"Find the joy in being a Lion." Let's all be on a mission to share the Joy we find in being Lions and



October 20, the Shippensburg Lions Club observed its 90th Anniversary. The highlight of the evening would be about Service. It expanded to the other keys to making service possible. So, the evening focused on Leadership, Membership, Service, and another important aspect; Recognition.

Past International Director Lion Stephen Glass, guest speaker, addressed each of these topics. He congratulated the club for past accomplishments. He

challenged the current members to not be complacent or feel comfortable, or to think the journey is over. The service opportunity and need are still there. One source for his speech was from the book *The Milkshake Moment* (I want to get a copy).

The anniversary celebration would have been incomplete without awards and recognition. District 14-C District Governor Lion Keith Shoff presented a **Melvin Jones Fellow Award** (one of the highest awards in Lionism) to Lion Dick Weaver. He also presented a **Lion Chevron Award** to Lion Bob Creter, Lion Jerry Cramer, and Lion Ron Reed.

Lion President Lisa Kemp presented Lion 1st Vice President Bev Horn with a plaque recognizing her as **Lion of the Year**.

She also presented membership certificates to the following Lions: Lions Ron Shuey and Dick Weaver, **60 Year Plus Member Award**; Lion Ron Kerr, **50 Year Plus Member Award**; Lion Galen Burkholder, **40 Year Plus Member Award**.

The surprise ending to the awards came from Past International President Glass. He presented **International President's Certificates of Appreciation Awards** from International President Brian Sheehan to four members. This is the fourth highest award in Lionism. Recipients include 1st Vice President Bev Horn; Secretary Linda Lensie; Director, Program Chair and Environment Chair Kathy Eddinger; and President Lisa Kemp.

Before the meeting, I spent three hours setting up the Club's archive tables (6 of them). The display included photos, publications, memorabilia, club pins and attire, a Club DVD and CD. As I disassembled the display, I applied the speaker's thoughts to the Shippensburg Club. Any club in the District can make the same evaluations.

Leadership. Without leadership, any club will disband and not exist. *Without a Vision, the People Perish* (from the Bible). Leaders guide the club, mentor, and establish training. As I looked at our Club pictures from the last 90 years, many were businesspersons. The Club's first president and charter member was Dr C.L. Curry, the first dentist to drill a tooth for me.

Membership. Without active members, the club will cease to exist. It is all about a "team" contributing. The president cannot do it all alone. When I joined the Club had 100-plus members; now we have 34 members. Think of the service we could provide with that many members today.

Service. There can be no service without leaders and members. In Club year 2021-2022, the Club made the following service: People Served, **12,328**; Activities, **29**; Hours **914**; Funds Raised, **\$14,692**; Funds Donated, **\$10,026**. Without this service, the "Vision" would not be complete.

What a proud moment this anniversary was.

The DRP affords clubs the opportunity to work with community leadership, private businguity, and others to prepare for and respond to the unforeseen disasters and events. November's Readiness Focus Home Safety From Jan 1 – Oct 21, 2022, home fires killed 1,748 people*

A fire can become life-threatening in just two minutes. A residence can be engulfed in flames in five minutes.

- **Fire is FAST!** In less than 30 seconds a small flame can turn into a major fire. It only takes minutes for thick black smoke to fill a house or for it to be engulfed in flames.

The theme for the 2022-2023's contest is "Lead with Compassion." District Governor Keith Shoff and I are awaiting with great anticipation to see the outstanding posters that the children in our district have created!



Please remember that the Postmark Deadline for your club to send one winning poster to the District Governor is November 15th.

There are so many reasons for Lions Clubs to sponsor children in the Peace Poster Contest. Just a few are:

- It boosts children's self-esteem and lets them know that that their ideas matter.
- It, also, offers clubs the opportunity to promote peace while increasing their visibility in their communities.
- It builds a bond between the club and the school, youth organization, youth church group, etc. that the club is sponsoring.
- But, most importantly, it gives children –and adults-hope for the future.

The important information for you to know about the Peace Poster Contest includes the following: The Peace Poster Contest is open to children ages 11-13 as of November 15. Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit, and expression of theme.

Posters advance through several levels of judging: local, district, multiple district, and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education, and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners. One international grand prize winner will receive \$5,000 and a trip to a special awards ceremony at the International Convention. Each of the 23 merit

award winners will receive a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Please remember that your club can also sponsor visually-impaired students in the Lions International Essay Contest! Students who are visually impaired and who are of the ages 11-13 as of November 15 are eligible to participate. The theme for the Peace Poster Contest for 2023-2024 will be announced in February/ March of 2023.



Community. The Carlisle Lions have been invited to setup and show what the Lions can provide to the Community.




The day will finish with the floating pumpkin patch.

From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

I want to personally thank all for the clubs and Lions who generously donated to the eastern Kentucky Flood relief effort by donating gift cards to District 14-C. Because of an early deadline to submit this article, I cannot report the total amount donated, but I am confident our clubs came through in support of the folks in Kentucky.

