We were requested to do a presentation on Childhood Cancer at the Keene Lions Club on January 17th which went very well. District A3 2022/2023 3rd Cabinet Meeting

Global Membership Approach

February 25, 2023

Thanks to the direction being provided by Multiple District "A" and the efforts led by Lion FVDG Frank Hewitt, and Lion SVDG Kevin Kimmerly, the Global Membership Approach got a needed boost or shot in the arm in our district.

Lion FVDG Frank contacted me in late December asking if I was interested in assisting with the preparation Membership Meltdown event/workshop being planned at the Tweed Lions February 4, 2023.

I joined in on Lion Frank's planning and also engaged Lion PID Terry Graham, and Lion PCC John Whyte to contribute as well.

"The Global Membership Approach equips **districts** to develop membership through a strategic process focused on:

- **Rejuvenating districts with new clubs**
- **Revitalizing clubs with new members**
- **Re-motivating existing members with fellowship and exciting service**

The approach has universal applicability, allowing for customization based on regional needs and circumstances, and is supported by a growing collection of material resources."GMA Overview from *Lionsclub.org* site

I again, include this quote with emphasis on the word "districts". This was a District initiative falling under the Global Leadership Team and the Global Membership Team specifically.

GMA got its roots from NAMI with an emphasis on membership growth. The multi-step process of **Build a Team, Build a Vision, Build a Plan, and Build/Celebrate Success** is not only applicable for membership growth, it can also be used in defining and managing SERVICE projects, as well. The focus and discipline taught in the approach can be used in most of our Lions endeavors.

Lions Terry and John worked with me on the North American Membership Initiative (NAMI) Zone Pilot Project during the 2020/2021 Lions Year. District A3 Zone 43 South, was one of 13 Zones in the U.S. and Canada who piloted the approach. Since the Zone Pilot, NAMI has evolved and is now called the Global Membership Approach.

Unfortunately, I have been unable to expand the adoption of GMA any further in our District.

The LCI Resource Library is now richly populated with numerous documents, training aids and planning tools for GMA. Funding is now available for GMA training as well,

Lions Frank and Kevin travelled to the MDA training sessions in December on how GMA was to be used in the preparation of our District Goals for the 2023/2024 Lions Year. Following their trip to MDA, work started on the Membership Meltdown.

At the Tweed Lions Club Hall, close to 60 Lions from 20 clubs in District A3 followed the format as documented in the 'Plan for Your Club's Success' document available on the Lionsclubs.org website. What was also encouraging was that 7 first year Lions actively participated in the training. A3 Lions were exposed to the concepts of Build a Team, learned about S.W.O.T. analysis to Build a Vision and learned about S.M.A.R.T.Goals to assist in setting our own goals. Lion Council Chair Mark lead the discussions on Build a Plan.

It was refreshing to see the level of engagement from all the Lions who attended. With this 'shot in the arm' we have to ensure that the interest and enthusiasm displayed at Tweed is not lost. Let's keep the Approach spreading across our District.

Zone Meetings and large gatherings like the one on February 4th, are the correct format for training on GMA. It is my experience that the actual going through the GMA steps, is best done at a club level, Whereas there may be commonality amongst clubs in Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats are often unique to individuals clubs. (Not all clubs are interested in openly discussing their weaknesses or problems outside of their own clubs.)

Similarly, we all share similar goals, the methodology to reach those goals may be different at different clubs.

GMA includes the concepts of accountability and progress tracking. These concepts are best actioned at a club level. Some clubs are better than others and some zones are better than others and both levels often face different challenges. The ultimate goal of **SERVICE** is common to all Lions and the concepts that Lions can provide more SERVICE by having more members and the idea that we gain more members through **SERVICE** is still true.

I recommend that the District continue to educate the Zones on the concepts behind GMA, and that we look on how we can provide mentoring teams to assist Clubs in their GMA based projects.

