- The Emergency Grant, EMR18311/A3, was completed in July. The required documents, news articles, photos, and original receipts were organized and compiled into a binder and sent to LCIF. I received notification that the final report and documents have been accepted and our grant is now completed. A sincere thank you to IPCC Kevin Banfield for encouraging us to apply for the grant. The clubs responded immediately to the "Adopt a LTC Facility" idea and we were able to assist and encourage the staff of the facilities. Many of our clubs have continued to serve to their assigned homes.
- 2. The Trenton Memorial Hospital foundation Grant, MAT 17958/A3, was approved in June and due to a gap in communication we did not get the funds right away. The presentation to the Trenton Memorial Hospital Foundation was made on August 15 with Lions from Trenton, Brighton, Batawa, Frankford in attendance as well as the IPDG and DG. Lion Jeff Moorhouse is the coordinator and he let me know that the Smart IV Pumps have been ordered and he is waiting for the paperwork from TMHF.

You take it to a local business like a pet store and inside are little dog tags worth \$1.00 or \$5.00 or \$20.00 The goal is for the business to raise up to \$500.00 to sponsor a puppy. The business does not have to donate any money at all. The money comes from the customers. After this is done the business will get a plush putty that they pick from a list provided and if the club has put their name on the form they get a puppy as well and also pictures of the puppy and information about it just like clubs have done before. Clubs can still do it the way they did before and just fill out the form with the kit. It is just a new way to get businesses and Lions working together.

The results of this training is already evident. More club reporting is being done on MyLion.

Club secretaries who are still experiencing difficulties are reaching out to my house – where I immediately put them on the phone to Bill LOL – and to Lions Barb and Theresa. Even though there are still difficulties, it is heartening to know that our Lions realize they have a lot of support and a lot of expertise to call on, and that they will not be left on their own, or brushed off. If one of us does not know the answer for you, we <u>will</u> find out and get back to you. As well, many of my evenings have been spent participating in virtual meetings, both with MD "A"- NAMI (North American Membership Initiative) and with the other 2VDGs of MD"A". There have also been various learning sessions presented in a virtual setting.

I have had the opportunity to touch base with many clubs throughout the District, in one manner or another. Many clubs are struggling to continue to provide service or fund raising. I hope that in my conversations with these clubs who have reached out to me, that I have alleviated some of their fears and guilt feelings. Please accept this 1<sup>st</sup> report to Cabinet as the Global Membership Coordinator. This has been an interesting position to accept. I have been sending some of the Club membership Chairs info that I feel may help them get a bit of a clearer picture of what we need to do with Membership. Unfortunately, some clubs have no membership chairs and other clubs have chairs that aren't even responding.

I have invited Lion Kate to join me on this venture as I hope that we can not only spark the clubs to start looking at ways that we can still bring members into the clubs but also ways that we can retain the members that we currently have. After looking at our clubs through the Club Assessment forms and viewing some of their retention numbers we hope to be able to tell which clubs need retention help and which clubs are in need of new members to add to their clubs. We feel that both are particularly important to try and maintain a balance.

Currently we have seen the addition of 18 new Lions to our District, however we have also seen a drop of 28 members. We hope to be able to change these numbers around and start heading to a positive through various methods such as asking members to transfer if they aren't happy rather than having them drop Lions, encouraging club leaders to follow up on with their members as often as possible.

Communications is one of the key things of helping to keep Lions in your clubs. And keep all members involved as often as possible. Too many times we see small groups working every event and sometimes it is because members get along better with those people. We need to work together and learn that people are different from each other, but we need to respect those differences. We have collected some of the past committees notes to try and put together a program to help Membership Chairs on a different level than we have in the past and yet still get the same message out to them.

One of the things that does concern us through all of this is the "NAMI" program. It seems to be doing exactly the same things as the Global Membership Team should be covering but overlooking the GMT people we currently have in place. Unfortunately, I am still trying to learn the NAMI program, but I will do my best.

I understand that Zone 43 South will be looking into promoting this at their Zone meetings. Hopefully, it will work but what concerns me most is we are teaching each zone differently by doing this. I am always open to trying new things, but I wonder if this shouldn't have been taught at the Zone Chair training sessions rather than one Zone at a time?

#### **LIONS QUEST** Chair Report to Cabinet September 27, 2020

While many of us are finding all the limitations of Covid very trying, it has been a time of great collaboration and excitement for those of us involved in Lions Quest!

Historically, our main reason for existence was the planning and providing of workshops for educators and community members as they work with the children and youth in the schools and community.

These workshops were interactive, informative and IN PERSON. None of us had ever considered that maybe there might be a way to reach even more educators and community members. With the advent of restrictions on travel, sizes of group gatherings, social distancing and the uncertainty of when some or all of these restrictions might be lifted, Lions Quest Staff and District Chairs and Trainers have been meeting very regularly on Zoom.

