As we enter the second half of our Lions year it seems like the perfect time to look at the second word in our International President's theme this year. **Harmony**. While we may at first think of **harmony** as it is defined by the dictionary as "a pleasing

combination of musical tones in a chord", that definition doesn't really match what I think Dr. Yamada was trying to have us consider.

My thesaurus gives me several words as synonyms that are perhaps more meaningful for our Lions Clubs- consensus, accord, co-operation, good will, rapport and understanding. Imagine what our clubs might accomplish if we worked together on our projects and in our meetings with the aim of building consensus rather than voting on issues that can cause "winners and losers". It is true that building consensus often takes longer than a simple vote. It takes longer because it requires that all participants really listen to the views and ideas of other members and ensure that they understand the points of view of people who do not see the issue through the same lens as they do. It takes longer because truly understanding what another person believes requires that we listen for the feelings as well as the facts that others are trying to share. In any dispute, no matter how minor, there are usually three sides- yours, mine and the one that may give us a chance to move forward together.

Some of you may be asking why I am so concerned with looking in such detail at the three words, dignity, harmony, humanity, Dr. Yamada has chosen for us this year. I am taking these three words to heart because as I work my way through this year as your governor, I am faced week after week with the reality that some members are not feeling valued. Perhaps it comes from the lack of dignity or respect with which they are treated or are treating their fellow Lions. Perhaps it comes from the lack of harmony within the club. Whether we are the cause or the recipient of the lack of **dignity** or **harmony**, the result is the same - members leave. Sometimes they leave by not coming to meetings any more, sometimes they leave by moving to a different club and sometimes they leave by resigning from Lions altogether. Maybe we can change that trend by each of us deliberately taking the time to build respect and dignity into our club meetings and events and by carefully planning to make harmony the most important goal of each time we are together. This is not for one minute to suggest that difference of opinions and ideas should be replaced with a Pollyanna approach that superficially makes everything seem okay. That would be a terrible disservice to our President. Rather, can we all take responsibility for ensuring that those two words guide our own actions and words? If we work together to make dignity and harmony our goals for this year, we may end up not only attracting even more members to our clubs, but also retaining the members we already have which will provide our communities with even greater service. Isn't that what we are all about? We Serve!

District A3 Visitation Contest

Contest Rules

The purpose of the contest is to promote a spirit of inter-club harmony and to see how other Clubs function.

- 1. Contest Period—September 1st to March 31st inclusive.
- 2. Visitation Reports are to be emailed or sent to the Visitation Chair by the 10th of the following month.
- 3. If repeated visits to the same club are made, only the single best visit score will be allowed.
- 4. A minimum of 2 Lions MUST be on each visitation.
- 5. All visits must be made in District A3 or Districts adjoining to A3.
- 6. All visits to adjoining Districts will receive member points up to 200 total kilometers round trip from their home club.
- 7. Trips within District A3 will be allowed to their total round trip kilometers measured from their home club.
- 8. Recognized Lions functions or activities are: Zone Meetings, Region Rallies, Charter Nights, District Conferences, Sports or Social events sponsored by Lions Clubs and District Leadership Evenings.
- 9. No member of Cabinet or Lion campaigning for office is eligible to win the Visitation Contest.

There are two (2) categories:

- Clubs with 25 or fewer members
- Clubs with 26 or more members

Points will be awarded as follows:

- One (1) point per member per kilometer travelled from home club
- Deduct 25% of member points if visit is made with any District Officer or International Officer on his/her Official visit
- Bonus points (100) points total if a full 10% of active membership is on the same visit
- Two hundred (200) points are awarded if 25% of the active membership is on the same visit
- Five hundred (500) points are awarded when 50% of the active membership is on the same visit

The names of the winning Clubs and the Lion who travelled the most kilometers will be announced at the District A3 Convention in April of each year.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR CHALLENGE

In 1939, three Lions founded the Lions Leader Dog Foundation when they could not buy a guide dog for their blind friend. In 1952, the name was changed to Leader Dogs for the Blind. Since the founding, Leader Dogs for the Blind have been providing guide dogs to individuals who are blind/ visually impaired or deaf and blind at no cost to the recipient. There have been many Leader Dogs provided to individuals in District A-3.



This year, District Governor Janet, with the support of the

Cabinet members, has challenged the Lions of the 51 clubs in our District to save quarters (American ones, preferred!) until each Lion has \$5.00 in quarters. Take the quarters to the club and if possible roll them and then have someone who is attending the District A-3 Convention bring them to the convention for presentation to our District A-3 Leader Dog Chairperson, Larry Martin. (A cheque for the amount collected would be okay too!) If each Lion contributed just the \$5.00 to this challenge we would raise over \$5,000 for Leader Dogs for the Blind.

This money will be used by Leader Dogs to support their programs so that even more blind/ visually impaired individuals can receive the freedom and independence provided by a guide dog.