Following today's meeting, Zone 43 South is holding a GMA refresher course the morning of Sunday February 26, at the Colborne Lions Club. Many of the facilitators from the Tweed 'Meltdown' have again agreed to help with the training. From that training exercise, I hope to identify one or more clubs who are willing to try the approach, ideally this year, but possibly next year.

As is the direction of LCI, I also suggest that we attempt to find an opportunity (1/2 day work shop) to help educate the District A3 Cabinet members on the concepts of GMA.

Hearing/Lions Home for the Deaf Report to Cabinet

DG Linda, Members of Cabinet, Lions and Guests:

I have just come from a Lions Homes for Deaf People Board meeting and am happy to report that although the last couple of years have been really tough for many of our clubs, your Lions generosity is still very much alive. Thank you!

As you know, most of Lions Homes for Deaf People funds are raised through your purchase and presentation of the Helen Keller Award. This Award can be presented to a Lions member or to a community member who has come to the attention of your club as a deserving recipient.

The cost for a Helen Keller Award at this time will remain at \$500.00 in spite of rising costs, especially for rushed shipping requests. We do need 4 to 6 weeks for production, from the time we receive your cheque to the time the award is in your hands. Please do try to help us by adhering to this guideline.

The new project that we are committed to supporting is really exciting. It will be a build of modular homes on a property in Brantford. Each single modular unit will provide housing for one person. Units can be joined to form a larger accommodation. They can be built as high as 3 storeys. Once all the Build begins (hopefully summer 2023) the project should be done in 12 months.

I look forward to you questions and appreciate this opportunity to share information with the Lions of A3.

More Good News – I will send out in advance of that meeting a paper written and published in the last few days of 2019. The title is the “Best Year Ever for People Worldwide” a real eye opener for we critics and it was the time that COVID was on the move however it had not been announced to the world. The content and the timing were indeed ironic. Arguable is this history as the paper is only 3+ years old? Regardless, please read it! You can easily find the article by typing the title into Google.

Also, at this meeting I will be asking Cabinet Members what is it that the Lions from A-3 would like to know about Lions history?

THE FIRST LIONS CLUB IN EACH PROVINCE OF CANADA, TERRITORIES AND ST PIERRE ET MIQUELON ISLANDS, FRANCE

March 12, 1920 – Ontario Border City Lions Club Ontario now Windsor Downtown Lions club was chartered.

January 12, 1921 – British-Colombia, Vancouver Central Lions club was chartered. The oldest Lions Club in British Columbia is the Vancouver Central Lions Club (1921); however, the Spences Bridge and District Lions Club (cancelled in 1961) was the first club chartered in British Columbia.

December 12, 1921 – Manitoba, Lions club of Winnipeg was chartered.

September 14, 1922- Quebec, the Lions club of Montreal was chartered.

March 14, 1927 – Saskatchewan, Swift Current Lions club, it was cancelled in 1936.

January 30, 1929 – the Calgary Lions club Alberta was chartered.

November 21, 1930 – The McAdam Lions club in New Brunswick was chartered it was closed in 1935.

April 4, 1945 – The Lions club of Halifax Nova Scotia was chartered.

August 29, 1949 – The Montague Lions club Prince-Edward Island was chartered.

May 26, 1948 – Newfoundland, the first Lions club in the Colony of Newfoundland was the Corner Brook Lions club – * Bell Island first Club was cancelled 1953.

September 7, 1953 – The Lions club of St-Pierre & Miquelon Doyen was chartered. November 26, 1964 – Northwest Territories, the Yellowknife Lions club.

Report #22 - Lions Quest Chair Report to Cabinet

February 25, 2023.

I have bad news and good news, which to give you first? Since I would rather end my report with good news, you are getting the bad news first.

Bad News- Very few of our District Lions Clubs have donated to the District A 3 Lions Quest. It costs \$350 to sponsor one educator to take the Lions Quest. This provides the participant with training on the use of the programme and with a full curriculum for one grade that they can use for as long as they are working with children and youth. It also gives the participant access to ongoing support from Lions Quest Canada for as long as they want/need any help or information. If every club sponsored one educator for \$350 we would be able to provide workshops to quite a few educators working with children and youth in our District. Please consider sending our District Treasurer, Jean Graham, a donation from your club. You are investing in the social and emotional well-being of our young people.

