Regular Meeting of Directors – June 6, 2011

Lion President Don called the meeting to order at 7:01pm. In attendance were Lion President Don, Lion Keith, Lion Harvey, Lion Astrida, Lion Marion, Lion Denys, Lion Jane, Lion Owen.

Lion Don asked for a motion for approval of the minutes for May 2nd, 2011. So moved by Lion Astrida, seconded by Lion Denys. Carried

- ★ Lion Jane presented an appeal for a couple whose 9 year old son has multiple health problems and needs to be kept busy. The camp at Wesley Acres would provide an agenda for this child to keep him busy and our portion would be \$ 211.88. A motion was made by Lion Keith and second by Lion Denys, that we support this family. Carried
- ★ Lion Owen has received our annual offer of insurance from Darling Insurance, to the tune of \$756.00 for \$2 million of liability for the Directors and their activities. Lion Owen made a motion that we renew this policy, second by Lion Harvey. Carried

- ★ A Thank you letter was received from ENSS for our donation to the Breakfast Program.
- ★ A request was received for the trophies for the Athletic Program at ENSS for both male and female MVPs. Trophies are to be presented at the Athletic Banquet. Lion Owen made a motion that we spend a total of \$30.00, second by Lion Keith. Carried
- ★ Lion Owen spoke of our participation in the Dragon Boat Festival on June 11th at Gosport. The hours for our part of the operation are from 10:15-1pm. Lion Owen is looking for a couple more volunteers for this event.
- ★ The Streetfest sponsored by the DBIA is to be held on Saturday July 16th. Lion Owen indicated that the street will be closed for the entire day with a dance in the evening from 7-11pm. The DBIA has asked if we would supply food during the day and the Rotary would like us to provide food during the evening. During the daytime, Lion Owen would like to start around 11am, with the possibility of closing down for a few hours in the afternoon. In the

evening (around 7pm until about 10pm) several events will be taking place and this would be an excellent opportunity for us to make a few dollars.

- ★ Also, on Friday, July 15th we have the Trulife luncheon for approximately 100 people.
- ★ The luncheon at Maplewood is subject to change from June 25 until July 9 this will be confirmed.
- ★ Lion Keith spoke to the yard sale date being Saturday August 20th. The format will be similar to that of last year, with the rental of tables and patrons can drop off sale items.
- ★ The Art Show in conjunction with the Brighton Arts Council, the dates are October 14,15 and 16.

- ★ Lion Don has an appeal from Ontario Junior Farmers who are looking for funds to offset their operating cost. A motion was made by Lion Harvey, seconded by Lion Keith, that we donate \$100.00 toward their costs. Carried
- ★ Lion Harvey spoke regarding the Leo Club, reporting that he has spoken with the school principal who was very receptive to the Leo's meeting at the school. It has been suggested that meeting around the lunch hour at the school may prove to be more productive with the attendance being consistent.
- ★ A motion for adjournment from lion Astrida.

This Month's Taste of the Past

(A regular feature by Lion Harvey Moore, Club Historian)



- ❖ On July 3, 1952, it was decided that in September regular Club meetings would be on the second and fourth Monday of each month. Arrangements were made to transport children from the summer camp to the local churches on Sundays.
- ❖ \$40 was donated towards the cost of a leg brace for a local boy. It was noted that 63 children between the ages of 8 and 14 were at the summer camp that year.
- ❖ On September 4, 1952, the regular meeting of September 22nd was cancelled and replaced by a meeting on September 19th, so members could attend a District meeting at which the International President, Lion Edgar Elbert, of Illinois, would be speaking.
- ❖ On October 6, 1952, \$10 was donated to each of the following: Public Speaking, C.N.I.B. and the Children's Aid Society. The Club decided to donate the necessary materials and a clock for the new score board at the arena. Twenty gallons of paint were purchased to paint the boards surrounding the arena ice surface.
- ❖ At the Directors' meeting of November 27, 1952, \$50 was donated towards Christmas hampers for those in need.
- ❖ On December 8, 1952, a Planter's Peanuts representative was in attendance, to review prices and advice for the sale of peanuts as a money-maker. Thirty cartons were ordered. (Thus began a new era in Lions Club of Brighton fund-raising - door-to-door selling.)

And now, Some Spicy Wit

Well, now.....here are couple of items from among the multitude of things I never knew before. And now that I know, I feel compelled to bring them to you, thus fulfilling the mandate I accepted as bulletin editor: to inform the uninformed.

I hope that yew, too, will feel edified.

History is more fun when you know something about it!

MANURE

In the 16th and 17th centuries, everything had to be transported by ship. It was also before the invention of commercial fertilizer, so large shipments of manure were common.

It was shipped dry, because in dry form it weighed a lot less than when wet. But once water (at sea) hit it, it not only became heavier, but the process of fermentation began again, creating methane gas as a by-product. As the stuff was stored below decks in bundles you can see what could (and did) happen. Methane gas began to build up below decks and the first time someone came below at night with a lantern, BOOOOM!

Several ships were destroyed in this manner before it was determined just what was happening. After that, the bundles of manure were always stamped with the term "Ship High In Transit" on them which meant for the sailors to stow it high enough off the lower decks so that any water that came into the hold would not touch this volatile cargo and start the production of methane. This famous English longbow was made of the native English Yew tree, and the act of drawing the longbow was known as "plucking the yew" (or "pluck yew").

Much to the bewilderment of the French, the English won a major upset and began mocking the French by waving their middle fingers at the defeated French, saying, "See, we can still pluck yew! Pluck yew!"

Since 'pluck yew' is rather difficult to say, the difficult consonant cluster at the beginning has gradually changed to a labiodentals fricative F', and thus the words often used in conjunction with the one-finger-salute!

And further along these lines, because of the pheasant feathers on the arrows used with the longbow, the symbolic gesture is known as "giving the bird."
