I am fully aware of the increasing demands for financial support being placed on our clubs from the Difference Campaign at the Lions Foundation of Canada, the Camp Huronda wish list to the request for clubs to help pay for fireworks for Camp Dorsett's Canada day celebration but I don't believe we can continue to ignore the Lions Clubs International Foundation.

I will continue to make myself available to our clubs, Zone Chairs or anyone else that wishes to learn about the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF.

Finally, I would like to thank District Governor Lion Frank for the opportunity to serve our District as LCIF chair and I apologize for failing to achieve the goal of \$31,000.00 US.