Our Executive Director, Joanne McQuiggan has also been meeting with Lions Quest staff in Chicago and facilitators from around the world as together they worked on workshops that would give participants as close to the same workshop experience as our in person workshops provided, but in the comfort and safety of their own homes. These workshops are now ready to be presented across Canada! We have four dates in October and November already booked and now we are looking for educators and people who are interested in finding out about our School Based programs to join in a virtual workshop.

We also have two other shorter sessions for Community members and Lions who want to find out more about the impact that Lions Quest can have for the children and youth in our Country. These could even be presented at a Lions Meeting as a learning session. These are also virtual sessions. The technology that is used provides for small group discussions as well as full group participation and your can attend in your pajamas!

While all of this is very exciting to those of us who are directly involved, <u>we do need your help and</u> <u>support</u>. We need money to keep our staff and we need money to provide the materials and resources to the workshop participants. Without the support of the Lions Clubs in District A3, we cannot provide these sessions. Over the last couple of years, we were able to provide four very successful workshops. The people who attended rated the sessions as very worthwhile. We had a grant from LCIF which assisted with half of the cost of these sessions. This was greatly appreciated. Our Lions Quest funds are now depleted and without the monetary support from our Clubs, we cannot provide these virtual workshops.

Research clearly outlines the many stresses and challenges that families and especially children and youth are facing right now. Social and emotional learning is one of most critical skills that children and youth need. Lions Quest programs focus on how educators and community members can help children and youth to develop these crucial life skills. It cannot be over emphasized just how much stress our children and youth are facing right now at the same time as their parents and families are struggling with many of the same issues. Lions Quest can help but only when we have the funds on hand to provide the workshops and resources that are needed.

Please challenge your club, your zone clubs, your region clubs and our District to support Lions Quest. Without your support our children and youth will not have access to the workshops and programs we have available. District A 3 has been a leader in providing these sessions. Please do not let our children and youth down now.

#### **Bath & District Lions Club**

During pandemic, services and activities included;

Ongoing access to our Medical Mobility Equipment Program led by Lion Andrew Hobbis. This program enables us to lend medical equipment to patients in our community who could otherwise not afford the proper equipment to recover from any altering injury or illness. All of the equipment has been donated to the club and Lion Andrew maintains the equipment

Our food bank has continued to be a shining beacon in our community for those in need. Lion Tom Houston is the chairperson for this program. When the lockdown was implemented by the provincial government, Lion Tom wanted to make sure our community members would not go hungry.

Our Club President, Lion Daniel McGrath, has also continued to help serve the community by volunteering his time for the meals on wheels program.

Once some of the provincial restrictions were lifted and the Bingo Hall opened for business, we were happy to hear that we would once again be receiving funds from the OLG even if we were not yet allowed to send volunteers to work the Bingo's.

The club reunited at the beginning of September with Governor Don Radnor and his lovely wife, Ruth Anne, joined us for an outside bar-b-que at our club president residence. The governor performed the executive induction ceremony for the 20\21 season, as well as the induction of two new members to our club.

With the new season under way and funds finally coming in, we have been back to work looking for ways to help our community.

We partnered with our local pharmacy, Bath Pharmasave, and we purchased \$1000.00 worth of masks at the pharmacist's cost price. We started by providing our local elementary school with 270 reusable masks. We realize that this mask situation is a very new concept for everyone and we wanted the students in our community to feel safe.

We are also in the process of providing our local Scouts group with a donation of \$500.00 to help them purchase what they need so they can continue to safely meet.

Last but not least, Lion Dave Bryant, came up with the brilliant idea of helping out our local churches so they could open their doors to their congregations in a safe and healthy environment. We have 3 churches in our community and each will be given \$1000.00 to help with the restrictions of the pandemic.

Our membership Chairman Lion Fred Brown has been very busy with recruitment. After the induction of the 2 new members on Sept. 2, 2020, Lion Fred has recruited another 2 members. We are all very proud of his hard work and dedication to the club.

In the next couple of weeks, our club will be unveiling the bench being placed in honor of Lion Doug Hawley (RIP) which is being placed in downtown Bath, across the street from the Royal Bank.

We are continuously communicating through phone, text, email as well as our monthly Virtual Zoom Business meeting.

#### **Storrington Lions Club**

The Club's Chicken BBQ dinner on August 29th was a resounding success. 237 meals were sold, generating a net profit of almost \$3000.00. The Club is planning a Pork Roast dinner on October 24th (see flyer attached). Hall rental bookings have resumed in the Storrington Club in full compliance with infection control measures and protocols issued by Public Health.

