Like me, I'm sure that you have been following the news reports of the devastating earthquake in Christchurch, New Zealand. Much of the city is still without water and sewerage systems and aftershocks continue. Thousands have been left homeless as a result of the destruction.

Right now Margit and I are on our way to New Zealand to meet with Lions and view their current relief efforts. We will also meet with the mayor and Red Cross to discuss future plans.

I continue to be impressed by their commitment to helping their neighbors, despite many being affected themselves. At an emergency meeting of the Earthquake Committee last night, there was one Lion who had damage to his house, his place of work was closed, he had no power, water or sewerage connections, yet was still attending a Lions meeting to see how he could assist the citizens of Christchurch. This exemplifies Lions' "We Serve" motto. Lions have been providing assistance since the devastating earthquake February 22, and LCIF is providing US\$110,000 to help Lions in providing relief to their communities. In the past week Lions services include:

- · Delivering 500 portable toilets to Doctors Surgery's, Nurse Maud Assn. and households in eastern suburbs
- · Going door to door in the suburbs with the Red Cross to find those who need assistance
- · Providing grocery and fuel vouchers to families in need as well as food, bedding and water
- · Volunteering at welfare centres in Christchurch and Timaru
- · Raising \$34,000 during a weekend fundraiser
- · Distributing meals through a food caravan in Christchurch
- · Lions from neighboring areas traveling to Christchurch to assist in relief projects, such as door-to-door outreach, delivering food and helping with clean-up
- \cdot Lions in neighboring towns are organizing dinners for displaced families and housing for Lions in need
- Staffing two daily shifts to assist at the national Red Cross coordination office in Wellington
- · Delivering a 40,000 litre tanker of fresh water to the suburbs of Christchurch
- · Providing weekend breaks to families to escape from the city for two days

You know well that Lions Clubs greatest asset is our volunteers-you and 1.35 million Lions around the world. Wherever there is a need, there is a Lions club nearby, ready to respond with their hearts and hands. In the case of disasters, we are the first to offer help, and the last to leave.

Lions, I ask for your help in making the hope for a brighter tomorrow a reality for the people of New Zealand. The most effective and immediate way to help is through a

designated donation to LCIF for New Zealand relief.

From New Zealand to Haiti to Pakistan, Lions and our foundation are rebuilding homes and lives. Lions are building bridges of compassion with our hearts and hands, in New Zealand and all around the world.

Just before 1:00 pm on Tuesday, February 22, a devastating earthquake registering 6.3 on the Richter scale struck the city of Christchurch, New Zealand and its surrounding communities. A majority of the residences within the country's second largest city have been left without power, water and the most basic necessities. Within the two days following the disaster, reports confirm that 75 individuals lost their lives due the disaster and hundreds more are missing.

The Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) service team members have been in contact with Past International Directors Ron Luxton and Cliff Heywood, as well as the council chairperson, district governor and the MD 202 Alert Chairperson. I immediately approved a US\$10,000 emergency grant for the initial relief efforts. District Governor Raewyn Clearwater responded by purchasing a bulk supply of drinking water, a great concern for many community members. She stated in recent correspondence, "the people were so grateful to the Lions for the water that many wanted to help pay. They were very moved to see many Lions who were affected by the quake helping the people of the city."

The district is also providing US\$20,000 to several area community centers that are preparing food for displaced residents.

Our Foundation has received an outpouring of inquiries from around the world. I often refer to the Foundation as a bridge to provide hope. Hope for a better future. Hope for those suffering. Hope for those who lost everything. Let us truly be that bridge to the people of Christchurch and a "Beacon of Hope" to others around the world.

Prince Charles Public School is ready to "do something amazing." The local school has received the Helping Hands award - a 50/50 match grant from the worldwide organization Let Them Be Kids to build the first accessible playground in Quinte West. We're here for the right reasons, we want to give the students something they deserve," said Cindy Nickerson, chairwoman of the playground committee during a kickoff of the school's fundraising campaign Monday. Nickerson said many children throughout Trenton are not able to take advantage of playgrounds because they are wheelchair accessible." We would never build anything less than something that would include all children." Each student received pledge forms this week to collect donations for the project. For every dollar the school raises, Let Them Be Kids will donate another dollar. So far, the school

has raised \$6,000. Nickerson said equipment for the new playground will cost upward of \$60,000, so the school is hoping to raise at least half that cost. The school will also need to cover the costs of ground preparation, taxes, freight and upkeep of the playground. The grant certainly is a huge contribution," said Nickerson. "What is more though is the experience Let Them Be Kids has with helping us put together a project that will help a community learn that ordinary people can do extraordinary things when we work together." The playground build will take place June 18. Students from the school, volunteers and representatives from Let Them Be Kids will take part in the build.
