Hello Lions,

As you all know, Erica and I served on the State Convention
Planning committee. The last month or so of the planning was
extremely stressful with all the last-minute details and last second requests and
instructions. With a week to go, we received an extremely well timed letter of
encouragement from one of our members. The letter touched us both and we both want
to tell this member, "Thank You!"

On April 22nd, the Petersburg branch of German American Bank sponsored a "Clean Sweep" event. For those who doesn't have a German American in their community, the clean sweep event is a community clean-up day where they sponsor 12 to 15 community non-profit organizations to clean up selected areas in the community and they will pay the non-profit group \$25 per bag, up to 10 bags. This program helps the area non-profits and helps clean up the community. For this program, I would like to thank German American and specifically, VP Brett Warner for inviting the Petersburg Lions to participate again this year.

The Indiana Lions State Convention is now done expect for the close out reports. On Thursday night was the Council of Governors Dinner at the Acropolis with the International **P**resident (IP). The dinner was rather late as the IP's plane was delayed. There was a brief council meeting early Friday morning prior to the dedication of the Legacy Tree for Dr. William Perry Woods.

For those who doesn't know, Dr. Woods was a surgeon in Evansville that started the Royal Order of Lions prior to the birth of Lions Clubs International. Dr. Woods along with others, was invited to meet with Melvin Jones which led to the formation of Lions Clubs International and Dr. Woods serving as the first President. 100 years later, here we are at 1.4+ million members strong. After the Legacy Tree dedication, private tours were arranged for IP Chancellor Robert Corlew and Lion Dianne. The IP had a private tour of the LST 325 and Lion Dianne toured the Reitz Home Museum. The two tours met up for lunch at the Gerst Haus and afterwards visited the grave site of Dr. Woods.

Friday afternoon/evening was the hog roast on the USS LST 325. This type of ship (Landing Ship Tank) did not receive names, only numbers. LST 325 is the only remaining functional LST and was rescued from the scrap yards in Greece. Evansville manufactured more LSTs than any other inland shipyard, but did not make LST 325.

Anyway, back to the hog roast, because the forecast was for strong storms, the hog roast was held inside the tank deck instead of the planned top deck. The entertainers was a local group called DSL consisting of two singers/guitarists, Steve Edwards and Lion Lowell Thomas. Yes, I call him Dad. Near the end of the evening, before IP Corlew's party left, he was asked to join the band for a number. They sang "Rocky Top" and everyone seemed to enjoy it. IP Corlew didn't know he had to sing for his supper.

Shortly afterward IP Corlew left and the crowd slowly followed, which allowed us to start cleaning up the mess left behind. The cleanup crew had just left the ship as a light rain started. Talk about good timing. Oh, if you are in Evansville and have time to tour the LST, I recommend doing so. The crew was wonderful and really helped make the evening great.

The first business session was back at the Events Plaza with the storms raging outside and the Monster Trucks tearing it up in the Ford Center across the street. Wow those trucks are loud. I think they may be in need of assistance from the Speech and Hearing project soon.



Everything You Need to Know About Reporting 2017-18 Club Officers

Fiscal year 2017-18 is quickly approaching! We are asking the clubs you represent to report their new officers as soon as they have been elected. Here's why this is important:

- New officers get early access to the MyLCI site beginning April 1.
- When clubs report their officers in MyLCI, the information is immediately available to your district and to international headquarters so no extra paperwork is necessary.
- The Club Locator on the Lions' website displays their new officers.
- Timely monthly reporting by the clubs in your district will provide up to date and accurate district/multiple district membership reports

How to report

- Reporting club officers is easy using MyLCI. Click video to view a short video demonstration.
- Clubs not using MyLCI can report officers using the <u>Club Officer Reporting Form</u>. Mailing instructions are included on the form.

Update other club information

We have let the clubs in your district know that this is also the ideal time to:

- Verify their new officers' contact information and mailing preferences.
- Confirm the club's meeting location, date and time.
- Update club members' contact information.

With new features added, clubs can now accomplish more in MyLCI

- International Convention voting delegates can now be assigned in MyLCI.
- International Convention Invitation (visa) Letters can be printed by club officers using MyLCI.



Lions Club International Convention Information Indiana Delegation

Reservations are being accepted for a proposed passenger bus that would be leaving Indianapolis on Friday June 30th at noon and then leave Chicago on Sunday July 2nd at approximately 6pm. Many are looking to avoid the "adventure" of Chicago traffic and the \$45 - \$65 a day parking fees near the hotels.

This time frame would allow our members on Saturday to be able to participate in the parade, tour the convention and attend the first business session and the International Show that night (with the Beach Boys). Sunday's events are the first Plenary session where the crowd favorite sections are the Parade of Flags and the International President's address to the membership. This is also the first day for delegates to vote as well as the Indiana International Convention Committee is working on hosting a "Chicago" Pizza Party Sunday afternoon for the Indiana delegation. Of course there are numerous non-Lion activities to do in and around Chicago.

There will be free Lions club shuttle buses operating from each of the delegation hotels to McCormick place, site of all of the convention related activities. The convention registration badge will allow members to ride each of these shuttles and with many of the major sight-seeing destinations being fairly close to a delegation hotel (close to 25 as of today) members can use them as the main mode of transportation.

The transportation company contacted has a smaller bus that if 28 members register then the cost is \$78. If we are able to have 56 registrants then a larger bus will be used and the cost drops to \$38.
