Recently The Peterborough Lions Club recognized the efforts of one of its own with a Park Bench dedication at its Peterborough Lions Community Centre location.

Lion Ray Ostapovich, at 88 years of age, stands as a quiet force in the City of Peterborough—a man who doesn't seek the spotlight but has left an indelible mark on the community. For over 55 years, he volunteered tirelessly, embodying the spirit of service.

While Lion Ray's achievements are many, Past Chairman of the Canadian Hearing Society, Past Chairman of the Lions Multiple District A Hearing Committee, Past Chairman of the Lions Club District A3 Hearing Committee, a position he had held for 40 years, a member of the Peterborough Lions Club for over 56 years to name but a few... While any one of these is worthy of recognition, his most significant contribution, the Peterborough Lions Club Handicap/Medical Equipment Loan Program. For 17 years, Lion Ray has led this vital initiative and has provided over 4.100 assistive devices to those in need within our community. He has repaired wheelchairs, crutches, walkers, and other gear, ensuring they served those in need. His hands, weathered by countless repairs over the years, speak of his compassion and resilience.

Lion Ray's legacy isn't etched in plaques or grand ceremonies, although recently he was announced as a Pathway of Fame Community Samaritan award winner by the City of Peterborough for his many years of community support. Lion Rays legacy instead lives in the smiles of the many people who regained mobility, the elderly & infirmed who walked with dignity, and the families who borrowed equipment during tough times. The Lion Ray Ostapovich Peterborough Lions Club bench has become a quiet testament to the efforts of a tireless and well deserving volunteer.

And so, Lion Ray Ostapovich's name will be echoed through the town, not only as a Lion among Lions, but as a friend, a helper, and a beacon of selflessness.

The Millbrook and District Lions support the Millbrook Santa Claus Parade. Kids enjoyed candy and hot chocolate supplied by the Lions.






