I saw this story recently. One day, as a small child, Tom came home from school and gave a paper to his mother. He said to her "Mom, my teacher gave this paper to me and told me only you are to read it. What does it say?"

Her eyes welled with tears as she read the letter out loud to her child...

"Your son is a genius. This school is too small for him and doesn't have good enough teachers to train him. Please teach him yourself."

Many years after his mother had died, one day he was going through a closet and he found the folded letter that his old teacher wrote his Mother that day. He opened it...

The message written on the letter was "Your son is mentally deficient. We cannot let him attend our school anymore. He is expelled."

The young man – Thomas Edison, one of the greatest inventors of history.

Although the validity of this story has been questioned the message is the same. What would life be for that child if he had believed what was written. Would he had tried and continued to strive to be the best? Edison, they say, discovered over 10,000 ways not to make a light bulb. The creation of the light bulb took over ten years for him to discover the right combination. He believed he could do it.

So, do we as Lions Clubs, when something doesn't work exactly correctly or isn't a great success, just give up? Do we go out into our communities and say, "We really don't do much as a club because we don't have that many members and we are all old".

We, as Lions, must stand up and try to make our clubs, our community and the world around us a better place to be. Think of this quote from Edward E. Hale:

I am only one, but I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something. And I will not let what I cannot do interfere with what I can do.

#### **Converse Lions Club**

The Converse Club was chartered on May 24, 1929 and thus we will celebrate our 90th anniversary in 2019. The club in years past has boasted a membership of nearly 90 members and currently has 24 members. We have met in a variety of locations from the Converse City Hall, to Stepler's Cafe in Amboy and currently meet in the basement of the Friends Church in Amboy. Our membership spans a range of professions including teachers, farmers, bank presidents, factory workers, preachers, housewives and businessmen. We host two fish fries each year, one in the Spring and one in the Fall, where we feed around 600 patrons and provide a social gathering for our town's people. By way of projects we provide two scholarships each year for students at Oak Hill High School, sponsor a student for Indiana Boy's State, pick up trash in a 3.5 mile section of State Road 18 twice a year and donate to projects for our local volunteer fire department. In past years our members have screened preschool kids at a local preschool for Kids Sight and assisted the other Wabash county clubs with Glaucoma screenings at the Wabash County Fair. We also support a local ministry to underprivileged people called the Samaritan Room, which provides food and presents to over 80 families in the Converse area at Christmas time.

This is by no means a comprehensive description of our club and its rich history, but I hope that it paints an adequate picture of our organization. We enjoy meeting together and have lots of fun and fellowship while conducting the club's business.



#### Donations to LCIF, Indiana Lions Foundation, State Projects & State & District Committees

In order for your club to receive proper credit for supporting our Indiana Lions State Projects and State Committees it is **IMPORTANT** that the following procedures be followed when making donation payments.

- 1. Send ALL state project and committee donations to me: CS PDG Ann Haffner; 11268 N. State Road 13; Syracuse, IN 46567.
- 2. Write one check payable to **District 25-G** for the combination of all state project and committee donations and include a list of the entities you are supporting with the dollar amount for each.

Example: CHECK IS WRITTEN FOR \$700

INCLUDED LIST FOR THE EXAMPLE MIGHT READ:

\$100 for School for the Blind	\$100 for Eye Bank
\$100 for Speech and Hearing	\$100 for Leader Dog
\$100 for Cancer Control	\$100 for IN Lions Foundation
\$50 for Law Camp	\$50 for Diabetes

I will record your donations, deposit your check and send the itemized information to CT Lion Ron Guth. Periodically he will mail checks to each of our 5 state projects and State Comptroller PDG Vernon Provines (for State Committee donations.) His submissions will show the dollar amount your club is donating along with the name and address of the Lion in your club to receive acknowledgement. If you wish your club's donations to remain in the district for such committees as Diabetes, Kidsight, SchoolSight, or Law Camp please specify that with your submittal. If these procedures are followed the district will have a more accurate record of what clubs are giving to our state projects and state and district committees.

**LCIF Donations:** If a Lion or club is making a donation to LCIF it **should be sent directly to LCIF** with a form downloadable from www.lcif.org. Click on "Ways to Give" then "MJF Application for New Donations" (even if the recipient will be named later.) This will insure that LCIF has an accurate record of donations from individual Lions and clubs toward Melvin Jones Fellowships.

**W. P. Woods and Richard T. Miyamoto Fellowships** should be ordered directly from the Indiana Lions Foundation or Indiana Lions Speech and Hearing using the form available on their websites or from one of our trustees.

#### **District 25G leads in LCIF contributions!**

As of the end of August, our district leads all Indiana districts in contributions to LCIF with over \$4590 recorded. #### WHO IS SPECIAL OLYMPICS?

