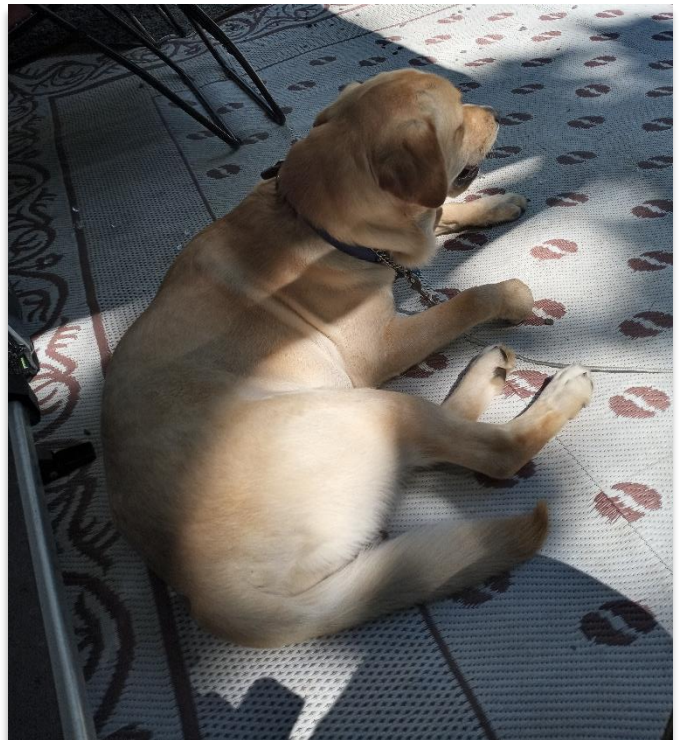


Paws for Thought

Environmental Focus: The Green Team



What is the environment? This may seem like a silly question to some, but do we all truly understand what the environment is and how important it is to us? Let's look so we can see how we can make a difference together!



The definition of environment according to Merriam-Webster's Dictionary is "the circumstances, objects, or conditions by which one is surrounded." Furthermore, it is described as "the complex of physical, chemical, and biotic factors (such as climate, soil, and living things) that act upon an organism or an ecological community and ultimately determine its form and survival."

Now that we have looked at what the environment is to us, let's break down why it is important to us. The Earth is the only home we have, and it provides food, air, and other basic needs to all living things on it. We as humans affect the balance around us. Our life support system depends on the well-being of all the species living on Earth. This is referred to as the biosphere, a place in which all living things are interdependent.

Our ecosystem consists of living and non-living parts. These parts create a healthy ecosystem that allows all living creatures to survive and thrive. Without a well-balanced ecosystem we are unable to thrive on our planet. When we change our environment, for example knocking down forests/woodlands and building homes/apartments/commercial buildings, we are offsetting the balance of the environment around us. If you expect to attract new members, people in your area need to know your club exists, know how your club's efforts benefit the community, and recognize and appreciate the importance of your efforts. Prospective members need to know that their membership in your club will help sustain and expand your club's impact while bringing them personal satisfaction. They also need to SEE that the members of your club HAVE FUN doing what they do.

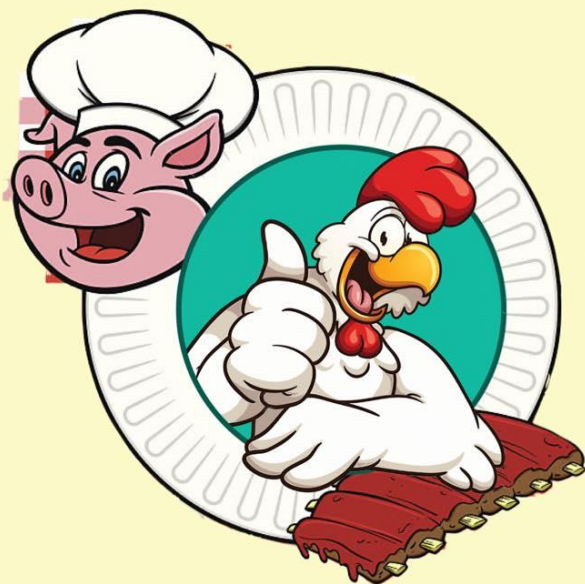

Building Bridges for Brianna

The Dallastown Lions Club is so proud to partner with Building Bridges for Brianna in hosting their 2nd Annual Event at our park on Saturday, June 25th, 2022. Several thousand people attended this amazing event and enjoyed the day with kids games, over 40 vendors, food trucks and music provided by bands who volunteered their time for such a great cause.

On December 3rd, 2020, J. Matt Dorgan lost his daughter, Brianna Dorgan, to suicide. She was a beautiful and talented young lady who was in the middle of her tenth-grade year at Dallastown Area High School. We are losing too many of our youth to suicide and this is not just a Dallastown issue. Every year we lose a child who feels that they have no alternative. Lion J. Matt Dorgan is trying to “Turn the grief of a father of a suicide victim into relief for others.”