Sadly, even fewer of our clubs (only Denbigh/Griffith, Marmora Crowe Valley, Prince Edward County and Bewdley) have responded to the Lions Quest Canada request for support.

Lions Quest Canada has only 2 staff members working out of their own homes providing workshops, and materials and information and support to educators. Fairly regularly, reports are sent out indicating which clubs across Canada have supported the Lions Quest Canada appeal for funds.

Both of these Lions Quest funds need our support. Without the Lions Quest Canada staff coordinating and organizing workshops for educators working with children and youth across Canada, hundreds of young people are missing out on the opportunity to learn the social and emotional foundational skills for dealing with anger and frustration, preventing negative behaviors, and developing positive behaviors that increase academic performance. The Lions Quest approach includes explicit instruction in the classroom supported by schoolwide practices and policies and engages the family and community.

Please consider a donation to Lions Quest Canada and/or District A 3 Lions Quest budget line.

Good News- With the support of this year's Cabinet, some funds were added to the District Lions Quest budget line enabling some educators to take a Lions Quest workshop next month. On March 7 up to 5 educators will be joining the workshop. If you know of someone who might have 2 hours to take the workshop from 4-6 on March 7, please let me know asap. There is still room in the session which is held on zoom with some pre-reading and a webinar to watch before the workshop.

NURSERY RHYMES FOR TOTS- Literacy Activity Coleen Power Feb.25/23

Supplies: Photocopies of Nursery Rhymes for parents, Nursery Rhymes printed on large chart papers, pointer stick, markers, scissors, glue sticks, premade puppets on popsicle sticks, mitten puppet template or hand puppets of nursery rhyme characters. Snacks and drinks for parents and tots. Mats to sit on.

Opening Rhyme: « If You're Happy and You Know It, Clap Your Hands! » Etc. Parents sit on the grass with their babies or toddlers and sing while doing the actions required by the rhyme. -touch your head, touch your nose, tickle your belly, etc. Or stomp your feet, if standing.

Introduction Rhyme: « Where Is Thumbkin. » Stick up your thumb on the first hand, then the second hand whenever you sing that phrase.
However, the second time you sing the rhyme, use the name of a baby or tot in the group and he/she can stick up their hand or wave when they hear their name. In a small group, you can use this rhyme to get to know one another.

Other Nursery Rhymes

Touching/Tickling Rhymes: This little piggy went to market, Round and round the garden, Hickory dickory dock, Itsy bitsy spider

Bouncing Rhymes: Ring around the Rosie, I'm being swallowed by a boa constrictor

More Action Rhymes: Hey diddle diddle, One two buckle my shoe, A hunting we will go, London Bridge is falling down, Do your ears hang low

Lullabies: Little boy blue, Hush little baby

Snack Time: Serve Hot Cross Buns and juice boxes. You can play this nursery rhyme, plus all of the other rhymes, as a review, on your tablet or phone while the parents and tots snack on the grass. Provide some veggies for those who are gluten free.

Transition Rhyme: As snack time is coming to a close, the leader sings this rhyme while modelling opening and shutting his fingers and eventually the parents and tots will start singing and doing the same actions.
« Open, shut them. Open, shut them, Give a little clap.
Open, shut them, Open, shut them, Put them on your lap. »
Use this rhyme to settle the kids back down before teaching a new Nursery Rhyme, reading a short story, making hand or finger puppets or playing some games.

Circle Games: Duck duck goose, One potato, two potato, three potato, four
Musical chairs or musical cushions/mats

Goodby Rhymes/Song: « Good night ladies. ». Instead sing
« Goodbye kiddies, goodbye kiddies, goodbye kiddies, it's time to leave you now. »
« Goodby mommies/daddies, etc. »

Notes: This is an extensive selection of nursery rhymes, so just pick a few to do for your Literacy Day activity with parents, babies and toddlers.