Special Olympics is a global nonprofit organization targeting the nearly 200 million people globally with intellectual disabilities. Founded in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shriver, Special Olympics provides sports training and competition in over 30 Olympic-type sports to promote dignity, acceptance and a chance to reach one's potential. Through 200 accredited programs, Special Olympics reaches 3.4 million athletes with intellectual disabilities in over 180 counties.

Special Olympics' Mission: To provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with intellectual disabilities, giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community.

#### PARTNERSHIP WITH LIONS CLUBS

The global partnership between Lions Clubs International and Special Olympics began in 2001 with the global expansion of the Opening Eyes program. Funded by Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), more than US\$11 million has gone toward protecting sight and preventing blindness in Special Olympics from all over the world. The partnership has helped over 200,000 Special Olympic athletes receive the quality vision care they deserve, and much work remains! Opening Eyes vision screenings take place at select Special Olympics sporting events worldwide. Dear Lions:

On the evening of June 14, 2017 one of District C's clubs (Clinton Lions Club) suffered a tragic loss when their club house in Clinton, Indiana was destroyed by a fire. Through the heroics of several Lions who were at the building at the time the fire began they were able to save their vision screening equipment and a few documents. Otherwise every-thing was lost due to the fire and water damage.

Our new International President, Dr. Naresh Aggarwal's at the 2017 International Convention in Chicago introduced *"The Power of We"* emphasizing the power "WE" over "I" or "ME." The Lions of Multiple District 25 have the opportunity to demonstrate the *"Power of We,"* by assisting one of our own in a time of difficulty.

For those of you who are unfamiliar with this club, they are very active in the Clinton Community and their clubhouse was the center of their operation including many of their many community service projects as well as many of their fundraising activities. Although they will be rebuilding, these things take time and they are currently waiting on approval to begin the reconstruction. The insurance company and engineers seem to be working at a snail's pace.

Some of us in District C wondered how we could help them during this stressful time. At the District Cabinet meeting in July, the District 25-C Cabinet approved a fundraiser to assist the Clinton club with needs that they have during this rebuilding process. The Zionsville Lions Club agreed to host an activity to be held on October 15<sup>th</sup> from 1 pm to 4 pm to support both financially and emotionally the Clinton Lions. We are hoping that other Districts will join us in this event for our fellow Lions. After requesting an opinion from Lions Clubs International Legal Dept., we were advised that we may proceed with this event as long as it is Lions Helping Lions and public raised funds are not used. Lions may give personal contributions and clubs can use administrative funds for a donation if they wish. Our goal is to raise the equivalent of \$1 for every Indiana Lion.

All Lions of Indiana are invited to join us in supporting our neighboring Lions on October 15<sup>th</sup> from 1 to 4 pm at Lions Park. (Zionsville, Indiana) Enjoy a leisurely walk through the park or if you prefer a conversation with other nonwalkers and enjoy the famous ZLIONS hotdogs, ice cream and some conversation and perhaps a game or two. Attached is a flyer and registration form. Please circulate this information to the Lions of your District. Yes we checked, The Colts are not playing that afternoon.

We hope to see many of you on October 15<sup>th</sup>.

- 6. Partner with local healthcare providers to organize diabetes and vision screenings.
- Distribute current educational resources to increase diabetes awareness at a community health fair or other event.
- 8. Organize a walking club for seniors with diabetes.
- 9. Provide a diabetes magazine subscription to your local library.
- Sponsor a child in need to attend a diabetes camp.
- Donate current diabetes books to your local library and insert a bookplate to identify your club's donation.
- 12. Participate in World Diabetes Day events on November 14.
- Work with your local school to invite a health care professional to speak about diabetes.
- Post monthly articles about diabetes on your club or district website.
- 15. Promote diabetes prevention through a radio pubic service announcement.

- Sponsor a healthy cooking demonstration for people with diabetes.
- 17. Organize a school or community vegetable garden to encourage healthy eating.
- Work with a community podiatrist or foot care specialist to provide foot screenings.



- 19. Work with health care professionals to provide "at-risk" populations in your community with screenings and educational materials.
- 20. Partner with your local diabetes organization to offer programs and materials.
- Promote community resources and materials available online from LCI partner organizations (NDEP, DECA and IDF).
- 22. Hold a fundraiser for a local diabetes camp or foundation.
- 23. Provide financial assistance to people in need to help them obtain medicine and supplies for the management of their diabetes.
- 24. Promote the importance of an annual dilated eye exam to detect diabetic eye disease.
- 25. Provide translated diabetes educational materials to schools, libraries and physician offices.
