

A Message From the 2nd Vice District Governor



Lions "We Serve."

But what does that mean? Why of course, we provide a service. But what does that mean?

Remember when we were in school, and the teacher would put two words or numbers on the board (back when they had blackboards or chalkboards) and ask us how they were alike and how they were different? For example, 4 and 6. Well they are both divisible by 2. But they are different, because if you perform that function, you get 2 for the one and 3 for the other. So, if I gave you the following list, how are they similar and how are they different: amoeba, individual, Lions Club, Lions Service?

An amoeba is a single cell, a loner. Yet, collectively, they have an impact. An individual is a multi-cell, multifaceted, complex entity. That person has the ability to accomplish much when driven by a vision or incentive. They can make a difference as one, but a bigger impact working together with others. How about Lions Clubs? Some Lions see their club as an "amoeba", single cell. They don't plug into the multifaceted benefits of Zone, District, State and International.

And what about Lions Service. Well, some Lions view service as one-dimensional. If asked, they will serve on a committee, or office, but that's where it ends.

But what about a dedicated Lion? They are a "hungry" Lion on the prowl; a multifaceted Lion looking to do service anywhere they can. They see opportunities through 3-D glasses. They look for service opportunities at all levels. They start with their home club, and "Climb the Ladder" beginning with Zone.

Some Lions view Lionism as one dimensional. For some, that means a monthly meeting and go home. Lions that have caught the vision of Melvin Jones recognize that a meeting is not service. It is a meeting. They comprehend the areas of service and pick one or more. A "multifaceted" Lion will pick from Vision, Diabetes, Environment, Hunger, Childhood Cancer, Disaster Relief, Humanitarian Efforts and Youth.

Will you be satisfied to be a one-dimensional Lion? There is a place for you. Want to be a 3-D multifaceted Lion? We can certainly use you. Talk to any District Governor or Zone Chair. They will hold the door open and walk through it with you.

Just like in school when the teacher asked for a volunteer to erase or wash the board, you weren't called on unless you raised you hand. So, raise your hand and volunteer outside your club. Thank you for the opportunity to "serve".

The DRP affords clubs the opportunity to work with community leadership, private businesses, and others to prepare for and respond to the unforeseen disasters and events. Leader Dog Puppy Raiser Robbie Teal

After you return a Future Leader Dog puppy, there are a few things you can expect to happen from Leader Dogs.

- 1. Leader Dog will send you an email update within three weeks to let you know how the dog is doing at the Canine Development Center and if they have passed their entry exam. They will also include a picture of the dog you raised.
- 2. The physical exam and hip/elbow x-rays will be done within the first two weeks by Leader Dog veterinarians.
- 3. Within the first 2-4 weeks after returning for training, the breeding manager will determine if the dog you raised will go into the breeding colony or into training. All puppies raised in the program are considered to become part of the breeding colony. If the puppy you raised is selected for the breeding program, you will be contacted by the breeding department.
- 4. Once the puppy has been assigned to an instructor, Leader Dogs will send an email update five weeks after they start the Foundation Training. This will include notes from the instructor on things that they are doing well along with things they are working on. Leader Dogs will also include a picture of your dog in harness.
- 5. Thirteen weeks after training begins, another update will be emailed to you.
- 6. Once the dog you raised has completed training and is issued to a Leader Dog client, you will receive an email notification. This will also include an invitation to meet the client with the dog you raised.
- 7. Upon completion of training with their client, you will receive a photo and letter from Leader Dog.
- 8. If the dog you raised is Career Changed, Puppy Development will be in contact with you to discuss placement options.





There comes a time when working with your dog, that you know they are ready for the next phase in their development to become a Leader Dog for the Blind. This happened to Killian and I the other Saturday when we went to our local dairy. I left the house without the treat bag that I usually have on my hip. Treats are given as a reward for correct behavior or response to a command along with the key word "yes". While Killian and I were checking out at the dairy store, and talking to the clerks about his return, in runs a little two year old boy yelling "Puppy!" I signaled Killian to watch me and do a down/stay, which he did immediately.

You see, children are Killian's weakness, he loves them. But he obeyed and watched me for instructions. The Mother caught the little boy just before he reached Killian and explained that Killian was a working dog and you are not to pet a working dog. I thanked her for explaining that to her little one and finished checking out. I was so proud how Killian handled the situation without a treat to entice him into good behavior.


As I walked out the door, I couldn't help think to myself, he's ready.

The Liaison role may only be held by a Leo or Leo-Lion who has met select criteria through their service as a leader in the Leo Club Program. From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

I hope you and your clubs are taking a critical look at your club's service activities. As I mentioned in my remarks at the August Cabinet Meeting, Lions Clubs International has a "Vision Statement." An organization's vision statement concisely summarizes how an organization views itself and hopes to be viewed by the public. LCI's vision statement is ... To be the Global Leader in Community and Humanitarian Service.