The Club feels it is not fair to ask members to pay dues during the Covid-19 pandemic and has decided to cover all membership dues during this global health crisis. Members are aware many, if not most, Lions Clubs and members are experiencing challenges and financial hardships because of the Covid-19 pandemic. Lions International should have forgiven membership dues this year. This is adding additional strain on our Club as we are not generating the usual revenues to cover our operating costs (heat, hydro, insurance, etc). We hope to be able to survive until regular hall use resumes.

D'Arcy Marconi is the new Club president. Johan Beskers and Catherine Reynolds will share the role of Secretary. Vicki Shaw is the new Treasurer.

#### Sydenham Lions

Membership: Reduced by 2 to 18 members due to death of long standing member Lion Bud Young and sudden serious medical condition of Lion Dr. Paul Radford.

Activities: Since the June 2020 Report included distribution of the snacks to Kingston Rideaucrest Long Term Care Facility and planting of 500 seedlings in the Sydenham area as part of the 100 years of Lions in Canada and the planting of 100,000 trees in Canada.

Our Club submitted a Community Grant application to South Frontenac Township and has worked with the Township for a 3rd bench and wheelchair paid in the Sydenham Village Point Park. The park bench will arrive on Oct 8 to the Township Yard for staff to install at the Park.

Our Club meets at the Community Room at Sydenham Library and South Frontenac Township has only now opened up Facility and Halls for Meetings in compliance with COVID-19 Ontario Provincial Stage 3 Restrictions. Sydenham Lions 1st meeting will be Monday Sept 21st at the Sydenham Library Community Room.

#### **Newburgh-Camden Lions**

The halls are still closed in Stone Mills Township so no meetings held since August 8, 2020.

Fifty-eight (58) hours of maintenance by 3 Lions members and 2 community members have been done at Centennial Park during the past month. Lawns have been mowed, limbs have been picked up and a sign stating the Centennial Park name has been refurbished and installed. Each day the washrooms are checked and on the weekends they are cleaned/disinfected by 2 Lions.

Three pieces of medical equipment were donated to the Club and picked up by the Club September 6th.

The Club will hold an Electronics Recycling event (OES approved) on September 19th in Newburgh from 8:00 4:00. Good clothing will also be collected for the Ontario Federation of Cerebral Palsy at this event.

A meeting is planned for September loth at the home of Lions Victor & Mary Ann Smith since there are several business matters to be discussed.

#### **Amherstview Lions Club**

Membership 23. A New member Randy Evans joined July 15, 2020

Supported VON Meals on Wheels \$477. The club paid for 92 meals for senior residents of Amherstview and Area

Supported Lionhearts' Inc., a registered charity is providing up to 300 meals three times a week to residents of Amherstview and Area.

Supported 1<sup>st</sup> Amherstview/Bath Scouting Group ... The scouting group of beavers, cubs, and scouts are now forced to meet outdoors. The group required a new barbeque and supplies for meetings and for fund raising activities. The club supported these youth activities.

Purchased sneeze guards (size 23" x 31")\$(113)... The Guards will be made available to groups that need them on a loan basis. The Kingston, Lennox & Addington Alzheimer's Society have made a request. The guards will be used during club projects.

Sale of masks \$61. One of the members is making masks and selling them to members of the club for \$8.00. The totals of the \$8.00 will be donated to the Administration Account.

Membership Dues have been reduced to \$75.00 and are being collected. Membership dues to A4 and MD and Lions International have all been paid. Event - Car Wash September 26, 2020 raising funds for Christmas Baskets

#### Pittsburgh Lions Club

No report as their hall is closed on Gore Road Army Navy Airforce Club. Have tried to get in touch with them by email and telephone.

#### Kingston Lions Club

- All our members are looking at different way to fund raise, but it is not an easy task.

#### Norwood:

In August the Directors were hosted by President Terry on his large screened in porch. ## Zone 43 South, Report to September 27, 2020 Cabinet Meting

District Governor Don, Members of the District A-3 Cabinet, Lions and Leos:

#### **Communications:**

I have been able to maintain communications with all of the clubs in Zone 43 S through an end of month phone call. Four of the five clubs are healthy, but I am concerned about one of the clubs. No new executive members have stepped forward for the 2020-2021 Lions' year so last years' executive have remained in place. Two members of the executive resigned and left Lions in the spring.

Monthly reports for July and August were distributed to the District Governor, the First District Vice Governor, the Second District Vice Governor, and the Region 43 Chair. September's report will be forthcoming closer to the end of the month.

#### Membership:

Membership in the Zone remains basically unchanged with the good news of 5 news members for Trenton Lions. With the exception of Trenton, membership numbers are basically unchanged. Four Lionesses have converted to Lions' membership and one new member has joined the club. Unfortunately, Trenton lost one of their life members, Lion Will Kennedy who passed this week.

