

Hello Lions!

I hope you all enjoyed the gathering of family and friends for the Christmas and New Year's holidays! This is the second part of my article on the "**Signs and Symptoms of a Debilitating and Weak Club**". In this Article I will discuss the last nine signs.



The seventh sign was "**No Programs at Club Meetings**". A program is the easiest way to bring new ideas to a club. A program does not have to be Lions related. The local police can discuss a problem in the community, the fire department can demonstrate new equipment, or a Boy Scout can discuss his planned Eagle Scout project. Anything in your community can become a program. Make sure the speakers know the amount of time they have for their presentation. If a club only meets once a month, there may be too much on the agenda for a presentation to be more than just a few minutes. My club meets once a month and most of our agendas would allow for a 10 to 15 minute presentation.

The eighth sign was "**No meeting agenda used**". Without an agenda, how do the members know what is being planned or discussed? When I joined the Petersburg Lions, we never had an agenda and the meetings routinely lasted 90 minutes or more. Now that we have an agenda and generally stick to it, the meetings are usually an hour or less.

The ninth sign was "**Aging Membership**". I hate to say it, but we are getting older. Clubs need to routinely recruit new 'younger' members. Ideally it is easier to relate to and invite a potential member that is no more than 10 years young than the inviter.

The tenth sign was "**No Membership Drive**". A club needs to recruit new members for new ideas, fresh man-power, etc. If a club is not holding a membership drive every 5 years or so, how does it plan to replace members who move, get too unhealthy to continue or those who pass away?

The eleventh sign was "**Inadequate meeting facility (food)**". We all know the best way to get Lions at our meetings is to have good food. But think about the meeting place itself. If the room is routinely too hot or cold, members will stop coming. If the air handler makes so much noise members can't hear the speaker, the facility may not work. No one wants to attend a meeting where they are uncomfortable.

The twelfth sign was “**Little or Poor Tail Twisting**”. Not everyone is a good tail twister, but someone should be doing something at the meetings to help keep things moving along or to break up items that are bogging down the meeting. A quick joke or riddle, getting up and stretching, or anything to reset the mood of the meeting. Fines for ringing phones does not hurt the club’s treasury any either.

The thirteenth and fourteenth signs were “**Unpaid Dues**” and “**Unpaid Balance to LCI**”. I felt these are related somewhat. If the club’s dues or other balances are unpaid to LCI, the club can be suspended by LCI after 120 days. A suspended club has no rights per LCI until the club has been restored to good standing. Also, LCI now requires that a club’s dues be paid a minimum of 15 days prior to any election if the club wants to participate in the election. No Lion wants to go to a District or State Convention planning to vote in the elections and be told, “Sorry, Your club’s dues are not paid and you are not allowed to vote.”

The final sign was “**Monthly Membership and Activity Reports are not current**”. These reports are so important for so many reasons that I am not going to list them all. The **MMR** is how the District and LCI can tell if the membership level of the club has changed and your dues are based on this report. An equally important and often overlooked report is the **Monthly Activity Report**. The Activity report helps LCI track hours and dollars donated to the communities. It also helps the District Governor Team to know what the clubs are doing. It is really hard for the DG Team to know if the club is doing anything if these reports are not completed. A club could have closed the doors and no one would know if no one completes these reports. Or on the other hand, the club could be doing a different service project every week and gaining members. The DG Team would have no way of knowing. Also, the club not meeting is the only excuse for there to be no activities reported.

Please take these 15 items and review them with your club in mind. If any of them describes your club, your club may want to take steps to fix any issues and don’t be afraid to ask the district for help. Remember, the District is here for the Clubs.

Happy New Year Fellow Lions:

We are at the halfway mark in this Lions year. It is time to look back and take stock of where we are and where we should go.

Where are we now? In membership, the District is negative 24 members. As far as numbers of Clubs, we have stayed neutral at 65. Unfortunately, membership numbers continue to decline, but some progress is being made adding members to offset those who have left us. Reporting frequency continues to be a problem for our Clubs this year. Both MR's and AR's are not being turned in on time or at all. We had hoped reporting would be better this Lion's year, but so far it is not as good as last year. Without the reports, it is difficult to determine how well Clubs are doing. Support for State Projects and LCIF are also slow so far this Lion's year. For example, 11 of our Clubs have donated to LCIF so far this year for a total of \$1575.00 toward our goal of \$12,000.00. This translates to 16.92% of Clubs donating and 13.13% toward our monetary goal.

