## Report #5 Constitution & By-Laws

To District Governor Mark and Cabinet:

This is my second report to cabinet for the current Lions year.

As Constitution and By-law Chair I have reviewed District A3 Constitution and By-laws (Mar.2021) with the standard District Constitution and By-laws from Lions International for the fiscal year 2021-2022.

There are a few amendments to be made to bring the District A3 Constitution and By-laws into conformity with the Lions International standard version.

I have attached the recommended changes for the consideration of the Lion's District A3 Cabinet. If recommended by cabinet, the amendments can then be presented at the District A3 Convention for ratification.

## Proposed amendments to the District A3

Constitution and By-laws

Replace Mission Statement with the following:

## **MISSION STATEMENT**

**TO EMPOWER** *Lions clubs, volunteers and partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian service and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding.* 

Constitution: Article VI, Section 2. District Cabinet. Add sentence highlighted in gray at the end of the section.

Section 2. **DISTRICT CABINET**. The district shall have a district cabinet composed of the district governor, the immediate past district governor, the first and second vice district governors, the region chairpersons (if the position is utilized during the district governor's term), the zone chairpersons, a cabinet secretary-treasurer or a cabinet secretary and a cabinet treasurer, and such other club members as may be included in this section as amended in accordance with the amendment procedures contained herein. In addition, the global membership team district coordinator, global leadership team district coordinator, global service team district coordinator and LCIF district coordinator shall be non-voting members of the district cabinet. Each such cabinet member shall be a member in good standing of a Lions club in good standing in the district. In the event a Leo or Leo-Lion is appointed to the position of Leo/Leo-Lion cabinet liaison, the position would serve as a non-voting advisor to the cabinet.<sup>2</sup>

By-laws: Article II, Section 5. District Governor Vacancy, strike out and insertion at end of section.

Section 5. **DISTRICT GOVERNOR VACANCY**. In the event of a vacancy in the office of district governor, the same shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of the International Constitution and By-Laws. The immediate past district governor, first and second vice district governors, the region chairpersons, zone chairpersons, the cabinet secretary and cabinet treasurer (or cabinet secretary/treasurer) and past district governors, past international directors and past international presidents in the district shall convene at a date, time and place called and determined by the immediate past district governor to select a replacement for recommendation to the International Board of Directors.<sup>11</sup>

It shall be the duty of the immediate past district governor, if he/she is not available, the most recent past District governor who is available, to send out invitations fifteen (15) days in advance of the meeting to attend said meeting.

By-laws: Article II, Section 6. Qualifications and time of effectiveness. Insertion into by-laws.

(a) Has not completed a full term or major portion thereof as district governor.

[Above change becomes effective July 1, 2022]

By-laws: Article III, Section 9. Optional inclusion to allow for the appointment of a Leo/-Lion Liaison. All following sections then are renumbered.

Section 9. LEO/LEO-LION CABINET LIAISON (OPTIONAL). The district governor, in consultation with the district Leo chair, may choose to appoint a Leo or a Leo-Lion to serve a one-year term in an official non-voting capacity. The Leo/Leo-Lion cabinet liaison shall represent the interests and perspectives of Leos and Leo-Lions and facilitate communication and connection between Leos and Lions. In areas with a Leo district, the role shall be filled by a Leo-Lion or Leo, who is a current or past Leo district president, vice-president, secretary, or treasurer. In areas where no Leo district has been formed, the role shall be filled by a Leo or a Leo-Lion who is a current or former Leo club president.

The district governor shall assign the Leo/Leo-Lion cabinet liaison to the standing cabinet committee(s) that would most benefit from a young adult voice. The cabinet liaison may remain on the same committee for the duration of the year or transition among committees as determined by the district governor.

The responsibilities of the Leo/Leo-Lion cabinet liaison include:

- (a) Facilitate communication between Leos and Lions within the district.
- (b) Serve as a resource to district cabinet officers and assigned committee(s).
- (c) Coordinate with the district Leo chairperson in the promotion of the Leo club, Leo-Lion programs, and engagement opportunities for young people within the Lions' district.
- (d) Support district Leo chairperson in conducting training for Leo district officers.
- (e) Advocate for leadership and leadership training opportunities for Leos and Leo-Lions within Lions district activities.
- (f) Serve as support and point of contact for district Leos to explore Lions membership program opportunities.
- (g) Communicate with Leo district president, Leo/Leo-Lion council liaison (if appointed), and the constitutional area representative of the Leo Club Program Advisory Panel to collaborate on initiatives related to young people.
- (h) Assist in planning and integration of Leos and Leo-Lions in Lions district convention, forum events and trainings.
- (i) Attend Leo district meetings as necessary.
- (j) Chair one district collaboration project between Leos and Lions.

EXHIBIT B

RULES OF PROCEDURE SPECIAL MEETING TO RECOMMEND A LION FOR APPOINTMENT AS DISTRICT GOVERNOR Replacement of Rules 1 and 2 with the following. **Rule 1**. In the event a vacancy arises in the office of district governor, it shall be the duty of the immediate past district governor, or if not available, the most recent past district governor who is available, upon notification from the international office, to convene a meeting of the immediate past district governor, first and second vice district governors, the region chairpersons, zone chairpersons and the secretary and treasurer or secretary treasurer and all past international presidents, past international directors and past district governors who are members in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing within the district for the purpose of recommending a club endorsed Lion for appointment by the International Board of Directors.

**Rule 2**. Written invitations to this meeting shall be sent not less than fifteen (15) days in advance of the meeting. as soon as possible so that the meeting is held within the required **fifteen (15)** days of receipt of notification. The immediate past district governor, as the meeting's chairperson, shall have the authority to select the meeting site, date and time. However, he/she shall use his/her best efforts to select a centrally located meeting venue, and schedule the meeting at a convenient date and time within the required fifteen (15) days.