#### Service:

The limitations imposed on all clubs due to the Coronavirus Pandemic have impacted most club service activities. Major annual service events in almost every locale have had to be cancelled due to the pandemic. Clubs have responded with tremendous creativity to identify new service activities in support of first responders and health care personnel in all the communities in 43S. **The District A-3 Facebook Page** is proving to be a tremendous resource for the sharing of ideas on service activities. Most of the Zone 43S clubs also have their own Facebook page.

The Secretary training sessions attended by a few of the secretaries is helping with the Service reporting through MyLCI. This must be constantly monitored and reporting encouraged.

#### **Meetings:**

Scheduling regular membership meetings for the 4 of 5 clubs in the zone who do not own their own facilities is proving to be a challenge. All clubs are meeting regularly either in-person or virtually. Brighton were able to start meetings September 8 but have been bounced from their 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Mondays by municipal council meetings. Colborne Legions is open but only late in the week, impacting Colborne Lions us of the shared meeting space. Batawa were able to meet at their facility up until this week. The new Ontario regulations limiting attendance to 10 people at unstaffed locales have forced them back to Zoom meetings. Zoom and conference calls are filling the gap, but not without shortcoming.

I have scheduled all my ZC visits to the five clubs but these visits may have to change due to COVID-19 constraints. The second and third (and maybe a fourth) Zone Advisory meeting will be scheduled based on the results of our first meeting.

The first Zone 43 South District Governor's Advisory Meeting, now called the Zone 43 South Workshop (focused on the LCI North American Membership Initiative (NAMI)) is going to take place Thursday evening September 24. PID Terry Graham and PCC John Whyte have worked with me over the last month or so putting the workshop together. I am fortunate to have two such knowledgeable, experienced, and hardworking Lions to put the workshop together. Zone 43 South has been named a pilot site of this initiative. The results of which will be shared in the next couple of weeks. COVID-19 regulations limited attendance at the Trenton Lions Hall to a total of 34 people. The intent was to have the President, Secretary, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President/Service Chair and Membership Chair from each club. We feel fortunate to have 17 attendees coming but one club was unable to send anyone due to personal illness and concerns related to COVID-19. Four out of the Five Zone 43 S clubs will be represented. PDG Frank Hewitt has been invited to attend as an observer and is being asked to report our success back to the District Leadership. ## WEBMASTER & TECHNOLOGY

Cabinet Members, District Officers, Lions, Lioness and Guests,

Please accept this 1<sup>st</sup> report to Cabinet as the Technology & Webmaster Chair. I would like to start off by saying how pleased I am to be given this position. It certainly was a challenge and one that I was eager to get into.

As you may have already seen I stripped down what was there from the past and took the chance to rebuild the site in what I hope was more up to date and a more user-friendly format. If you haven't already had a chance to check out the site, I invite you to go to <a href="http://www.e-district.org/sites/a3/">http://www.e-district.org/sites/a3/</a> and take a look. I do want to say that I am proud of what has been accomplished in such a short time.

Of course, it will be an ongoing job as we need to make sure that it is kept up to date and as secure as possible. The new Directory has been loaded up and it will be updated as the corrections happen. Any changes made are done in RED print so that we can keep track of them as well the date is changed every time an update is made so that people can tell it is the latest version.

One of my major concerns at the moment is the information that is on the page. In this day of instant contact I realize that people feel the need to have the information at their fingertips but this also possess a security risk as the Directory itself contains home address, email addresses and phone numbers (both cell and home) and in some cases spouses names. As we all know anything posted online is always open to being downloaded and with it on our webpage it really is not secure. But it can always be updated for everyone to see. One of the things I would like to recommend is that we start to consider using the MEMBER'S ONLY section that is a part of the page system already. Anything that contains people private information could then be added to that section requiring a password for members to enter. It also provides other programs as well for our use such as a private message board, the ability to do e-vites to events, the ability to do polls across the District as well as Newsletters and Group emails. Some of these programs may prove to be quite useful and some maybe of no use but they would still be available.

Currently one of the security measures in place is removing some of the address and phone numbers and just using an email link with the person's name or pictures. This way if you click on

the photos it will either send them an email directly to that person OR some photos have been linked to the other clubs e-webpages so people can see what is happening at the other clubs.

This way we hope to be able to have the clubs update their websites for public use as well. One of the things I find strange is that our e-webpages are provided free of charge and with a bit of practice can be a huge asset to clubs. Yet, many clubs feel the need to spend money purchasing a site that they still need to look after. However, each club has the right to do what they feel is necessary. IF any club would like to learn more about setting up their webpages, I do my best to make myself available to help out OR if you would like the Young Adults of Peterborough Branch Club is always willing to keep it up to date for a nominal fee.

Also, I have purchased the Zoom Meeting program and I understand that several others have as well. I have offered meeting times out to the clubs in my Zone and have had one or two clubs take advantage of that availability. I realize that everyone is hoping this will all end soon, however this gives everyone the chance to still meet and to do so safely. So I will continue to offer it out.