So we have ample room for improvement. First we need to give attention to membership growth. As we gain new members, we gain new ideas and insights for activities and fundraisers, energy, enthusiasm and leadership potential. Right along with that we need to give our secretaries the support they need to submit Club reports in a timely manner. With everyone participating we can improve our Club functions.

Keep in mind the 25 E Centennial Convention is in April Please make plans to send at least the allowed delegates to the Convention in support of our International Director candidate Past District Governor Mark Clark. Because many awards which Clubs wish to have presented occur at this time, applications and reports must be in on time before the Convention date. That effectively shortens our time for some activities this half of the year. For example to qualify for the Club Excellence award an LCIF donation is required. Therefore the donation must be submitted in time to be registered by LCIF and be verified by the award committee before the State Convention.

As individuals we serve because we have seen a need and want to help in some way. Keeping that in mind, what is your passion in serving? Find what you really enjoy doing and then help others doing it. If you see a function needing improvement, volunteer to serve on that function and propose changes. Additionally, if you recognize an office you would like to participate in or if there is a vacancy coming up just step up and serve. Now is the time to share your talents both in service and in leadership. Leadership is just applying your talents to the organization as well as to service projects.

As always keep doing all that you do in Lionism. Keep in mind we will never be so good we can't improve.

“Secretary’s Challenge”

In **December we had 69.3% MMR** submitted and a **37% on the Activity Reports**. This is a 10% drop in MMRs reported in November and the Activity Reports remain the same. I’m requesting that the Club Secretaries take a few minutes each month to submit their MMRs via MyLCI online so we can reach our goal of 85%+ during the second half of the year for MMR submittals!

MMR Tip: Go into MyLCI at the beginning of the month and submit your MMR with “no changes for the month.” Then if you have changes in membership or contact information you can make the change and it will update your MMR to reflect the change (even though earlier you posted “no changes”). If you have no changes, then nothing is lost and you would have submitted your MMR on time and you don’t have to worry about it at the end of the month!

Activity Report Tip: If you have activities that are repeated month after month (or even annually), create a “signature” activity and all you have to do is select that “signature” activity each month and no additional key punching is required. The only way to contribute towards the Centennial Service Challenge is to post your “Activities” using MyLCI! Let’s get our clubs earning those Centennial Badges for your Banner!



Happy Birthday Lions!

That is the theme for the 2017 Indiana Lions State Convention in Evansville on April 28—30, 2017.

Make your plans now to join Lions from across the state of Indiana at the 2017 Indiana Lions State Convention to celebrate 100 years of lionism. More than 130 Lions have already pre-registered for the convention. The convention will be hosted by the Oakland City and Petersburg Lions Clubs, assisted by Lions from throughout District 25-E.

Lions Clubs International President Chancellor Robert Corlew will be our special guest at the convention. IP Corlew will participate in the presentation of awards at the Awards Luncheon on Saturday, and will be the keynote speaker at the All-State Banquet on Saturday evening. Convention attendees will have an opportunity to meet IP Corlew during a seminar session on Saturday afternoon.

A frequently asked question about the convention is: “What is the dress code for the All-State Banquet on Saturday evening?” The District Governors and other Lions leaders seated at the head table will be wearing formal dinner jackets, but this is a Lions function and Lions apparel is always appropriate at a Lions function. Please plan to attend the All-State Banquet, even if you don't have a Lions vest or shirt. We want you there, no matter what you wear.

Several exciting events and tours are being planned including a Friday evening dinner aboard the LST 325. LST 325 is a restored, fully operational, Navy ship that actually served our country in WWII. The LST is docked in Evansville on the Ohio River and will provide a unique dining experience. There will be a special seminar on the “Legacy of Dr. William P. Woods”, LCI's first International President, who just happened to be from Evansville.

A theme basket for the Silent Auction is a great way for your club to participate in the convention.

