


### Campus Club Committee Report To Cabinet - August 28, 2011

- 1) The editor of the Peterborough Club's newsletter will publish a report from the Trent Campus Club each edition if Trent Campus supplies that report. I request that the editor of the Governor's Newsletter do the same so everyone in the District is fully aware of the good things these young Lions are doing.
- 2) We will encourage members of the club to attend Zone Meetings and the Region Rally.

# LCIF Report to Cabinet

# Aug 28, 2011

The participation level for District A-3 was good but didn't reach our goal for 2010-2011. Maybe we set the bar a little too high to begin with. Although in comparison to other districts we were above average. Our goal for last year was set at 10% greater than the \$26,792.25 total for the previous 2009-2010 year. Sadly, our district's contribution for last year came in lower than the previous year at \$23,790.86. As far as the goal for the coming year, I am realistically asking for a 10% increase on last year's contribution to \$26,200 as our district goal for 2011-2012.

The solution to the problem of getting universal participation by all clubs is difficult. Every Lion, I am sure, is aware of the successes that the Lions Clubs International Foundation achieves on their behalf but it's difficult for some clubs to make a solid commitment to support the foundation on a regular and sustained basis. It's all about setting goals and we can only keep asking to get everyone's attention.

The idea to create a model where every club participates would be utopian. It's like the expression that you can lead a horse to water but you can't make it drink. The information is being bombarded from all angles; a complete web site has been set up on line. It's the lack of commitment that has to change.

A new approach will be initiated this year. A letter will be sent to every club. In cases where there may have been a total absence of information in the past, ways of obtaining this information will be given either by consultation off the World Wide Web or from presentations at region rallies or by the old fashioned method of face to face on invitation to club meetings. COURTICE LIONS CLUB-not enough members. A strong few, holding it together, Lions Jack and Evelyn Fisher work tirelessly to improve their numbers, but need help of neighboring clubs. Other members work the flea market, selling Nevada Tickers Etc. And they contribute admirably to the community with the little they have to work with. Extra Publicity and promotion might be the key to building a stronger Club and ultimately a larger one.

BOWMANVILLE - Strong executive - close to 42 members, many long service Lions, many decorated Lions, seem to bring in new members as older ones leave due to health reason or mobility concerns - appear to have a core of hard workers and should be encouraged to keep up the good work they do in the community . A great mix of song (Pianist accompanied with a song leader). A fun club to visit.

NEWCASTLE - Home of the \$2 beer and liver and onions, I've died and gone to Heaven (this was my 1<sup>st</sup> visit opinion on my campaign visit).Upon staying for the meeting, I found solid following of the Agenda, and lots of fun. This club also has a strong Executive team and supportive long time members. PORT HOPE- ATTENDED  $80^{TH}$  Anniversary in the spring of this year. They were the sponsors of the Cobourg Lions Club, 62 years ago.

I was encouraged by the turnout that night, but the club seems stalled somewhere around 18 members, again, the need for more recognition in the Community, should be a priority, How to increase awareness in order to boost membership remains a challenge.

COBOURG LAKESHORE LIONS - This club formed it charter in 2007, primarily from a strong Lioness club. It continues to operate with all female Lions with one exception, a new male member was inducted approximately 3/4 of the way into 2010–2011 Lions year.

With many members, who were on board as Lioness exceeding 1–20–25 and even 30 years as members they have a true grasp on Lionism and its goals. They continue to sign up new members and now number 25. They work alongside the Cobourg Lions club on the annual Lions Art Show and Sale(Waterfront Festival) every year. They also involve themselves in other projects and are quite an aggressive group who budget their dollars, donating to many different charitable causes.

COBOURG LIONS CLUB- This is my home club and I am quite proud to say this. We struggle as do all clubs maintaining 45-50 members. At the end of last fiscal year we had one member move to P.E.I. another to Calgary. We presently have another 3 member whose health does not permit them to attend meetings. Our average age as at may 2010 was the highest in the zone at 70.4 years of age. A youth movement is definitely in the cards. We now have a relatively young board of Directors and as long as 20 or so Past Presidents, support as oppose to criticism, I am confident out numbers will be up in membership and hopefully down in average age.

The biggest challenge for this club is to manage and maintain our hall, which we now own, lock, stock and Barrel. The disadvantage of course is we now pay taxes. The building is over 30 years old and upkeep never comes cheap. We must make sure it stays busy in order to balance the business side of things.

It is important to note that none of the money we raise through the community projects goes into the hall coffers. This money must come through frugal catering of weddings, banquet, hall rentals etc.
