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Lions of C are busy

Someone asked, "What's going on in District C?" Do you have an hour or two? Or I could just write a novel for you to read.

Lafayette's Bob Hrdy and his campaign for helping to update the Leader Dog Kennels is in full swing. Bob is visional impaired and has a Leader Dog named Alex. For years, Bob and Alex sat in the back of the room during meetings and said very little. This year he was asked to be President and at the same time Leader Dog announced the need for kennel restoration. Bob became a walking talking dynamo! He challenged his Club to help with updating of the kennels at the Leader Dog training site. Through his enthusiasm and contacts over \$30,000 was raised.

Now Bob is challenging all the Districts (including District C) to match this amount in the next three years. That breaks down to about \$165 extra per club per year. Wouldn't it be great if Indiana was the major contributor to the restoration of the kennels?

One of the exciting things is the Peace Poster Contest, which was filled with beautiful and creative art work by our young people. Out of the 57 Clubs, Zhifei Wu from Lafayette Lions Club was the first place winner and will represent District C in the state competition. Bailey Woods from Morgantown Lions Club was the second place winner, with Alyson Kniola from the Zionsville Lions Club and Brenna Frost from the Brookston Lions Club tying for third place.

All of the entries were presented with certificates announcing their achievement and a monetary award from the District was given for first place. If you think the Peace Poster Contest doesn't

spread the word of Lionism, think about this: I talked to the mother of our local winner as she hugged her daughter's award and found out grandparents drove for an hour and a half just to see their granddaughter receive her award.

New Goshen West Vigo Lions Club has taken on an unusual Lions project. Their den is right next to the last standing two-room brick school house in Indiana. The building includes original desks, blackboards and a 48-star American flag.

It took them several years to halt the demolition of the building and to buy the surrounding land, which has been turned into a Lion Park for the community. They have decided to restore this building as a historical location. New Goshen members have been busy doing most of the work themselves as time and money allows. When they are not hammering and sawing they're raising funds with spaghetti dinners and fundraising projects. This unincorporated town has rallied around the Lions Club by supporting all the efforts and even lending a hand now and then. Writing of grants to LCIF will give them the opportunity to finish the project, which has increased community pride.

Cloverdale Lions Club has solved a problem many Clubs are facing and that is competition from other service organizations. As a poet once said, "We had love and wit to win. We drew a circle that took them in."

Instead of competing with these groups Cloverdale gathered them. They asked 17 groups and three high school service groups to work together on projects under the umbrella leadership of Lions. This way similar projects are worked on at the same time

by everyone. Everyone is learning that working together is a lot of fun and you can belong to your group and the Lions Club, too.

Brookston Lions Club has also solved a similar problem. Instead of competing with the failing American Legion Post, they adopted the post as one of their projects. The Lions provide the manpower and the Legion provides the building and desserts for by-monthly steak or fish fries. This allows both groups to enjoy each other and earn a bit of funds.

It is truly amazing the passion Lions have for serving their community.

One of the joys of being a District Governor is to celebrate the recognition of service to Lions Club by presenting chevrons for every five years of service to their members. It is amazing the longevity of the dedication of service Lions produce. It's not unusual to present chevrons for 30, 35, or 40 years but, recently, Robert Quinn, a charter member of the Delphi Lions Club, received a charter chevron for 65 years of service! Think about all the hours spent in serving others, all the changes he has seen, and all that he has been a part of. It makes you proud to see that Lions have such dedicated people. It makes you proud to be a Lion!

I don't have the copy space to tell you about the Clubs that are working on their Club Excellence Award and those who are working on the Centennial Service Challenge. Now it's time for a short commercial. District C's District Convention is coming Feb. 28 and will feature ID Steven Tremaroli from MD 20 and PDG "Buzz" Melton from MD 1, you are all welcomed.

Not News to Us

At the USA/Canada Forum in Puerto Rico this past September, Lions Clubs International unveiled a new initiative called "Lions KidSight USA." This nationwide program is designed to vision screen children 6 months through 6 years of age. The goal: to get every Club involved in vision screening.

So what does this program mean for the Lions of Indiana? Well other than promoting an awareness of the need for Lions to get involved with the screening of preschool age children, Lions KidSight USA is nothing different from what the Lions of Indiana have been doing since 2003.

With the support of the Lions of Indiana and the Indiana Lions Eye Bank Inc., the Operation KidSight staff and volunteers have screened over 115,000 children in Indiana since 2003. As great as this sounds

though, there are a total of 440,000 children in Indiana between the ages of 6 months and 6 years as this article is being written.

Last year, Operation KidSight screened 17,091 children with 1,168 of those children being referred for a complete eye examination with an eye care professional. We must, we can, and we are doing better this year.

Now here is the best part . . . there is no cost to your Club or the families of the children that we screen. To start screening, all you need to do is contact Lion Janice Chapman by visiting the Operation KidSight website at <http://www.indianalionseyebank.org/operationkidsight.html> or by contacting any of the Indiana Lions Eye Bank Inc. trustees within the District. While visiting the website you will find information about our program, consent forms, brochures, media releases and announcements, as

well as ways that you can help.

The main thing that an Operation KidSight screening is trying to detect is "lazy eye." This is not as much a vision issue, but rather a communication issue between the eyes and the brain. A lazy eye can be a completely normal eye, but the eye and brain are not working together. Eventually the brain may simply shut off images being sent from the lazy eye. Treatment of this condition is as easy as patching the good eye and forcing the child to use and retrain the lazy eye to respond to the impulses of the brain.

