My second 'LIONISM' event occurred in mid-September. An optometrist in Pierre had contacted the SD Lions Foundation and requested use of a camera. Director Jennifer contacted me. I store a Foundation camera, and she asked if I would meet with the doctor and his staff for training. Yes!

The meeting was interesting, as I trained him and his technician. We used each of them as the individual being screened. The doctor was very impressed with how accurate the results were. I offered to

come back and assist, if necessary, when the patient arrived.

The patient is a middle-aged man, who has been in a wheelchair the majority of his life. At this time, he does not sit, but reclines in the wheelchair. As I listened to the conversation in the waiting room, I realized I knew him as he participated in an event called 'Fishing Has No Boundaries' which I chaired for many years. A friendship reborn.

His name was called and we both went into the doctor's office, I realized why the camera was needed. Because he can't sit up, the instruments in the office would not allow a reading to be made of his eyes. I was asked to complete not 1 but 3 different screenings of his eyes. I began to focus the camera straddling the bottom of the wheelchair and moving forward. Success! Several minutes later a 2<sup>nd</sup> screening was completed, and after a brief resting of his eyes, the 3<sup>rd</sup> screening completed. No. 1 and no. 3 were similar, no. 2 was very different as was the angle of camera.

After looking at the results and numbers, the doctor told the patient he now had a very good idea of what was needed so he once again could see well.

A pure look of joy! I understood again - WE SERVE!

Think back to your first experience of LIONISM. Now, go out and invite others to join your club so they can have that special experience.

### INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT'S CORNER




Int'l President Alexander

nature trails pose little or no problem and give us an opportunity to get out into the fresh air with our fellow Lions. Playing bingo at a senior living facility is a bit more of a challenge but masks and sanitizer can help. Sing alongs in the halls and cafeterias give those dear souls new faces to see – even if we are a bit off key—laugh and bring joy. Serving meaningfully may sound over simplified but we all know we can do good. Donate books to libraries – even those little streetside ones that say bring one take one. Volunteer to read at a local day care. Give those caregivers a break and make it fun for the young ones and bring your acting talents.

I have seen wonderful projects taking gift bags with personal care items and a note to share with nursing homes and others. Provide cookies and bars to a local blood drive. If you are unable to give blood find someone in your neighborhood who can. Take care of their little ones if needed and make a meal for them and their family to rejuvenate them.

Let people know your club is available in these ways. Have your club do a trunk or treat in your neighborhood or help a group that already is doing one in a local church parking lot and put a note in each child's bag with Lion's information especially if you are planning a vision screening. Our local college has a food pantry in the student union building, other places may have the same opportunity. If you take items to share, label each with the Lions logo and maybe a note of encouragement. Perhaps a snack bag could be shared at a local middle or high school. Food is a great opening to share encouragement. There are clubs that provide free meals and desserts.

With all of these opportunities fulfilled be sure to report them to Lions Clubs International (LCI)! There are donors who give with matching gifts. Foundations and individuals give to groups that help others. These donors don't know how much we share and serve if we don't report. LCI can not say we have given so much time and treasure to so many people if the clubs do not share what they have done. Please take the extra moments to make LIONS visible. #### 100 Years in Rapid City!

This past Sunday, September 19, the Community was invited to celebrate with the Rapid City Lions Club as they approach 100 Years of Service in the Rapid City Area. To cap-off this first Century of Service, the community was invited to join Lion members for free hotdogs, popcorn and a beverage at Main Street Square from 11:00AM until 6:00PM.

One of two South Dakota Lions' Kid Sight Vans were also present. Lions performed free vision screening for children as they do for children at schools throughout South Dakota throughout the school year. All those present also enjoyed a free concert performed by the Abbey Roads Band at 4:00pm. All proceeds of this event will go to the benefit of Youth and Family Services.

The Rapid City Lions Club was founded in 1921, just four years after Lions Clubs International was created in the Chicago, Illinois area. Today, LCI is represented by more that 1.4 million Lion members world-wide in 230 countries. Early on, Gutsom Borglund actually announced the carving of Lincoln's head at Mt. Rushmore at a club meeting at the Alex Johnson Hotel in 1923.

The first LCI Foundation Grant ever written was for the tragic Rapid City Flood in 1972. The Club Charter was signed and validated on November 21, 1921 with 61 original members. Planning is underway to have a commemorative dinner at the Canyon Lake Activities Center on Saturday, November 20, 2021. This will be a semi-formal event catered by Old West Dutch Oven Catering and fully funded through tickets purchased by attendees.

One hundred years ago, on November 22, 1921, The Lions Club of Rapid City was officially chartered by the International Association of Lions Clubs. Fifty-two original members signed the charter in 1921.

On Saturday, November 20, 2021, our club will celebrate 100 years of continuous service. The agenda includes the following highlights:

- Recognize and review our club's original charter—to be a videotaped live skit
- Sample a few club songs from the 60th anniversary song book (with live piano music!)



We know how important our sight/vision is to all of our daily activities; imagine our daily routine without vision. Without vision some people feel trapped in a world of darkness and despair.

The mission statement for Leader Dogs for the Blind is: Empowering people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for safe and independent daily travel.

Leader Dogs for the Blind is 100% philanthropically funded. It relies on clubs like ours to help provide the support that makes it possible to give blind or visually impaired people training on orientation and mobility, and guide dog training absolutely free!

My goal as District Chairman for Leader Dogs for the Blind, as usual is 100% Club participation. There are some fun and interesting things that a club can do to raise funds as well as raising awareness in a community about Leader Dogs for the Blind. Some clubs have done a Dining in the Dark; eating with blindfolds. There is also a coin collection canister marked 'Pennies for Puppies', that can be placed in stores or at ballgame concession areas. Some clubs could sponsor a 50/50 bingo at ballgames, or ask each member to donate \$.25 at each meeting and send the proceeds to Leader Dog at the end of the year...or even just \$.25 each at just one meeting would work. There is also a program called Light Up Leader Dog during the holiday season. For a donation of \$10.00 a luminary will be placed in honor of the supporter on Dec. 11, 2021 on the Leader Dog Campus. *This contribution needs to be made by Nov.10*. If this is something that you are interested in, please send the contribution to me and I will forward it on so that your club will be credited for a District contribution. How about a 5K run?
