





### Alone you can help one, together we can help many

The Hearing Lions flew into Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, on Feb. 15. Our Mexican hosts were there to greet us, and treated us like family all week. Aureliano Jauregui Vazquez, the national Speech & Hearing Chairman in Mexico, has worked with The Hearing Lions since 1998; his wife and son; Ruben and other members of the host Lions Club, Costa de Chila Sur de Compostela, were there to greet and transport us to our hotel.

The mission was held in the small village of San Jose Del Valle, about an hour north of Puerto Vallarta.

I started helping others hear in Mexico in 1995, and our group has now fit 8,611 hearing aids.

The Hearing Lions donate \$100 per aid to obtain hearing instruments, earmolds and many extra batteries from the Starkey Hearing Foundation. We had to raise \$36,000 to be able to fit the 360 hearing aids. This project would not be possible without the help of Lions Clubs International Foundation. LCIF has awarded the group a \$10,000 International Assistance Grant the last few years. Others who stepped up include churches, friends and family and the Indiana Lions Foundation. The group was still \$1,000 short of the \$36,000 budget, the mayor of the village offered to donate \$1,000.

We have made plans for the next venture of The Hearing Lions. It will be Feb. 22-27, 2016, in the state of Colima. If you or your group would like to help us fit more patients, please make your tax deductible donations out to The Indiana Lions Foundation. write "For The Hearing Lions" in the memo section, and mail them to me at 340 Jefferson Valley, Coatesville, IN 46121.

Aureliano tells us that they have a need for at least 400, probably up to 1.000 hearing aids in this area. Please consider helping The Hearing Lions to help oth-

We fit about six bone conductor hearing aids this year. These patients may have a fully developed middle and inner ear, but no, or malformed, external ears. These conductive losses are easy to fit. Perhaps cosmetic surgery will be possible in the future for these children.

many years he could hear what he was playing and hear himself

We received this message from one of our interpreters: "I just wanted to thank you for letting me be a part of this experience, I had always liked to participate in activities where I can help people, however this changed my life, seeing people smile and cry is something that marks you, hopefully there were more like you, the world would be very different, and better. Thanks for making a difference, God always bless you, and also all the people around you. I heard a part of your history and how you started helping, you are admirable. Really, you are an amazing person. I hope I can help you in another occasion, because there is nothing more satisfying than seeing that you can help people to smile...

### Indiana Lions Eyeglass Mission to Haiti

In February, PID Joe Marcheggiani of the Carmel Lions Club and Lion Ron Hinshaw of the Tipton Lions Club led a team of eight Lions and two non-Lions on an eyeglass mission to Plaisance, Haiti. This was a follow-up mission to the 2014 mission to the nearby town of Pilate.

These were the first eyeglass missions to this part of Haiti by any organization since 1983. These missions were organized at the request of the Haiti Environmental Support Program, a faithbased organization in Kokomo.

Other members of the 2015 mission team were Lions Becky Farrington, Linda Drake and Phil Drake of the Kokomo Area Lions Club; Lions Colette Anderson and Deb Lawrence of the Cheshire Lions Club; PDG Paul Russell of the Lakeville Lions Club; HESP founder and director Douglas Vaughn of Kokomo, and HESP volunteer Anita Upchurch of Kokomo.

In addition to our personal luggage, we took a table-top autorefractor, a hand-held refract keratometer, and two suitcases full of supplies. We had previously shipped 8,000 pairs (20 cases) of used eyeglasses to Plaisance and we had access to several cases of used eyeglasses, which we left in Pilate at the end of our 2014 mission

Plaisance is a town in the mountains of northern Haiti. The town and the surrounding area have a population of approximately 50,000 people. The main "highway" into Plaisance is a narrow, rocky, mountain road shared by motor vehicles, bicycles, handcarts, pedestrians and livestock. On a good day — one with no blowouts, breakdowns, washouts, or other delays — it takes about three hours to drive 30 miles from the airport at Cap Hatien to Plai-

Haiti is the poorest nation in the western hemisphere; the International Red Cross estimates that 70 percent of Haitians live on less than \$2 U.S. per day. Many

We tend to take things like electricity and clean running water for granted, but in Haiti, these are luxuries.

We frequently saw local people doing laundry in the nearby river and occasionally saw people bathing in the river.