How do I know? Well my 6-year-old daughter is an Operation KidSight child. Through patching, her eyesight has so far been corrected from being 20/85 to 20/55. Will we get to 20/20? Well probably not, but we have prevented her from becoming blind in her left eye. For that, our family says "Thank you Lions!" You've served and we will continue to serve together.

members in attendance for the banquet.

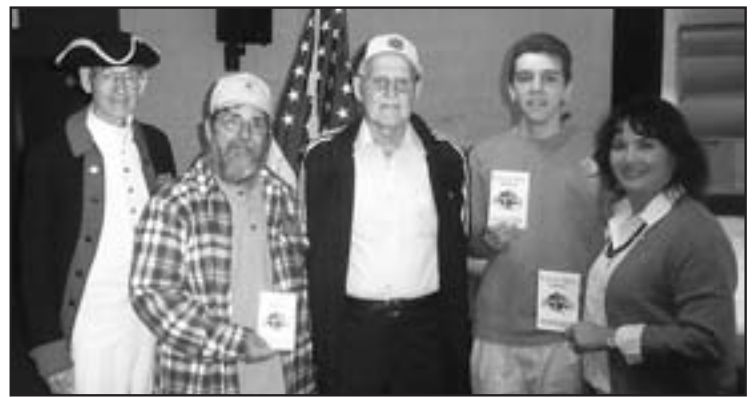

Seal the deal with a test drive

A few weeks ago, my wife and I decided that it was time to replace our 20-year-old minivan. We did some research online, then visited a nearby dealership.

The salesman who came out to meet us engaged us in conversation about our needs, and identified a vehicle that he thought might meet our needs. But he didn't just tell us about the features, he encouraged us to get in and take a test drive, because he

knows that the hands-on experience of a test drive is his best sales tool. Later, as I thought about our experience at the auto dealership, I realized that it was applicable to our efforts to recruit new members for our Lions Clubs.

In many cases, our individual recruiting efforts take the form of a simple question: "Would you like to come to a Lions Club meeting?" or "Would you like to join our Lions Club?". These questions often result in a negative response. And after we've been turned down by several people, we get discouraged and quit asking.

Perhaps we need to rethink our approach. Instead of simply asking someone to come to a meeting or join our Club, perhaps we should request their assistance

on one of our community service projects, particularly when they have skills we need to complete that project. Ask an educator or librarian to help with a literacy project, such as the Dictionary Project. Ask an eye care professional to help with a vision-related project, such as Operation KidSight. Ask someone who enjoys woodworking to help build a ramp for someone with mobility problems. In essence, identify our prospect's interests, match those interests with the "features" of one of our community service projects, then offer our prospect a "test drive".

Hands-on experience with Lions community service is our best sales tool, so let's take a lesson from that salesman at the auto dealership and seal the deal with a test drive.

“Beam me up, Scotty.” The catchphrase that made its way into popular culture from the 1966 science fiction television series, “Star Trek” comes from the command that Captain Kirk gives his chief engineer “Scotty, when he needed to be transported back to the Starship Enterprise. As District Governor, I often wish I could be transported back after an official visitation or other Lions function by this simple command.

While the Sci-Fi teleport method has not been created (yet!), there are other components from earlier TV series upon us. The picture phone is here, so is the telephone watch, and from a store close to us all might come the shoe phone from the “Get

Smart” series. Along with these physical tools of wonderment, ‘apps’ proliferate to make our lives easier.

As Lions, if our Clubs are too slow to adapt to them, and the phrase I continue to here is “I don’t do computers- never have, never will,” the future might leave many behind. Today people, especially NON-Lions, are used to having news and other information come to them. People no longer have to go out and search for news. Eons ago, we had to go to the street corner and purchase an actual printed newspaper. Every morning I open my phone and today’s news is one click away. Coupon clipping is also digital, and we never have to clutter purses and pockets with paper discount passes.

The social media outlets avail-

able allow us to target messages to individuals more efficiently than any direct mail or any other promotional effort in the past. The key is for Clubs to have trained members direct a Lions’ Club social media effort, including posting photos of events, promoting future events and keeping a constant and fresh presence throughout the Internet. The most obvious is Facebook, but there are other social media outlets worth pursuing, such as LinkedIn, Pinterest, Google Plus, just to name a few.

If you haven’t kept up on your District’s efforts, visit our website (www.Lions25g.org) and our Facebook page at Lions District 25-G. Please ‘Like’ our page and share posts to your page. The more people see news about Lions and perhaps your Club in particular, the easier it is for them to ‘reach out’ to you and become a part of your Club. I attempt to put information from Clubs whenever somebody sends it to me, including photos and articles on our website and Facebook page. The South Tucson Lions Club ‘borrowed’ a post from our Facebook page and used it as its cover photo for a while. Scroll down our FB page and see the post we did on the sign along US Hwy. 31 north of Peru. During my official visit to the Mexico Lions Club, I put the photo and a short story about the sign on our website and Facebook page, and our friends in Arizona ‘borrowed’ the post. Being about 110 miles from Nogales, Mexico, it seemed appropriate!

What’s the future for us? Talk to most newspaper publishers and they’re already trying to figure out a use for their printing presses. Local radio stations have all but disappeared. The amount of actual commercial time in a 30-minute television program is about 36 percent. As DG, I have probably only received 4-5 mailed (USPS) communications from LCI. Times are indeed changing, and as Lions, we must make sure our messages are being received.
