Covid-19 hit everyone hard. LFC was no exception. LFC stopped breeding dogs for a few months. There were very few places to train and very few recipients that were able to come to Oakville to get their dog guides. Foster Families stepped up to assist. Many families that were expecting their puppies to be returned at 12-14 months old volunteered to foster until they could be recalled. Expenses didn't go away. Thanks to Pet Valu for sponsoring food for the program. Slowing things are returning. Training has returned to almost full capacity and there are new puppies. Hopefully many were able to view the last graduation on YouTube. Covid policies are still very strict for the protection of staff, foster families and clients.

Lions Foundation of Canada has partnered with Dog with Wings, Alberta. They have sent 8-10 dogs to be trained – this will make it easier for clients from the West Coast to receive dog guides.

The cost of training a dog guide is now \$35,000.00 (like everything else has increased). Sponsorships have stayed the same.

In A3 there has been 10 Walks. Thank you to all the clubs that supported the LFC with dog walks. This year the Walks in Canada have totaled \$818,466.00. **GREAT JOB AND THANK YOU TO EVERYONE THAT PARTICIPATED!**

Thank you- East Peterborough, Amherstview, Warsaw and District, Prince Edward County, and Belleville. Those 5 clubs provided funds that allowed five educators working with our children and youth to take part in one of the workshops that were provided over this past 4 months.

As we are all aware, students across our province have started back to in person school. Educators are being faced with students who have had an enriched and exciting learning opportunity for a year and a half because of the luck of having parents/grandparents and other family members willing and able to support the challenges of online learning. Also sitting in the same class are students who have experienced the exact opposite. Never in my time of many years of being involved in the school system, have the challenges of meeting all those students' needs in one class being more daunting.

We, as Lions, own the LIONS QUEST program and provide training in that program for any adult working with children and youth. Lions Quest offers this across Canada. It has always been a most effective program for helping educators support the social and emotional learning of children and youth. Never has it been more important and needed!

Please put a Donation to District A 3 Lions Quest in your budget this year! There are grants available that we can apply to receive from LCIF but we need to show that we can support the program on an ongoing basis if we wish to access some of these funds. We have all had a challenge in fund raising these last two years and who knows for how much longer BUT our children and youth need us now to commit to their future by supporting Lions Quest. "Together we can do so little, together we can do so much" is a quote from Helen Keller. She challenged us to be "knights of the blind" and we are. Now we need to become "champions of our children and youth" by ensuring that no educator who is willing to take the training cannot do so because we cannot provide the funds. It cost \$350 to provide the materials and the workshop to an educator who will provide that program for 20-30 students a year for as many years as they teach our students.
