## Lions KidSight, USA

They're here!! The new KidSight cameras are here! Once we got the grant money from LCI and the Indiana Lions Foundation, Lion Jack Salsbery was able to purchase the six new cameras. We have two loaner cameras from the Lions Eye Bank that we need to return, so that leaves four cameras to distribute throughout our district in areas not served by our current teams. Shirley Bocock is head of the Milan Team, Linda Scott and Gayle Feeney head the Indianapolis South/Westside Team, Denise Salsbery, Margaret Blankenbeker, and Sarah Getts head the Indianapolis North/Eastside Team.

We need teams in the Richmond area, Middletown area, and Jeffersonville/Scottsburg/Austin area.

The screening, using the cameras, can detect many abnormalities in young children's eyes. One of the most important problems that can occur in a young child is amblyopia, or lazy eye. If not corrected at an early age, the child can go blind in that eye.



We screen preschool children throughout our district, but cannot reach all the areas that need our services. If you would like more information about possibly becoming a screener, please contact me, Sarah Getts, at 317.331.9015. Training dates are TBA, but hopefully will be in mid-January or early February.

Our three current teams screened over 3,300 preschoolers (ages 6 months to 6 years) from January 1, 2015 – December 31, 2015. With new teams up and running, we could easily double that number by December 31, 2016. The need is great and the rewards are heartwarming... What better reward is there than helping a young child to see?

## Club Delegates

In case you did not know how the number of delegates for each club is determined, there is a formula that is in our By-Laws. It states:

District Constitution and By-Laws, adopted March 2014:

#### **Article VII District Convention**

#### Section 2: Club Delegate Formula

'Each chartered club in good standing in the Lions Clubs International and its district (single or sub- and multiple) shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district (single or sub- and multiple) to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members, who have enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month preceding that month during which the convention is held. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote only on each question submitted to, the respective convention... all eligible delegates must be in good standing of a club in good standing in this district. Delinquent dues may be paid and good standing acquired at any time prior to the close of credential certification..."

Make sure all Club Delegates have their current club dues cards and that the club dues are paid to Cabinet Treasurer, Dick Getts if they intend to vote at the District 25 –F Convention on March 12, 2016 at the Colts Complex.

Don't forget to also register for the Cabinet Meeting in Osgood on January 30, 2016.

# Fortville Lions Celebrate 90th Anniversary

Members and guests gathered on November 17 at the Fortville Community Center in Memorial Park for a banquet to celebrate the Fortville Lions Club's 90th anniversary of its charter. Keynote speaker for the evening was past Lions International Director Douglas Lozier who spoke about national and international events that occurred 90 years ago at the time of the clubs chartering and the impact of Lionism locally and worldwide. PID Lozier stated "Where There is a Need There is a Lion".

Fortville Town Council member Janet Manship read a proclamation and presented President Larry Huston with a plaque from the Town Council declaring November 17, 2015 as Fortville Lions Club Day recognizing the Lions 90 years of dedicated service to the community.

The club was chartered on July 27, 1925 with 20 members for the purpose of serving and bettering their community. The club was 25 members strong by the following December and growing. Clearly the charitable nature of the Lions Club appealed to the people of Fortville as the club membership grew to 65 by the club's 50th year.

Over the years, the Lions Club has done pancake breakfasts, fish fries, fruit sales, raffles, wreath sales, Ball Day breakfast sandwiches to go, and their famous BBQ-To-Go events to raise money for their projects. Funds raised during these events allow the Lions to provide for and restore dignity to those in need in the community.

The Fortville Fire and Police Departments have benefited from Lions projects with funding for a thermal imaging camera and defibrillators as well as donations for Shop with a Public Safety Officer. The club also partnered with the local ambulance service to provide File of Life packets for seniors and the handicapped which provide valuable health information for emergency response personnel. Successful collections for Toys for Tots of Hancock County are held in November and members also assist with the monthly Gleaner's food distribution to those less fortunate.

The Lions Club is involved with the Mt. Vernon School Corporation both through providing personal paperback dictionaries to all third grade students and completing annual vision screenings for all third, fifth and eighth grade students.

The District Vision Screening Program has had a most productive year.

Firstly, our School/Adult program is running smoothly and keeps many screeners busy most of the school year, since some school districts are on a year around schedule.

During this calendar year we have screened 33,212 children and 561 adults. Well-deserved kudos go to the following teams who make it happen: Lions David Clashman, Paul Shane, Tracy & Carolyn Clayton, Harold Utt, PDG Jack Buckland and PCC Steve Winegardner. Give them a big round of applause whenever you see them.

Secondly, with assistance from Lions International Foundation and the great support from our District clubs, we have recently purchased six SO9, Plus Optix cameras for our Lions USA


KidSight program. These cameras are used in our 6 mo. to 6 yr. of age program. As of this writing (mid-December), we have screened 3,274 children in this age category, with two more screenings scheduled before the end of the year.

I want to thank all the clubs and individuals who donated monies for the purchase of the cameras and equipment.