Building Bridges for Brianna was joined by many agencies that work together to stop this alarming trend. A Proclamation was read to J. Matt Dorgan and his entire team for all of the great work they are doing and the great work they continue to do to help our youth, by President York County Commissioner Julie Wheeler. She and her fellow Commissioners, Commissioner Doug Hoke and Commissioner Ron Smith, were in attendance to show their support and concern for this cause. Senator Kristen Phillips-Hill was unable to attend, however, she sent a Citation to be read from the Pennsylvania State Senate in support of this important work. “It takes a strong community foundation to build the bridges for mental health.”

The Dallastown Lions Club members were there in force to help support our fellow Lion and to support his team’s amazing cause! Remember, “It is ok not to be ok. It is just not ok to stay that way!” Everyone feeling the loss of a suicide victim or thinking of harming themselves should reach out to Lion J. Matt Dorgan and his team to get the help they so desperately need. Lion J. Matt Dorgan is “building a bridge to connect people that need help to the people that can give help!” Never suffer in silence!

The Newville Lions held their 75th Anniversary celebration at the Newville Lions Community Fairgrounds on Saturday, June 18th, beginning at 11:00 am. The Newville Lions have been serving the Newville community since 1947. The original club was composed of 36 members, including Samuel Burkholder, Clinton Beckner, Leon Wagner and C. Freemont Graham. Although there has been some “ebb and flow” in membership over the years, the club’s membership currently stands at 37.

The celebration was well attended, with Lions from clubs throughout the three- county area of Adams, Cumberland and York attending. The speaker was Past District Governor Kerry McKnight from the New Freedom Lions Club. PDG Kerry has a Doctorate in Lionism. He talked about the difference between the day he joined the New Freedom Lions Club and the day he became a Lion. He said that like many Lions, he had an “aha moment” when he realized for the first time the nature of our motto “We Serve”. He said at that moment he clearly understood that he was doing more than attending meetings twice a month. He was providing food and services for families in need who were very appreciative of what the Lions were doing.

He also talked about the history and services of the Newville Lions Club. The Newville Lions have sponsored two other local Lions Clubs, the Plainfield Lions Club chartered in 1959, and the Jacksonville Lions Club chartered in 1961. Both of those clubs have celebrated their 50th year anniversaries. Together those three clubs serve the geographic area of the Big Spring School District and beyond. The Newville Lions Club celebrated its 25th Anniversary at the Carlisle Country Club in June of 1972, with Dr. Gilmore Seavers, the President of Shippensburg University as speaker. They celebrated their 50th Anniversary at the Carriage Haus with Lions International Director Eugene Polgar as speaker.

The Newville Lions Club has at least in part been responsible for the annual Newville Fair since 1959. In 1970, the Newville Lions and the Fire Company moved the fair to its current location on Route 533. In a Valley Times article, President Leon Wagner said that “we have a gigantic job ahead of us”. They started the move to the new fairgrounds in March of that year with the intent of holding a fair on the new property later that summer. They met their goal. The fairgrounds has been improved over the years with the enlargement of the main exposition building, a covered pavilion area, a tractor pull, and a row of food concession buildings.

The fair and the fairground are integral to our service efforts, said Dan Brant, a 40 year member of the Newville Lions Club and the current District Governor for the three county area. The income derived from the fair is the major source of financial support for our service activity. Our service activity includes: longtime support for scouting activity in the Newville area, having purchased a church in Newville to be used as the Clinton F. Beckner Scout House. Support of students in the Big Spring School District through the Leon Wagner scholarship for a graduating senior and the Students of the Month; support for children and adults with a variety of health and sight needs, including defraying the cost of eye exams and eye glasses, and conducting vision screening for children and adults; and our support for a wide array of service organizations in Newville, including Neighbors in Christ, the Friendship Hose Company, the Food Bank, Paw Packs and the John Graham Library. Other dignitaries who took part in the festivities included State Representative Barb Gleim who presented a proclamation from the State House of Representatives, and Newville Mayor Michael Croutch who presented a proclamation from the borough of Newville.

Lion Dan Brant said it was a grand day for the Lions of Newville. Attendees had purchased meals provided by Saylor's Market that included barbecued chicken, scalloped potatoes, macaroni and cheese, a relish tray, a fruit tray, bottled water, cake and coffee. The Newville Lions who were the primary organizers for the event were President Josh Anderson, Vice Presidents Kathy Biscuit and Christine Anderson, Secretary Nancy Hockenberry, Treasurer Pete Shultzabarger and Past President Bruce Lemmon.

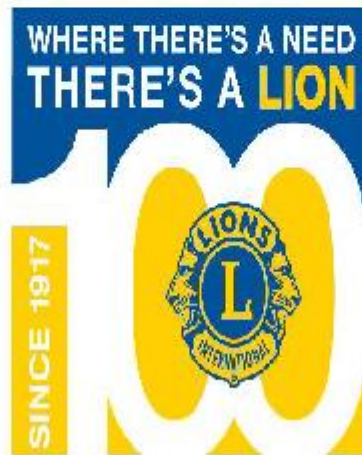
