

# 55W LIONS Pride

### District Governor's Message



In January, the Cabinet met twice to discuss the growth of 5SW and the urgency with which Lions must meet the challenge of falling membership numbers. Since 2010, 410 Lions have disappeared from our ranks, leaving 5SW with a total of 626 Lions—a 50% drop since 1998.

Four alternatives were discussed to meet this crisis

head on: Throw in the towel/quit, combine with 5SE and make the state into one district, keep doing what we are doing and hope things improve, or deal with the problem directly with positive, progressive change to head off the current course.

Several closed clubs were discussed, as was the possibility of re-igniting them: Mobridge, Piedmont Valley, Wall/Wasta, Boxelder & Elsworth, and Faith. Ten additional communities with no formal clubs were also thrown into the mix.

Those in attendance expressed their gratitude for "Grand Old Lions" who are club mainstays and keep clubs active and moving. Without these dedicated Lions, many clubs might already have folded.

A successful gameplan requires a roadmap for success. The DG and Cabinet members who met in January discussed the results of the SWOT analysis and what they told us. There are several areas of promise for change and growth, bringing new vitality to Lions Clubs around western South Dakota.

- 1. Increased visibility: Change the face of Lionism by becoming the face of service in the community. Find high visibility projects that offer hands on opportunities for Lions to engage in service.
- 2. "Lionize the Community" Become the go-to for other clubs looking for help. Contact your city and Chamber of Commerce and establish leadership in service by being the organization everyone knows they can count on.
- 3. Promote our Efforts: Get our names and pictures in the paper, contact the press and share those newly visible and meaningful projects.
- 4. Get the Leos involved! Leos and their parents become future Lions. Get them excited and involved early and watch them grow into the Lions of tomorrow.
- 5. Look at our core values and traditions. Our values are important and will not change, but are there some traditions that may be outdated or off-putting to potential members.
- 6. Keep it economical: try to keep dues and costs as low as possible to make it affordable to be a member. Offer special dues rates to Leos, spouses, and students.

### DIABETES AWARENESS

In 1923 Canadian scientists Frederick Banting and John Macleod received a Nobel Peace Prize for their discovery and identification of the hormone insulin. That led to a proper diagnosis and better treatments of diabetes. Patients would no longer die from the condition, but could take insulin and lead normal lives.

What is diabetes? Diabetes is a chronic condition that occurs when the body cannot produce enough insulin or use available insulin properly. Glucose remains in the blood, which can ultimately lead to nerve, organ and blood vessel damage.

There are three types of diabetes:

- <u>Type 1 Diabetes</u> occurs when the immune system destroys insulin-producing cells and the body cannot produce insulin. It usually develops in children and teens, but can happen at any age.
- <u>Type 2 Diabetes</u> occurs when insulin is produced but not properly absorbed by the body. It is on the rise in most countries, but simple lifestyle measures have been shown to be effective in preventing or delaying it. Worldwide education is desperately needed.
- <u>Gestational Diabetes</u> in pregnant women affects one in seven births. If not properly managed, women are at an increased risk of complications during delivery. Babies may be born with a high birth weight, breathing difficulties, or low blood sugar, and are at risk for developing type 2 diabetes in the future as well as their mothers.

Diabetes is one of the fastest-growing diseases in the world today, currently affecting 422 million people of all races, income levels, and ages, even children. As Lions, we are dedicated to fighting the diabetes epidemic to improve lives, strengthen families, and revitalize communities. By 2040 (less than 20 years from now), 642 million people will have diabetes. Diabetes is the 6th leading cause of death in the world, and the 6th leading cause of death among women. 1 person dies every 7 seconds from diabetes—5 million people die annually from this disease. 50% of people with diabetes don't know they have it. 77% of people with diabetes live in low -income and middle-income countries.

Chances are you know someone with diabetes. Or are you one of those who have diabetes and don't know it?

### What can I do about diabetes?

**Factors I Can't Change**: Gender, Age, Family history, Race/ethnicity, History of gestational diabetes or having a baby who weighed more than 9 pounds

Factors I Can Influence: Your cholesterol, Your blood pressure,

**Factors I Can Change**: Quit smoking, get enough sleep, eat a healthy diet, get 30 minutes of physical activity most days of the week, keep a healthy weight for your body

<u>Am I at risk for prediabetes?</u> As you take steps to a healthier you, talk with your doctor to find out if you are at risk for prediabetes or take a 1-minutes online test at www.cdd.gov/prediabetes/takethetest. If you find you are at risk, ask to get a blood sugar test done for type 2 diabetes. You can also call the Center for Disease Control (CDC) at 1-800-CDC-INFO (800-232-4636) for more information about preventing or delaying diabetes.



DG Ron Bunnell and his wife Donna visited the SD Braille and Talking Book Library and recording studios while in Pierre.