We cannot lose sight of that vision - pardon the pun. Our ability to attract new members is directly related to the services our clubs provide to our communities. When we attract new members, we are able sustain the services we are able to provide to our communities. When we grow our clubs' membership, we can provide even more service because new members mean new ideas and more leaders.

I encourage you to look at your club's current service activities with two things in mind: impact and visibility. When I speak of impact, I am thinking of how many people receive a direct or indirect benefit from our service. We all know the resources of our clubs are limited. It's that we get the "biggest bang for our buck." Are there ways to extend or modify a current service project so that more



people will benefit from your efforts? Are there more critical needs in your community your club could address that would be a better use of your club's funds? These are just a couple of questions to consider when evaluating the *impact* of your club's service projects.

When I speak of *visibility*, I am thinking about how many people in your community can see what your club is doing and appreciate the benefits your efforts bring to the community. Does your club do hands-on service in the public where people can see you in action? Does your club take advantage of both traditional and social media to let the community know what you are doing? Using Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter to showcase each and every activity your club does is a great way to keep your club's name in front of your community. Even a picture from a club meeting shows your are active and having fun. It's also worthwhile to send press releases to newspapers, radio stations and TV stations to let them know about your upcoming events. Maybe they won't do anything with it, but MAYBE THEY WILL!

Five suggestions for service projects are included in this month's newsletter. Each project relates to one of Lions Global Causes: Vision, Hunger, Environment, Diabetes, and Childhood Cancer. Perhaps these ideas will pique your interest and look like something your club could do later this Lion year. I am ready and willing to help in any way I can. 


Hanover Lions Club Recognized for Supporting Relay For Life

Dan Brant's DG Year Ends with The International Convention in Montreal

Part 2

When we last left PDG Dan, he had just left the buffet and was preparing to experience Day 2 of the Montreal Convention.

The second day of the convention, Sunday, June 26th, began with the Mid-Atlantic Breakfast that was held at the Bonaventure Hotel. After the Welcome, the Pledge to the Flag and one verse of God Bless America, our own pastor and PDG Steve Shipman offered the Invocation. International Director and Vice-Presidential Candidates were allowed to speak briefly as they arrived. From there, we went to the first plenary session at the Bell Centre. This was really the formal beginning of the Convention.

The three days of the Convention all began with the plenary sessions at the Bell Centre. We always sat on the second level with the Pennsylvania delegation. These sessions tended to be motivational. ceremonial and entertaining. For instance, on Sunday we heard an address by International President Douglas Alexander and watched a colorful flag ceremony representing all of the nations in the Association. On Monday, there was a memorial service for Lions who died during the last year and an LCIF session with a keynote speaker and an announcement that we had achieved the Campaign 100 goal. On Tuesday was the installation of the 2022-2023 International President, Brian Sheehan from Minnesota, and the installation of the 2022-2023 District Governors. On Sunday and Monday, the plenary sessions were followed by a wide range of seminars held back at the Convention Center that lasted well into the afternoon. I found these sessions difficult to gauge. For instance, on Sunday, Bob and I went to a seminar called "Increase Your Service Impact". We both believed that we would hear about successful service programs. Instead, we found LCI staff who reviewed resources you can find on the LCI website such as the Service Toolkit and the LCIF Grant Toolkit. Bob said that he could have gotten the same thing at home from his computer. He was right of course. At any rate, Bob and I left the Convention Center in the early afternoon on both Sunday and Monday to head down toward the waterfront in Montreal. We got the boat one day and we just "visited" the other day when we tried to get into the Basilica. On Tuesday after the final plenary session, the conference was over, and we had to get our things together to meet the bus to head home.

So, what do I take from my first experience at an International Convention? Unlike the conferences that I frequently attended during my lifetime for school or work, it wasn't the time that I spent in training sessions or seminars that determined the value of the trip. It was the overall experience itself. All of it - whether it was riding in a bus with Bob, the Swincinskis from Swinston Travel, the Shipmans, the Dippners, and Tom and Cindy Greg, or it was participating in the Parade of Nations, or it was "scoping out" Montreal with Bob, or it was attending the Smokey Robinson Concert and the plenaries at the Bell Centre - was part of "the experience". I am delighted that I took the leap - even if it meant bringing Covid back with me (and it did). We will have another great opportunity to attend an International Conference again next year because it is in Boston Massachusetts, USA. Mark the dates on your calendar, July 7-11, 2023. If you can possibly consider it, I provide my highest recommendation. Enjoy the rest of your summer.
