Along with service to the Lions Organization, he also volunteers with the Knights of Columbus and American Legion organizations on many projects. As a member of the NAJA Shriners, he volunteers as a "DAD" transporting children to the Shiners Hospital for Children in Minneapolis. DG Richard served in both the US Navy and Army National Guard and after 31 years in various leadership positions he retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

DG Richard and his wife Lion Frances have been married for 50 years this month and they have four children and fourteen grandchildren.

We honor their memory and service

Dr. Kenneth K. Gifford, Jr. (July 4, 1937 – July 4, 2020)

Dr. Ken "Doc" Gifford passed away on Saturday, July 4, 2020 on his 83rd birthday at his home in Rapid City, SD.

Ken was born on July 4, 1937 in Huron, SD to Kenneth K. Gifford Sr. and Evelyn (Halbur) Gifford. He was the oldest of two siblings and grew up in Huron where he became an Eagle Scout and graduated from Huron High School in 1955. While in high school, he would date his future wife. He married Berniece "Bea" Knutson in 1958 and they spent nearly 62 years together.



Ken was the first of his generation to go to college and in 1959 he graduated from SDSU with a degree in Industrial Arts education. They moved to Sioux Falls where he started his education career at Whittier Jr. High School. They had two children together, Michael James and Chelaine Marie.

Ken's passion for teaching led to the decision to pursue his Masters Degree during the summer months from Colorado State College in Greely, CO. In 1970 he was one of two educators to be granted a sabbatical leave in order to earn his PhD. Ken was driven to make a difference in the lives of both his students and his fellow teachers. He took that energy and moved out of the classroom to become the Director of the SD Advisory Council on technical education.

No one loved the Black Hills more than Ken did. In 1971, he would make a purchase near Custer that would change all lives with the memories of hiking, campfires and hunting. In 1982, Ken and Bea moved to Rapid city where he worked at Rapid City Stevens High School and then he was offered the Director's role at Western Dakota Tech. He applied all of his leadership, listening skills and teaching experience to build a totally new college campus and retired as its President and CEO.

Ken will be remembered by his students, his staff, his friends, the team at Association of General Contractors, his church family at Canyon Lake United Methodist Church and all of the community service he did as a member of Lions Club International. He loved to write and teach technical training for young apprentices, singing in the choir and running the SD Lions Foundation eye screening for children, not to mention being a Lions District Governor too.

Ken will be greatly missed by his wife Bea of Rapid City, son Mike (Jerene) of Afton, MN and daughter Chelaine (Wayne) of Rapid City. His grandchildren Erin Rempher (Travis), TJ Gifford (Susan), Jessica Williams (Sean), Kayleen Huber (Aaron) and Nichole Asscherick (Jacob). He was blessed with 7 great grandchildren: Kaisie, Haleigh, Aiden, Gavin, Ben, Alayna and Archie. He was preceded in death by his parents, Kenneth and Evelyn and his brother Dennis. Celebration of life services will be held at a future date.

Lions Gear up for 1st Annual 5-SE/5-SW Convention Scheduled in Rapid City, October 1 -3, 2020

Lions from across the state of South Dakota are invited to attend the first annual District 5SE & 5SW Convention scheduled to be held at the Best Western Ramkota Hotel in Rapid City the first weekend in October. Currently there are three plans being formalized for this year's convention which will take place during our pandemic year. The three plans are as follows:

Convention Plan A: Moving ahead nicely as we wait and watch similar events in western South Dakota. So far – so good! The full on-site convention is planned for 125 – 200 Lions.

For pre-convention activities, ten rooms are blocked and await reservations for the night of October 1st. Eighty hotel rooms are blocked and await reservations for October 2-3rd. The full schedule of events is complete. Many details are being finalized. While we attempt to remain flexible, complete updates are available as we seek to reflect, learn, plan, share and celebrate service to the communities we serve.

Convention Plan B: This plan keeps many South Dakota Lions live at the Best Western Ramkota in Rapid City with a core group of probably forty Lions. There would be about thirty Lions at an eastern location in or near Sioux Falls. In addition, there would be live streaming to about six satellite locations around the state. The basic content would be similar to Plan A with a definite increase in social distancing.

Convention Plan C: Plans are also being worked on for a Plan C which would cancel all of the core activities at the Best Western Ramkota in Rapid City. This plan would move ahead in a condensed period of time with ZOOM or GO TO MEETINGS which would be available to all South Dakota Lions where service is available. If we go to Plan C, there will be a "Test Conference" to assure clear communications on or about Tuesday, September 22nd at 1:30 p.m. and again at 6:30pm MDT.

The first priority during these troubled times must be to keep ourselves, families and communities healthy. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) Guidelines will be closely followed along the way.