There is no charge to attend the convention business sessions, seminars, or visit the exhibit tables. We have done our best to provide affordable meals at the convention, including children menus for the Saturday Luncheon, All-State Banquet, and Sunday Brunch. Walk-in registrations will be accepted during the convention, however, no meal reservations will be accepted after April 20. The deadline for meal reservations at regular prices is April 1. After April 1, the price for each meal will increase by \$5.00. We encourage you to register early to avoid the added cost.



LCIF Grant for the Construction of the Residential Training Facility for the USABA in 25-B



At the Indiana State Convention in April of 2015 the Lions of Indiana were approached by Executive Director Mark Lucas of the United States Association of Blind Athletes (USABA), to help bring the Paralympics movement to Fort Wayne, Indiana. I was approached by Past International President, Wayne Madden and was asked if I would undertake this project. The answer was a sound yes. This is how it got started. The next step was to gather funds from the Lion Clubs of my district and the Lions of Indiana. Each time I visited a club I would talk about this project and encourage the club to donate funds. When I was done 31 Lion Clubs and 9 individual Lions donated; exceeding our goal of \$12,500.

By the end of December, 2015 found the Lions Clubs of District 25B have collected \$154,233.44 of which \$100,000 came from the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), \$37,500 from the USABA Organization and \$16,653.11 from the Lions of District 25B, Lions of Indiana and interest. M.D. 25 has seven districts and each District Governor plus the C.C. Jeffrey Schafer and International Director Linda Tincher and husband PDG Vern all donated towards this project.

At the November 12, 2016 meeting of the Indiana Lions Foundation the Trustees passed a policy to deal with outdated credits and money that are shown on the received funds lists. This is credits earned by working at the state fair, race track, etc. or money donated by clubs or individual. The W.P. Woods Fellowship program began in 1995 and Lions have been working since to gain credits towards a W.P. Woods Fellowship.

Some of the credits or money were earned or donated as far back as 2006-2007 Lions Year. In an effort to use these older credits and moneys the Trustees are going to be contacting each of the older accounts to see what they want to do with their credits or moneys. The policy will take effect July 1, 2017.

Every effort will be made to contact the account holders to determine what steps will be taken. Also you do not need to wait for a Trustee to contact you about your club or individual account. You can contact them. You have 3 Trustees in each district to contact. They are listed in your District Governor's Directory and the State Directory.

W.P. Woods Sunset Policy

During the fourth year of inactivity of W.P.Woods accounts of credits and donations, the Foundation Trustees of each district will be notified in August by the W.P. Woods State Chair to make contact with each of the inactive account owners, or with the presidents of the clubs in which those owners are members, to explain the options for the inactive accounts. Method of use of credits or donations recorded in an account for a deceased Lion should be determined by his or her club. If an account owner cannot be located and his or her club has been dissolved, the appropriate District Governor shall be consulted for resolution. The options include:

1. Using the credits and donations for a W. P. Woods Fellowship; or,
2. Making an account active again through additional credits or donations; or,
3. Identifying recipients, other than the current owners, to receive the credits or donations toward W. P. Woods Fellowships; (recipients may be clubs and districts) or,
4. Permitting the Foundation to apply the credits or donations to the districts in which they were earned.

W. P. Woods credits and donations in accounts that have been inactive for five years or more will be moved to the account of the district in which they were earned.

2017 Indiana Distinguished Lion Award

The Indiana Lions Foundation, Inc. is again sponsoring the Indiana Distinguished Lion Award to recognize an outstanding member of the Lions of Indiana. The award will be presented at the 2017 State Convention. The award is a standing Lion replica for the recipient's desk and their name will be placed on a plaque in the Lions State Office.

The qualifications for this prestigious award are:

1. The nominee must be a member of a Lions Club in Multiple District 25 (Indiana)
2. The nominee has been a Lion in good standing for at least 25 years prior to the nomination.

Nominations may be submitted by a Lions Club, the sub-district cabinet with the approval of the sitting District Governor, or the Council of Governors with the approval of the Council Chair

The Nomination Application form must provide as much information as possible concerning the nominee's service. Nominations must be received by January 31, 2017. Only one applicant per club per year.
