
of Arts and History. Evansville has a lot to offer visitors, but Lions are in for a real treat with the Friday night dinner aboard the USS LST325.

We all enjoyed our visitors from California, Lion ID Howard Hudson and his wife, Lion Lynn. ID




District Convention brings a great time



Greetings from 25-D. We are still busy crisscrossing the nine counties visiting the 48 Clubs of the District.