At both the local school, where we held the mission, and the guest house where we stayed, electricity was provided by portable generators operated by our hosts. There was no running water at the mission site. The guest house had indoor plumbing fed from a large storage tank on the roof, of gratitude from the people we II. He was very active in his local Haitians live in small shacks built however, plumbing problems served.

made the system unusable during most of our stay in Plaisance. We got by with sponge baths using cold water from a 55-gallon bar-

Despite the challenges, we view the mission as a success. During our five-day mission, we provided eye exams and eyeglasses to more than 1,500 men, women and children. Many of them walked several miles to get to our mission site, then waited in line for

Our hosts went out of their way to make us feel welcome, and we received numerous expressions





### KidSight State Project - Q & A

If you have read The Hoosier Lion, you may have come across a resolution, which the Lions of Indiana will be voting on at the 2015 MD25 State Convention in Columbus.

This resolution was adopted by the Indiana Lions Eye Bank Inc. in November 2014, and proposes that Operation KidSight become a State Project of the Lions of Indiana. In lieu, the eye bank would shift from being an "official" state project to become its own unique entity, which will remain governed by the Lions of Indiana

#### Q And A Seminar

There will be a Question and Answer seminar about this proposal during the State Convention in Columbus on Saturday, April 25, but in the meantime, here is some of the background of what has brought us to this point and some answers to some of the questions that may be floating around.

With the success of the eye bank in recent years, the ILEBI has been able to expand our services outside of Indiana and into the



world. The number of corneas collected at home far exceeds the needs of the citizens of Indiana. We have invested in the surgical training for ophthalmic surgeons through equipment grants and etextbook sponsorships; we have taken our mission abroad to help fund eye banks in India; we have expanded our facilities to include additional office space for our continued future growth of our eye bank; and most recently, we have invested in a company working towards production of the first commercially available artificial cornea, which has the potential of eliminating the need for donor corneas in the future.

The Indiana Lions Eye Bank Inc. is growing and making an impact

At the same time, the Operation KidSight preschool age vision screening program has continued to grow but appears to be reaching a plateau in the number of screenings performed each year, struggling to reach 20,000 children.

It is estimated that of the 80,000 children expected to be born in 2015 with as many as 3,200 of these children having undetected vision disorders. We can and must do better to reach all of these children.

So, "Why form an Indiana Lions

Operation KidSight state project now?" Unfortunately, some Lions look at Operation KidSight as merely an "eye bank" project and something that it does. The truth of the matter is that the current success of the program is not due to the eye bank but rather the KidSight staff and the volunteers across the state who are performing the screenings.

The only way for this program to move to the next level is to get more Lions involved and take ownership of the program.

If approved, an Indiana Lions Operation KidSight state project would be the ONLY state project in which EVERY Lion in Indiana can have a first-hand, hands-on role. Through making contacts and scheduling with their local daycares, preschools, and schools; performing the screenings; and compiling the screening results, every Lion can participate in one way or another in this project.

Also, with the launch of the LCI's Lions KidSight USA program this past fall in Puerto Rico, it just makes sense for the Lions of Indiana to take vision screening to the next level and show the world what we have been doing in Indiana and take advantageous of the publicity generated by LCI.

can do within in our own communities for the children we see

The Indiana Lions Operation KidSight Coordinator, Lion Janice Chapman, has been appointed to the KidSight USA Committee, and we are already making an impact on how this national program is going to be developed.

"So, is this a preschool or school age screening program?" This seems to be the burning question with many Lions have expressed. The simple answer: It is a vision screening project for the children of Indiana. Although preschool age vision screening is the primary focus of Operation KidSight under the ILEBI, it would be shortsighted to limit the program to one particular type of screening.

Indiana Lions Operation Kid-Sight would be vested in a Board of Directors comprised of Lions from each district just like all of the other state projects, and they alone will determine where the program goes in the future.

Some will say, "We cannot afford another state project." For that reason, the resolution includes a provision that the Indiana Lions Eye Bank Inc. will step aside as an "official" state project and become its own separate entity, remaining under the Lions of Indiana with representation of three trustees from each district, just as is done with the Indiana Lions Foundation. An Indiana Lions Operation KidSight state project will also be ready to roll on day-one with initial funding provided by the ILEBI and the creation of a \$500,000 endowment, with 100 percent of the proceeds of the endowment benefiting Kid-Sight for a 10-year period.

Office space (including utilities) for the KidSight offices will also be provided by the ILEBI in the newly acquired and