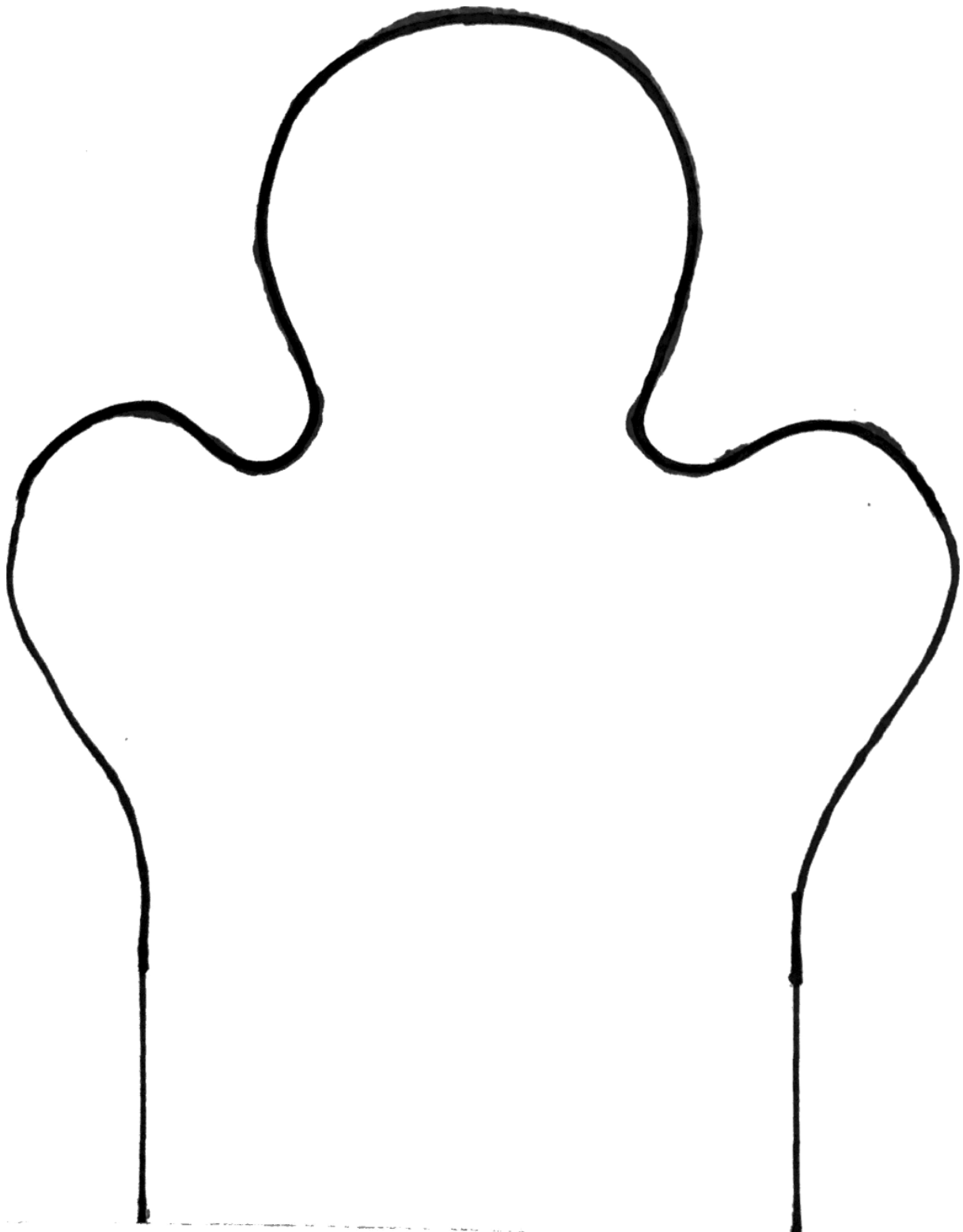