EXHIBIT C

RULES OF PROCEDURE SPECIAL MEETING TO RECOMMEND A LION FOR APPOINTMENT AS FIRST OR SECOND VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR Replacement of Rules 1 and 2 with the following.

**Rule 1**. In the event a vacancy arises in the office of first or second vice district governor, the district governor shall convene a meeting of the members as defined in Article II, Section 6 of these By-laws of the existing cabinet as provided for in the International Constitution and By Laws and all past international officers who are members in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in the district. It shall be the duty of the attendees at this meeting to appoint a qualified club endorsed member as first or second vice district governor for the remainder of the term.

**Rule 2**. In filling said vacancy, it shall be the duty of the district governor, or if not available, the most recently serving past district governor who is available, to send out written invitations no less than fifteen (15) days in advance of the meeting, to attend said meeting and it shall also be his/her responsibility to preside as chairperson of the meeting. The district governor, as the meeting's chairperson, shall have the authority to select the meeting site, date and time. However, he/she shall use his/her best efforts to select a centrally located meeting venue, and schedule the meeting at a convenient date and time.



This is a community initiative to mobilize seniors to become involved with local police and other service agencies including a Verona Lions Club member that focuses on seniors' needs in the community. SALT events are free for seniors and occur at various locations throughout the Township. Included is a hot meal and informative presentations on vehicle safety, fraud prevention, wills & power of attorney, etc. Zoom option is provided to watch the presentations from their homes.

## NO REPORT FROM TWEED OR FOXBORO/MELROSE CLUBS.

#### Report #32 Zone 43S Chair

This is my 3<sup>rd</sup> Report to cabinet for the 2021/2022 Lions year.

Again, this is a fairly short report. My energies have been taken up with organizing the Leadership Development District Governor Advisory Meeting. ZOOM, held February 19 after a prolonged search for a suitable meeting location.

#### SERVICE

The 6 clubs in 43 South have managed to maintain their commitments to SERVICE in spite of the on again, off again life we have endured over the past 2 years due to COVID. Often I'm witness to how our communities appreciate the efforts of Lions!

Over the past few months Food Drives, Christmas Hampers, Spaghetti Dinners, bottle drives have continued. PEC, with the assistance of primary students in their community were able to repeat their efforts providing individually crafter Valentine's cards to the seniors' residences in their community. I was again choked up to see the messages being delivered. Labors of love.

A Brighton Lion. With the assistance of an energetic and generous neighbour, were able to provide home backed Valentine treat to residents of a LTC facility in Brighton.

These SERVICE activities, while not huge in scope, make our Lions Clubs shine and are appreciated by our citizens. Batawa Lions Nature Park and their 4 ice surfaces is probably the most labour intense SERVICE activity in my zone, if not our district. The hours spent by the Batawa Lions supporting this initiative are remarkable.

Mother Nature dealt a fatal(?) blow on Family Day. with the torrential rains, to destroy the ice surface. I'm confident the event will return next year. You don't slow these Lions down.

I have witnessed a marked improvement in the clubs reporting their SERVICE on MyLion. One club who had not reported their SERVICE for 24 month, is now reporting regularly. We aren't perfect, but we're getting better. I have to ask the question about who benefits from this reporting? Clubs see no benefit. I don't see any District level benefit. It's hard to push compliance when those doing the work don't see any benefit. A possible discussion item for the future.

#### Membership

Membership is stable, in some cases stagnant across the 6 clubs of 43 South. Changes have been in the +/- ones and twos in 5 out of the 6 six clubs. Brighton, I'm proud to say, is the current exception at this time Brighton has 5 new members since June/2022 and 2 more are in the works. I would like to say that is because of GMA/NAMI, but that's not true. The tried and true methodology of talking to people is what is working. Brighton, like most clubs, has not been able to hold visible SERVICE projects, to provide recruiting opportunities.

I'm concerned that I haven't been able to spread the gospel of GMA/NAMI across the District. I've sat in on multiple webinars and zoom meeting from MDA, but am not gaining any ideas or success examples from these interactions.

With the assistance of Lions 2VDH Frank, and PDG Don, there will be a District Membership Symposium taking place in Brighton March 19. We have a capacity of 150, and I'm assured by Brighton Parks and Recreation that all restrictions will be lifted by March 14. More details will be coming out shortly.

Clubs are reporting their monthly membership data on a 'pretty regular' basis. Not perfect, but not bad. Benefit?

#### Leadership Development.

I held the Advisory Meeting on Leadership Development this past weekend and will be filing my report before next weekend.

I had 5/6 clubs planning on participating but PEC were unable to make the ZOOM connection, so only ended up with 4 clubs. We were fortunate to have Lion PID Terry, Lion 2VDG Frank, Lion PDG Don participate. Lion Cabinet Treasurer spoke on Dog Guides, and Terry promoted the A3 convention.

The smaller group was conducive to less structured conversation and encouraged a relaxed sharing of ideas and experiences. Having Leadership Development as the 2<sup>nd</sup> Advisory Committee meeting is probably a better approach since the nomination and election of new leadership is coming up in March. Brighton, Colborne, and Frankford continue to face challenges staffing their leadership positions, but plans seem to be well under way in the other three clubs.

I have decided to put my name forward for Zone Chair again for the 2022/2023. No successor from 43 South has surfaced, and I still have things I would like to accomplish. I think we will be better able to find a new ZC next year.

I don't have any answers but I would like to see a full-court-press with those interested, to see how we can resolve the issues of finding people to take on leadership positions at the club and district levels. Every year, we face the same issues. Why and what can we do collectively, to solve the problem. Is our structure bad, are the rules too constraining or limiting, etc etc? Everything on the table.
