

I would like to announce the cabinet members. By now, you should know 1VDG Ron Edwards and 2VDG Sheryl Schafer were elected at the District Convention. CT Richard Kaiser and CS PCC Jeff Schafer have agreed to continue in their current roles. PDG Dr. Herb Stevens' and PDG Mark Clark's terms as GMT and GLT are up. PDG Glen Georges has agreed to step up and serve as GMT. The International Directors this year has created a new position called Global Service Team Leader. We don't have a job description for the position but PDG Mark Clark has accepted this new challenge. The new GLT moved to Indiana about 2 years ago. She served as a District Governor in Iowa in 2005-2006 and has served as a Lion in New Mexico. Now that she is a Hoosier she said she is done moving. Please welcome PDG Jean Bodensteiner as your new GLT.

We are at a month away from the International Convention and the start of our associations 101st year. I believe now I should announce my plans and goals for the coming year. These are ambitious and need the support and effort of many Lions.

Plan for the District in 2017-18

Start an annual Guiding/Rebuilding Lion Training Program - We have had several clubs slowly shrinking and are who are in need of rebuilding. Some of these clubs are not aware that they are in need of rebuilding. I would like to begin working with the GLT/GMT/GST and VDGs in developing a Guiding/Rebuilding Lion Program that would be held annually to help keep our clubs healthy.

Develop an Emergency Preparedness Committee - I plan to work with the VDGs and PDG Dale Leffler (Emergency Preparedness chair) to develop a new District EP Committee with at least one member from each region and develop an EP plan for the District. If needed, we will work with EP team from District 25D to develop the District's plan. By the end of my term, I hope to have held at least one preparedness drill.

Increase LCIF donations - I plan to work with PDG Gary Ochs, VDGs, and the district LCIF coordinators (VDG Ron Edwards, soon to be Immediate PDG Trea McCandless, PDG Glen Georges, Lion Sam Hopper) to develop a program to increase LCIF donations in the district. VDG Ron and I have a plan and will begin to implement it with the LCIF Coordinators and Gary's help.

Vision Services - I plan to ask the District Vision Service Chair/trainers to work with PDG Charlie Short (State Committee Chair) to improve the District Vision Services program.

Honorary Committee Responsibilities - I plan to work with DG Trea McCandless (Honorary Committee Chair) to develop what the honorary committee is responsible for, like member retention, crisis prevention, etc. The Honorary committee will also be asked to find areas of 'short comings' in the district and make recommendations to be forwarded to Long Range Planning and the District Governor Team.

Long Range Planning - I plan to work with new Long Range Planning Chair Erica Thomas to develop an ongoing District Long Range Planning Committee. Committee will be made up of active members of the honorary committee, the region chairs, GLT/GMT/GST, the DG, VDGs and the committee chair. This committee will be asked to find and help develop the district's future leadership and to help the district leadership develop long term goals of the district. Club Leadership - For the last several years, one of the biggest problems clubs have faced is members not stepping up into leadership roles. Several factors may be the cause, but this can hurt the club's longtime leadership, morale, and membership growth. I would like to work with the GLT, VDGs, and Region and Zone chairs to see if we can work on developing club leaders.

Club Membership - I would like to encourage the GLT/GMT teams, Retention Team, PDGs, Region and Zone Chairs to do the following to build membership:

Develop a District Retention Team(s). Identify clubs that need and want help growing. Develop club rebuilding teams Train Re-Building Guiding Lions

District Orientation Program - I will ask the GLT/GMT/GST leaders to work on a District Orientation Program. The program will be designed to aid clubs in member orientation beyond the club level. The goal is to have the zone/region chairs trained to be able to assist the clubs to presenting the program.

Secretary Reporting - I would like to see 100% MMR reporting and 80% Activity reporting by the end of my year. These reports are important for the district to know the health of the club and for LCI to reach their goal of serving 200,000,000 per year.

Women Membership and Leadership - I would like to work with and encourage the GLT/GMT/GST, and the Women Membership Chair Sue Ahlbrand to develop a plan or program to encourage increased women membership and leadership.

Diabetes Awareness - Diabetes is the next big issue that Lions International has asked the districts to tackle. As such, I would like to encourage the district Diabetes chair to work with our clubs to try to find a date and location to hold diabetes awareness event(s) and/or a Strides walk.

Buster McCandless Blood Drives - I would like to continue the Buster McCandless Blood drives during my term. There is no telling how many lives may be affected.

Again, I would like to thank everyone for their support and I look forward to a very busy year working with everyone in the district and seeing everyone at Banner Night on July 15th.

I encourage you to work with your club to make a donation to LCIF. Your support will make a real difference in the life of someone who needs it most, so please give today.





Total Solar Eclipse of August 21, 2017

On Monday, August 21st, there will be an excellent chance to host a fun and educational event for the youth of your community, depending on your location a total or partial eclipse of the sun.

If you happen to be in 71 mile wide path, that crosses southern Illinois, Kentucky, and other parts of the United States, then you will have an opportunity to see one of nature's most spectacular events - a total solar eclipse. (See slide 1 of attached Solar Eclipse August 2017.pdf)

If you are outside this path, say in Southern Indiana, then you will see only see a partial eclipse.

A total solar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes between the Earth and the Sun, and the Moon casts its shadow on the Earth.

If the centers of the Sun and Moon are perfectly lined up, and you are in the path of the Moon's shadow, you will see the Moon completely block the solar disk, allowing the outer atmosphere of the Sun, known as the Corona, to become visible, as well as eruptions on the limb of the Sun known as prominences.

The total duration of the eclipse will be about 2 hours and 55 minutes. Most of that time though will be with the Moon moving slowly across the Sun's disk and only blocking part of it, which is called the partial phase of the eclipse.

The partial eclipse will start about 10 minutes before noon, and the eclipse will end by around a quarter to 3 in the afternoon central daylight time.

During the partial phase, you will not notice any obvious dimming of the sunshine until about 75% of the Sun's disk is covered. This will occur about 15 minutes before the eclipse becomes total.

You will start to notice an eerie appearance in the landscape. You will see projections of the eclipse in the shadows of trees. You will also notice that the temperature is dropping.

How can you safely view the eclipse? The cheapest way is to get yourself some eclipse glasses. These glasses are NOT sunglasses. They are much darker, and block out 99.99% of the Sun's light. (See slide 2 of attached Solar Eclipse August 2017.pdf) These glasses can be purchased from https://www.rainbowsymphony.com/eclipse-glasses/

These will allow you to safely view the partial phases of the eclipse. The only time it is safe to view the Sun without the eclipse glasses, is during totality, when the Sun's disk is completely blocked. As soon as totality is over, you need to put the eclipse glasses back on.

Another safe and cheap way to view the partial phases is to use pinhole projection. Take a piece of cardboard or box, cut a hole in it, tape a piece of aluminum foil over the hole, and then poke a pinhole in the aluminum foil. (See slide 3 of attached Solar Eclipse August 2017.pdf)

If you hold out the piece of cardboard, and look at its shadow, you will see a projection of the Sun's disk showing the partially eclipsed Sun.

Anything with small holes in it, will work similar to the pinhole projector I already described, and make small images of the partial phases on the ground.

Before there were safe solar filters, people viewed eclipses through smoked glass. That method does not filter out enough of the light to be safe, and you will damage your eyes, so don't do it.

Other methods that are not safe for the same reasons, include stacking sunglasses, looking through exposed film, or looking through CDs.

As Lions you know your vision is far too precious to jeopardize with unsafe protection.




