New Mountains to Climb...

Also, think about a kit for your automobile. Another reference source in the Lions Clubs web site at www.lionsclubs.org and enter IAD-911 EN in the search box. This resource outlines the Lions Alert Program, the different levels of emergency and organizing a Lions Alert Committee for your area. All Lions should become familiar with this program and how it may be able to assist their local Lions Club and their community if severe weather strikes.

If you will remember, I wrote a similar paragraph in March of 2012 not expecting the tornadoes to strike Henryville, Marysville, Daisy Hill, Chelsea and Holton. We cannot set back and say it will never happen here as history indicates it will hit with less than a moment's notice. Lions are generally the first to arrive offering help and the last to leave when a natural disaster strikes. Start preparing now.

Help Serve: Diabetes Alert Day March 28

Christopher Reinhold District 25 F Diabetes Committee Chair.

March 28th is Diabetes Alert Day. This day is focused solely on getting people to take the Diabetes Risk Assessment. Why is this day important? One third of US adults are prediabetic; 90% of those adults with pre-diabetes do not know it. Diabetes Alert Day is focused on helping those one third of US adults identify their condition so they can begin to take action to prevent future health complications.

How can you and your club help? Print out the one page American Diabetes Association Risk Assessment and pass it out. Ask whether you can set up a table at the local grocery store, or library or senior center – any place where there are adults is a good place to distribute the diabetes risk assessment. As you will see on the bottom of the risk assessment, Walgreens is the national sponsor of this risk assessment so they may be very receptive to Lions passing out the diabetes risk assessment there.

Given the number of people who are pre-diabetic and don't know it, you may help someone identify their risk of prediabetes. Those folks can then follow up with their doctor to discuss whether a simple blood test is needed to further assess their risk of diabetes.

Are you coming to Chicago for the Lions Centennial Convention in June, 2017?



Lions Clubs International is planning to celebrate their 100th Anniversary Celebration, the Lions of MD1, Illinois are planning to host the party. We have been in the process of preparing to host the Lions of the World as they arrive in Chicago to be part of this Centennial Celebration. We are looking forward to demonstrate our Midwest welcome and hospitality to all convention attendees and their families.

The Centennial Convention is June 30 - July 4, 2017 in Chicago, Illinois. The main venue will be Chicago McCormick Place. At this time, the anticipated attendance is about 35,000 to 40,000 people from around the World. The different delegations will be housed in more than 18 hotels that are located along the "Magnificent Mile" - Michigan Avenue. The International Parade will be Saturday, July 1, 2017. The parade will step off at 9:00 am and proceed down State Street. We are anticipating about 20,000 marchers, 18 marching bands along with cars, trolley buses and floats. This parade will be one of the convention highlights and demonstrate to the City who the Lions are.

Lions Clubs International has made some changes that will allow all those who attend time to visit the Centennial Exhibit in the main exhibit hall as well as to enjoy the sights and sound that the City of Chicago has to offer. Some of those changes include:

- The hours of the Convention Services and Exhibit Hall have been extended for additional hours per day. This change is to accommodate the high number of attendees.
- The Delegate Certification and Voting Procedures have changed. Instead of getting certified as a delegate any time during the convention and then coming to vote on the last day of the convention, you will now be able to get certified and vote starting on Sunday, July 2 at 1:00 pm through Tuesday, July 4 until 10:30 am.
- LCI has added a Business Session on Saturday, July 1 following the parade. This session will be for the nomination of the candidates for International Directors. The third Vice President's nomination will take place at the Sunday morning session.

On Saturday, July 1, 2017 not only do we have the Parade of Nations and a newly added Business Session, along with the International Show in the evening. The performance at the show will include the "Beach Boys" and "Chicago". Both these bands are internationally known and will be performing individually at the show.

Something else that is new, is that during the International Show the main exhibit hall will be open to the attendees. The idea is to allow those that would like to take a break to go to the hall and walk around. There will be food and drinks available in the hall during the show. The International Show will be starting at 5:30 pm which is earlier than years past. This may be a long day for those who participate in the parade as well as attend the Saturday afternoon business section, but I feel that it would give those the full experience of the convention.

I hope that you planning to come and celebrate this milestone in our Association's History. Chicago has a lot to offer in the areas of site seeing, various food experiences, recreational areas and plenty of shopping opportunities. With Chicago being the Birth Place of Lions, this will be a great time to step back into the History of our Association. 

Centennial Coin Update

We need your help!

Our Centennial Commemorative Coin went on sale January 18, 2017. To date, approximately 38,000 coins have been sold. The first week of sales was encouraging, with a total of 30,456 coins sold. But sales for week #2 dropped considerably from week #1, to just over 8,000 coins. If sales continue to decline in the first 60 days, the U.S. Mint may cease production of our Centennial silver dollar as minting additional coins is based entirely on sales expectations.

We can't let that happen, and here's why. Once the U.S. Mint has surpassed the break-even point of the program (approximately 200,000 coins), US\$10 is authorized to be paid to LCIF for every coin sold. If we sell all 400,000 coins of our planned mintage, **US\$4 million will be given to LCIF to support our global humanitarian initiatives.** Just imagine how many more people we could help!

We know that it takes time to get the word out to Lions, and that's where you, our Lions leaders, can make the difference. In your highly respected and influential position, you can assist our marketing efforts by promoting the coin during your regular visits to Lions—at district and multiple district conventions, club visits, etc.—and encouraging them to <u>purchase a coin</u>.

If you have already ordered and received your coin, bring it to events so Lions can see the beauty and value of this limited-edition coin for themselves. You can also download our <u>Centennial Coin flyer</u> and <u>FAQ</u> to help promote the coin to Lions.




