Hello Lions.

I would like to thank everyone who attended the cabinet meeting in Salem. I think everyone had a good day and got something from the meeting. I would like to thank PDG Glen Georges for donating a Lions Clubs International flag to the district. I would like to thank PDG Mark Clark and the Salem Lions for hosting the meeting and for the use of their building and LaDonna for the wonderful food that was served.

Now speaking of food, as Lions are being encouraged to do more health-related projects, especially in the areas of diabetes and pediatric cancer, maybe now is the time for rethink the meals we serve at our meetings. Hey, I agree. I love fried chicken, mashed potatoes, green beans and desserts as much as anyone else, but I think we would all admit that these are not the healthiest meals.

Fried chicken, or fried foods in general, taste great but are not good for us. Fried foods are higher in calories, higher in fat, and lower in nutrients. Eating fried foods routinely can lead to high blood pressure and high cholesterol, thus increasing your risks for a stroke, heart disease and/or a heart attack.

The desserts are often cakes, pies, cobblers or my personal favorite, BROWNIES! These desserts are often high in sugar which less healthy for our members and guests with Diabetes. Serving more fruits or sugar free desserts options would give our members more options and help them maintain a healthier diet.

I discussed in my last newsletter about the district's upcoming Guiding/Rebuilding Lion training sessions. The training sessions will be one-day classes beginning at 10:00am. The first session will be on September 23rd in Medora at the Medora Christian Church and the second session will be on October 14th in Sandborn at the Lions Club Hall on Anderson Street.

This training is for current Guiding Lions whose 3-year certification has expired, new Guiding Lions to become trained and certified and for any lion interested in learning more about Lionism and how to make their club stronger. New policy from LCI -- new Guiding Lions must have served as a club president.



Hello Fellow Lions! As the District 25E's Chair of Women's Membership Development & Participation, my goal is to give your club ideas for growing your number of women members but also to encourage the women members you already have in your organization. I realize that what works for one club will not work for another because each of our communities are unique. I am just going to throw some ideas out there and hopefully some of them will be like the spaghetti you toss at the wall & will stick.

In growing your organization, often women in the younger demographics aren't willing to join service organizations due to family commitments. Perhaps an option you could offer would be childcare during your meetings. By doing this it will not only allow them to participate in your meetings but give them a couple hours of support in caring for their families so they can recharge. It will also instill in the children a taste of being part of a service organization. Now the question could be for your club, how do we pay for this service? One idea is that the half pot that clubs do as a fundraiser at each meeting could go towards this service. Another idea is for other members to take turns volunteering each month to take care of the children. For those of us missing our

children or our grandchildren, it could be a fun alternative. Still another idea is to tap a high school student needing to get their credit for volunteer hours that their school requires and utilize them as a service. Find what will work for your organization but use this incentive to attract a segment of your population that has not been able to join and help conquer this obstacle to their joining your marvelous Lions Club.

Now for encouraging the women in your club, as Lions we are in the business of providing service to our community. We are part of a wonderful organization that does amazing things. Yet sometimes we get so focused on what we are going to do for our communities that we miss what is happening for the members in our own club. I believe that women want to feel connected when they are in an organization. If a woman member attends every meeting but no one talks to her and inquires to her well-being, she probably won't feel connected. Be sure to focus on the social aspects in your meetings as well. Perhaps have a cocktail gathering before the meeting or if you don't want to have alcohol, just call it the social time. It might even be a good idea to do it mid-meeting so folks won't think of it as a way to get to the meeting later. Also planning outings that are strictly for being social on a regular basis will build the connections as well bring fun to our fantastic clubs.

- 1. Reading to children at a local library or after school program
- 2. Create a mobile library
- 3. At an eye screening event, let each child screened choose a book that they can keep and then write their name in it
- 4. Sponsor a therapy dog that can be taken into schools for children to read to
- 5. Become a mentor
- 6. Start a Little Free Library
- 7. Add a story book to the backpack food program. Put a note in the book to Read and Enjoy and return next week for a different one.
- 8. Sponsor a grade level or classroom, asking the teacher(s) for a list of book they would like for the classroom libraries
- 9. Sponsor a contest that promotes literacy, include a celebration, activities and prizes
- 10. Fill a book cart for the children's unit at a hospital for the child to pick one out to keep
- 11. Create a book corner for a shelter
- 12. Hand out dictionaries, then go back another time to have the children pick out a story book
- 13. Start a used book store

More Fires to Put Out?

Have you ever walked into work and felt like you barely got in the door before everyone finds you to solve this problem, resolve that situation, or inform you that there are a dozen crises or fires that need your attention? Some thrive in these situations and are really good at problem solving on the spot. Most others would



find this to be a stressful or a "bad" day unless we have the tools to help us manage and cope. The other day at work, I thought that I had the day planned out, but discovered that I had additional resident interviews to complete and enter in the computer, as well as supervise a new musical group that evening that I had forgotten about. The kitchen was also late serving the evening meal. The residents were just getting food as the band was setting up. So, I was running back and forth helping serve meals, helping the band in and out of the coded door, setting up extra seating for the band's "groupies", and supervising the residents from the memory care unit. You can imagine when one of the nurses, who had missed my earlier running arounds, told me I "looked a little stressed" and asked why I was a little short. At first I wanted to continue that momentum with a few choice words, but in just a few seconds, what he said was the trigger I needed to turn off the adrenaline rush and quit looking for more "fires" to put out. I also realized that if I had PRE-PLANNED any at all, that many of the fires I put out that evening would not have happened in the first place. It seems to me that the more time I spend pre-planning and preparing, the less time I spend in crisis mode. I wonder if we as individual lions as well as at the club level could benefit from this. Do we begin evaluating and planning for the next annual event as soon as it is finished, or do we wait until a few weeks before the scheduled event, scramble around and then wonder why the event was not a success? Do we turn away a possible project because one or two lions say it cannot be done? Do we visit with lions outside of our own clubs for new ideas and solution sharing? The time has come to look at our purpose as lions at the individual and club level. Do you like what you see? If not, I know you have the power and courage to make a change. If you have not already, I challenge you to read DG Tom Polk's article in the last Hoosier Lion. Remember, from inspiration and brainstorming come great things!



The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness

For more than 15 years, LCIF's SightFirst program and the World Health Organization (WHO) have partnered to serve more than 127 million children by working to eliminate avoidable childhood blindness. The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness is an initiative that began in 2001. Since then, 51 Child Friendly Eye Care Centers have been established and supported in 50 countries within Africa, the Americas, the Eastern Mediterranean, Europe, Southeast Asia, and the Western Pacific. The centers provide preventive, therapeutic, and rehabilitative eye care services for children aged 0-15 years. To date, more than 67,000 pediatric eye care staff have been trained, more than 13 million children have been screened for eye diseases, and more than 127 million children have received treatment. There have also been nearly one million education sessions for parents, caregivers and healthcare staff. Because of your donations to LCIF, millions of children have been given the chance to avoid childhood blindness.