We hope to see you in October. All the best as we "Look toward the future"!

2020 - A campaign & a pandemic

As we all know, it's been a crazy year. Here at the South Dakota Lions Foundation much has changed and much has remained the same.

Like a lot of businesses throughout the state, our office closed its doors in March. Fortunately, technology allowed us to work from home, with an occasional stop by the office to check the mail. It became clear to me, I could pretty easily do the "work" from home, but I desperately missed the daily interaction we are used to having with Lions dropping off glasses or stopping in to say hi!

Our endowment campaign — "Vision 2020" was just kicking into high gear when the pandemic hit, which has been tough on us. As clubs struggle with membership and uncertainty about their future, the one way we can build a legacy of Lions service in South Dakota is through our Foundation. Our goal of raising \$2 million as an endowment is not an unrealistic one, but COVID-19 has made it difficult for all Lions to focus on this important goal.


Since the Lions International Foundation (LCIF) began their fundraising for Campaign 100 it sometimes raises questions as to the difference between the two campaigns. While both are very worthy causes, LCIF donates funds to do important work all around the world while one hundred percent of the funds raised through the South Dakota Lions Foundation stay in our state.

Our programs have had quite a shift as well this year. Because of the pandemic, many of our spring vision screenings were cancelled, so our numbers for the program dropped about 25%, from screening 40,000/year to 30,000/year. We are now in the process of reaching out to each individual school district to determine what their plans are for screening in the fall. Our work in this area is even more important now that kids may not be getting a regular screening. If your club is looking for a great service project, give us a call (605) 338-0551 to talk about how you can create an awareness campaign in your community followed up with screenings and exams.

Requests for eyeglasses and hearing aids have been higher than ever, and we hear tough stories every day about people who have lost their jobs or their hours have been reduced and they just can't afford vision/hearing services. We refer these cases to local clubs and we provide a grant program for the club if they choose to help the individuals. Hopefully your club received the information we sent about this in early July. We want to partner with clubs more than ever to assist any South Dakotan needing help with vision or hearing.

If you would like to discuss anything about the South Dakota Lions Foundation or just catch up, please pick up the phone and call! The office is back open and I'd love to take your call and visit!

"Peace Through Service" is the theme of the 2020-21 LCI Peace Poster Contest. This is the 33rd anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. Lions clubs can sponsor the program in their community for children in local schools or organized, sponsored youth groups. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15, are eligible to participate. Through the contest, students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Lions clubs may purchase a contest kit through the Club Supplies Sales Department. A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. The contest must be sponsored by a Lions club. Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches (33 centimeters by 50 centimeters) and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches (50 centimeters by 60 centimeters). Do not mat or frame artwork. Only one entry per student and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.

All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster. Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the special award ceremony at Lions' Day with the United Nations. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International. Lions Clubs International may cancel the contest without notice at any time. The contest is void where prohibited, taxed, or restricted by law.

Judging

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme.

Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.



Awards

One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony. There the winning artist will be presented with an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US \$5,000.

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Deadlines

Please note that the following dates are from those in the Peace Poster information from Lions Clubs International. MD 5 Council of Governors may set different dates depending on when their meeting is scheduled. Entries not meeting deadlines will be disqualified.

January 15, 2020 Kits go on sale from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.

October 1, 2020 Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.

October 15, 2020 Club needs to have one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.

Diabetes

As we (Lions Clubs International and 5SW Lions) begin our 2020/2021 year it is my sincere prayer that all are healthy and at peace.

For (at least) the next year I will be sharing information which I pray will assist you in your lifestyle. What I will be attempting to share is information for everyone. So, please don't disregard this because the subject says diabetes. I have discovered that living with diabetes means seeking a "healthy" lifestyle. It is NOT a diabetic lifestyle (although there are some things someone without diabetes can "manipulate") it is about living a life that will help us ALL to live longer.

In the past I have shared information about sugar, A1C levels, exercise and stress, to name a few. I will most likely return to some of these as the year progresses as there are many things within those subjects.

Right now we are in the middle of the summer. We will be entering Autumn soon and then winter seems to show up soon after that. The seasons do indeed affect our sugar levels. More and less activity and foods that we consume change quite frequently due to season.

I'm going to talk about fruits and vegetables. Right now is the perfect time to experiment with new ones as many are in season. Fresh fruits and vegetables are excellent for our "battle" with diabetes. I want to mention here that frozen and canned fruits and vegetables are ways to enjoy them throughout the year.

One thing we must always do regardless of the food we are consuming is to know how it affects our sugar levels. They do affect some differently than others. So, check your blood regularly. 
Custer Lions Participate in Parade




