Our Mission

Empowering Canadians with disabilities to navigate their world with confidence and independence, by providing a Dog Guide at no cost and supporting them in their journey together.

The Dog Guide School opened in 1983. It was originally a high school. The building has changed a lot over 39 years. It has been expanded and renovated many times to keep up with the growing need for Dog Guides. During the 39 years over 3200 dog guide team have graduated. There are presently 1100 dog guide teams working across Canada. The demand for support dogs grows every day. The goal is to graduate 250 dog guide teams this year. We have to look to the future and how to make this happen. A new facility will make this happen. The Lions Foundation of Canada is owned by our LIONS. We need to support the school. Many of our Lions have people in our community that need independence, safety and quality of life that Dog Guides provide.

Giving Tuesday was created in 2012 as a simple idea: a day that encourages people to do good. Giving Tuesday reminds us to give back during the beginning of the holiday shopping season. This year, Giving Tuesday takes place on Tuesday, November 29th. You can help us unleash potential by donating on November 29th as we strive to reach our fundraising goal of \$105,000 which provides three Canadians with the life-changing gift of a Dog Guide. On Wednesday, November 16,2022 I had the privilege of attending the Land 'O Lakes Lions Club meeting to do a presentation about Lions Quest. Several of their members have been working hard to engage with the administration of two schools in their area. The schools are very interested in learning about the Lions Quest program and how it might support the Social and Emotional Learning of their students. Unfortunately they were unable to attend the meeting due to the impending strike that may see their students back to on line learning.

I was able to share the content of the Lions Quest program with the 30 plus Lions that attended their meeting. Interest in promoting the program was high and two of the members have curriculum which they will share with the schools as they are able to do so.

It is hoped that in the new year, perhaps we may be able to hold a workshop for one or both of these schools.

It costs \$350 to train one educator and provide that person with a full curriculum for a year for the grade level of their choice. Of course once the educator has the training and materials, they can use it the rest of their careers and beyond.

Literacy Idea November 13, 2022. Coleen Power Literacy Chair District A3

Do you have about one hour a week to spare? If yes, could you consider volunteering your time to help a new Canadian improve his or her English skills? The New Canadians Centre would gladly pair you up with a new immigrant who needs to improve his/her conversational skills or even learn a few words of English. This task may appear daunting to you. You may also think that you don't have any teaching skills. However, teaching skills are secondary. Most of these new Canadians just need someone to talk to. Many of them are also very lonely, especially Moms who have to stay at home with the babies or pre-school children. This hinders their exposure to hearing spoken English and reduces their opportunity to practice speaking English.

You actually don't need to do an in-person class, just do it from the comfort of your home and save on gas using FaceTime, WhatsApp, Messenger video, etc.

If you still feel intimidated, here is a very simple activity that you could do with a new Canadian who already speaks a bit of English:

Every day, for 5-6 days, your student will write down one or more sentences about what they did that day. They are not allowed to use Google translate. If they don't know a word, they are to write it in their native language, mixed in with the English they already know. By the end of six days, he or she will have written 5 or more sentences. (I have done this. It works well!) Eg. The student may have written: Today I go park with baby and I see big araña (?) Etc.

Ask the student to take a picture of their daily journals and send them to you by text or email. They could also use the Genius Scan App to send the document. Google how to use it.

Once you receive their homework, print a copy for your records, or copy and paste into a new document. Then, directly below their sentence, type the corrections, using correct grammar, punctuation, and spelling.

The next day, during your FaceTime class with the student, have them read their version, sentence by sentence.

Gently tell them where they made mistakes.

Encourage them to self-correct if possible.

If not, give them the correct answer and have them repeat it a couple of times.

Don't be condescending in any way.

Learn how to say very good and excellent in their mother tongue. It really makes them laugh and encourages them to do better.

Take the opportunity to practice different tenses of the verbs in some of their sentences, eg. go/went, am going, have to go, will go, shop/shopped, eat/ate, etc.

Suggest synonyms for some of the nouns or verbs, eg. Bug/insect, drive/drove, bit/large.

Give them the correct word for the words they didn't know, eg. araña/spider.

Help them with the correct pronunciation. Eg. Many of them cannot pronounce the "th" in the, this, these, those, than, them etc.

Help them with the plural of words – baby/babies, park/parks. Focus on the use of articles, eg. The park, my baby, or, practise the past tense which is very difficult.

Take time to ask them about their family, their country, their customs, their daily life, etc. Reread the corrected sentences to your student and have him/her repeat after you. Send a copy of the corrected sentences to your student to practice reading at home. Bonus: Video tape yourself reading the sentences slowly. Forward it to your student so they can practice mimicking you. Apparently this is very helpful according to polyglots.

Keep the lesson light, but interesting for your student. Next thing you know, the hour will have flown by and you will both have had fun.
