

Mr. Clayson said that Red Cross had been seriously concerned for some years with the number of drowning fatalities in Canada and mentioned that 431 people drowned in Ontario last year. Whilst it was difficult to assess the success of the water safety campaign in statistical form, it was gratifying to note that there had been a big decrease in drownings in the 13-19 year old age groups in recent years, paradoxically, more people over the age of 30 were being drowned. Quoting many examples of tragedy caused by the disregard of elementary rules, the speaker said that only one person in ten was able to swim well enough to save his own life. Lack of parental supervision was one of the biggest factors in fatalities among young children and non-swimming youngsters would drown wherever they were allowed to play around water fronts without proper supervision and without the protection of life saving jackets.
