

A Message From the District Governor





A young Lt. Grant noticed a nearby church with a tall bell tower and immediately thought it would make an excellent observation post, which it did. Once arriving at the top, Grant also noticed that there was enough room for a mountain howitzer. He and his men, disassembled the gun, hand carried the heavy parts up the rickety church stairs, reassembled it and began to fire upon the very startled Mexican army, who quickly ran for cover and allowed the American army to advance. Something that had never been done in battle before. The lesson is we shouldn't do things simply because "that's the way we've always done it", we need to be open to new and possibly better ways of accomplishing the task at hand, because times, conditions, and rules change.

A Message From the 2nd Vice District Governor



Lions "We Serve."

Sometimes first impressions are correct. This time it was wrong. When I was first invited to a Lions Club meeting 45 years ago, I was so sad when I saw the banner with the two Lions heads. Was it one Lion with two heads or was it two Lions joined at the heads? Would surgery be successful or result in death(s). In the 70s I could create this logo altering a photo in the darkroom. Photoshop was not as we know it today and there was no morphing. Medical surgeries didn't exist as we know them today. But weeks later, the significance of the logo made sense the night I was inducted. The Lion head facing the left represents the past with pride and accomplishment. The Lion head facing the right represents the future with confidence and looking in all directions to render service.

As the Shippensburg Club plans for its 90th anniversary celebration this month, I think of that Lion looking to the past. Sorting through our archived materials, I found a tray of slides from our 40th anniversary. When I had prints made, the prints revealed that 1972 was the year E.G. MacPherson was District Governor. He was a member of the Shippensburg Club. As I look at the head table, Lion Jack Squires (Founder of Squires Appliances) is in the photo. Years later, Lion Jack needed a blood transfusion. That's 10 pints of blood. I knew Lions provide service to others, but this was Lions helping Lions. Since our club had enough donors giving to the blood bank, the blood cost him nothing. More recently PA Lions reached out to Kentucky Lions after the tornado. But all that is in the past. We can be proud, but that's history.

Remember the Lion looking to the right? Now we are looking to assist with the flooded areas in Kentucky. This is just one opportunity that any Lion can join in the effort. It's called **Service.**

Let's create another scenario using the Lions logo.

Suppose the Lion looking to the left represents opportunities within Lionism. Most clubs would welcome someone to volunteer to be an officer or on a committee next year. We all have talents and abilities. We all have 24 hours a day. Some clubs have openings now. Training is available. Every club needs members (new and existing) who will volunteer to help with fundraisers and service. Are you, a past president and feel that you have been "put out to pasture" and are no longer of value? Wrong. Wrong. You are now a seasoned, valuable Lion. Don't want to be District Governor? No problem. There are opportunities at the Zone and District level. Don't want to be on the District Cabinet? There are opportunities on Committees. It requires a willingness to get outside your zip code and the commitment to step forward and do more. Let your desires be known.

And what about the Lion looking to the right? There are so many opportunities to serve the public through our clubs, in our communities, and through LCIF. Some would rely on the "train coming down the tracks." Lions rely on volunteers.

Thank you for serving and the opportunity for me to "serve."

Major Catastrophe – larger scale assistance for long-term projects

The DRP affords clubs the opportunity to work with community leadership, private businguity, and others to prepare for and respond to the unforeseen disasters and events. So why not use the DRP by getting involved with an already established local program or coordinate and begin a new program based on one of the monthly focuses. 

I think this is the time that every Puppy Raiser dreads when they are taking that last drive with the puppy they raised. Killian has been an extremely good boy these last few weeks. It's as if he was saying, "I'm ready for the next adventure at Leader Dog University." Our journey together has come to an end as we walk towards the entrance. It is tradition to take a picture of your Leader Dog with the statue when you pick up the puppy and then when you return the dog. We stopped at the statue so I could take Killian's picture.





We walked into the building and into the room where we would have the "exit interview". Killian was weighed. He then met his new handlers Brie and Lori. Killian played shy at first, a first for him, but once I walked up to them and told Killian to "sit to greet," he gladly took the treats they offered. I gave them a bag of Killian's favorite treats, which they opened and started feeding him, and soon Killian was at ease with his new friends. They let Killian pick a new toy from the toy chest in the room. He could take his new toy to the kennel he would be assigned during his stay at Leader Dogs. We went over the questionnaire I had to complete before Killian's return. The questions were on his response to various encounters with other dogs, people, and situations. The interview lasted a little less than an hour and I kept hoping it wouldn't end. But the time came when Brie removed Killian's collar, handed it to me and put his new collar and tags on. She then put on his leash and said, "Killian, it's time." Carlisle September Activities


Open House

Connections were made for future coordination and cooperation on multiple projects. Thanks to all the Lions from the club and those guest from the district that made the day a suscess and beneficial.




Lions at the Harvest of the Arts Carlisle


Lions in Response


Once this is done, we will be able to put all of your upcoming event flyers on the site with a link to your pages so everyone can access all of your events and information about your amazing clubs!


Early Deadline For November Newsletter
