anne's diligence and perseverance, Helen would become a world-renowned speaker and advocate for the disabled.

This program, originally commissioned by the Lion's Club International, Northern Illinois Division, begins with the blind and deaf Helen being led to the podium where she recites excerpts from the 1925 speech given at the International Lion's Convention. The program continues in third person as Michna will tell the Lions about Helen's life and experiences.

Michna, recipient of the Presidential Service Center's Distinguished Service Award, has become widely known for her riveting portrayals of First Ladies, notable women of history and fictitious characters. She has entertained groups throughout America including guests from as far away as New Zealand, Japan and Brazil. Audiences ranging from young children to senior citizens have been equally enthralled. She has had the honor of performing at the National Churchill Memorial, Lincoln Boyhood National Monument and other esteemed venues. She has appeared before historical societies, schools, libraries, living history museums, senior centers, churches, and has been guest hostess at parties and weddings.

Michna's performances are compelling and emotionally enthralling. Audiences laugh along with her humorous anec-(Continued on page 11)

#### Lions' Cancer Control is life-giving cancer care!

It is hard to believe the amazing number of changes that have occurred in cancer care, as a result of the efforts of the Lions of Indiana. PDG Walter Shirley, founder of the project, envisioned help for those battling cancer. In 1946, he, and the Lions Clubs of Indiana developed and agreed to support the first state project in Multiple District 25. This dynamic project changed the curative course of cancer care here in Indiana, and around the world.

Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana gifted the first treatment machine in 1947 to the Indiana University School of Medicine. In the first 10 years, the Lions Cancer Control purchased four major pieces of treatment equipment. For 72 continuous years of service; millions of dollars have been raised, numerous treatment machines donated, research funded, cancer education granted; and the Lions of Indiana have saved lives and improved the technology of radiation therapy.

Many Senior Lions will remember treatment machines like the Sagittaire Linear Accelerator, Hyperthermia Unit, Microtron M22, and the Moving Treatment Table. Even more of you, remember the Gamma Knife, Stereotactic Body Frame and the Survivorship Endowment. Very recently, the fund purchased cancer research equipment and began working on the 3D Printing Research Project.


But the Lion's Cancer Control Fund is much more than just purchasing improved cancer treatment machines, or the good created by the proceeds from a Survivorship Endowment. This amazing State Project is life-giving cancer care, for patients who were once-lost from nearly all of its' diseases.

This project is also about patient awareness, early diagnosis and curative outcomes. The numbers don't lie. 2018 statistics demonstrate that of all diagnosed cancers, in all stages, 68 percent of patients will survive and experience a complete recovery from these numerous diseases called

cancer. But these are not just numbers; they are people with lives that matter.

Samuel, a 67 year-old, husband, father of four, grandfather of six, had tumors directly under the skin covering his skull. His treatment required very shallow beams of radiation, which should not permeate the bones of his skull. He heard about IU Radiation Oncology's, 3D treatments



#### LaPorte Lions provide wheelchair lift

A chance meeting this spring between two former classmates has led to a lifechanging difference in the situation of one of them. John Straub, a member of La Porte Lions Club, met a man he went to school with years ago, at LaPorte Hospital. His classmate has Huntington's disease, and to preserve his and his wife's privacy, they will be referred to " and "Jill" in this arti

Huntington's is a fatal genetic disorder that causes breakdown of nerve cells in the brain. It deteriorates a person's physical and mental abilities and there is no

Jill told Straub that she had to depend on others to help her get Jack out of the house for doctor's appointments. There are three concrete steps from their kitchen to an enclosed back porch, and three steps at the front. She could not get Jack's wheelchair down the steps alone.

Straub knew of a lift that had been installed at a rental apartment for a veteran, who had since moved. He contacted the landlord, who said if someone else needed it, Straub could take it.

Straub brought the project to LaPorte Lions, who approved paying for a contractor to move the lift, build a platform at Jack and Jill's back door, and install the lift there. John Lingle, of Lingle and Sons, Contractors, was hired to do the job. "He was wonderful," Jill said. "He had to take the lift apart to get it into the porch, and when it wouldn't work, he knew what the problem was, but couldn't get a needed part. "We were happy to help," said a representative of Lingle and

That's where Doug Moore, of Scooter Warehouse in South Bend, came in. He brought the part and got the lift operating. He was president of the South Bend Lions Club, and he never sent LaPorte Lions a bill for his services. "It just seemed like the right thing to do," he said.

That epitomizes the Lions' motto, "We Serve."

"It's so much safer," Jill said. "If we'd had a fire, I couldn't have gotten Jack out of the house. Now, I don't have to depend on having someone else help me get him outside."

It turns out that Jill knows Straub's wife, Linda, and past president of LaPorte Lions, Paul Marsh's wife, Gail, from when she worked at the VNA.

"I'm just so grateful to La Porte Lions," Jill said. "This has changed our lives."





Another traditional service project, which is in the Hunger initiative, is giving food baskets at the holidays. Sometimes, Clubs sponsor food drives for local pantries. Supplying food to persons suffering a major illness is another possibility.

The Environment has been one focus of this year's International President. Do you know that she and her family have 4,000 trees? We cannot all plant 4,000 trees, but we can plant one or more. Some communities have a house like the Ronald McDonald house that could use regular meals brought in. Even supplying a meal for one day makes a difference. Your Club can help fund research through LCIF. Local assistance to famicer are helpful.



A medical treatment device, or bolus, was custom-crafted on the 3D printer that Lions Cancer Control purchased. This device was printed specifically for him from images acquired from a CT scan, so that a conformal, reproducible, shallow beam could be used to treat his tumors.

Samuel completed his treatments and was the first patient in the world to be treated with such devices. His treatment was extremely successful! Yes, the Lions of Indiana have once again provided a unique treatment solution. They have purchased the tools necessary to provide a better way of treating certain cancer patients. These 3D treatments create more accuracy where shallow treatments are required, are cost effective, custom-made on a timely basis, so there is no treatment delay and covered by

And, then there is Rebecca. She is a beautiful, little four-year old girl who had a tumor very near her chest wall. She is a cancer patient at Riley Children's Hospital. But Riley brings all of the radiation patients to IU Radiation Oncology for treatment because they do not have any treatment

In evaluating the shallow location of Rebecca's lung tumor, it was determined that a custom bolus would serve her situation very well. Once a CT scan was completed, the device was printed the following day, and her treatments began in three days. She has since completed her treatments. When she returns for her follow-up appointments, she runs up and down the halls, here in the department, (when she's not playing with her favorite baby-doll.) I can barely describe the joy I feel, and what it means to hear those precious foot-steps. All she knows, is that she feels good. Her mother and father feel grateful beyond words!



#### New hotel and conference center