I also want to use this space to clarify a few things about the donations we requested for both the western Kentucky and eastern Kentucky disasters. As many of you may have thought, we are likely to receive more requests for assistance in light of Hurricane Ian in Florida. I fear we, as district leaders, have not clearly differentiated these efforts from the requests Lion clubs and members receive from LCIF. So let me try to explain ...

First, let me clarify that LCIF (Lions Clubs International Foundation) is the charitable giving entity for The International Association of Lions Clubs (which we usually refer to as LCI, or Lions Clubs International). Club members pay dues to LCI, and a small portion of those dues are used to cover the administrative costs of our foundation (LCIF). Donations made directly to LCIF cannot be used for administrative costs. They must be used for humanitarian assistance. That is why a portion of our dues are needed for the administration of the foundation.

Some of the donations to LCIF from clubs and individuals are used for disaster relief efforts, and yes, funds went to western Kentucky earlier this year after the tornados, and more has gone to eastern Kentucky for the floods. LCIF funds have also already gone to Puerto Rico and Florida, and more will probably be going there. So your club's donation to LCIF helps support all of the foundation's disaster relief efforts.

The PA Lions also have a disaster relief program. This program is not funded by LCIF. It is in addition to LCIF. LCIF provides only cash, which can only be used for certain essential supplies, e.g. food, water, and shelter. The PA Lions program works to provide targeted supplies to specific areas affected by a natural disaster by communicating with Lions club leaders in that area. The PA Lions have an agreement with a trucking company that provides us with access to two full-sized tractor-trailers that will deliver supplies donated by clubs all across Pennsylvania to anywhere in the United States.

Upon request, the PA Lions Disaster Relief Coordinator collects information regarding needed supplies. That information is then communicated to the 17 District Governors in Pennsylvania. The District Governors, along with their Disaster Relief and Service Coordinators, work with clubs in their district to secure the supplies that have been requested. For the Kentucky floods, the timeline for when supplies need to be delivered to Harrisburg to be loaded on the trailer was too short for clubs to organize and collect supplies. Therefore, clubs were asked to donate gift cards for either Lowe's or visa so the District Governor and/or his appointee could make bulk purchases and have them delivered to the pick-up site.

In addition, the PA Lions sometimes organize a team of relief workers to go to the disaster site and do hands-on work, such as assisting with clean-up or rebuilding and repairs. Such was the case with the western Kentucky tornados. A team of 14 Lions was on-site to help unload the trailer and then go to several areas to assist with debris clean-up.

Will the PA Lions conduct another relief effort for Florida? That depends on whether or not they receive a request, but I'm guessing it's only a matter of time. Depending on your club's resources, you might or might not be able to contribute to another effort. If your club's project account cannot sustain another "hit," then perhaps you can ask members for individual donations, of perhaps there will be enough time for your club to coordinate a relief supplies drive in cooperations with a local hardware or dollar store.

Hopefully, this information answers some of your questions. If not feel free to contact me with more questions. Also, I would be happy to come to a club meeting to discuss this in more detail with your club's members.

And now for this month's service project ideas:

Here are five new suggestions for service projects. Each project relates to one of Lions Global Causes: Vision, Hunger, Environment, Diabetes, and Childhood Cancer. Perhaps these ideas will pique your interest and look like something your club could do later this Lion year. I am ready and willing to help in any way I can. Feel free to contact me by phone or email to start the conversation. Five new suggestions will appear in next month's newsletter.

PEDIATRIC CANCER	Familiarize yourself with the bone marrow transplant registry. Provide an informational brochure to give people at your club events, and encourage people to register. Source: LCI Publications - GST 1D EN
HUNGER RELIEF	Create a resource list of hunger related volunteer opportunities in your region to share with other clubs in your district. Encourage members of your club and those in other clubs to participate in these volunteer opportunities. Source: LCI Publications - GST 1B EN
VISION	Work with local employers to develop an employee vision screening program. Source: GST 1C EN
DIABETES	Organize a community support group for people diagnosed with diabetes and their families. Source: LCI Publications - GST 1A EN
ENVIRONMENT	Develop a demonstration garden or landscaping plot using native plant species to encourage restoration to the local natural habitat and water conservation. Consider partnering with your counties Ag Extension office in this effort. Source: LCI Publications - GST 1E EN



When the Arendtsville Lions Club contacted Upper Adams Intermediate School to see if there was a need for school supplies for any of their students, the answer they received was a bit of a surprise. According to Principal Sonia Buckley, the school district does a good job of providing basic instructional supplies, such as pencils, paper, crayons, colored pencils, erasers, etc. In addition, the school had already arranged for students in need to receive backpacks and clothing to start the school year form other organizations.

"I can tell you the one item that we always are running out of (or the kids are loosing) are earbuds. Teachers have kids working on individual programs on the computer, so they require them to have earbuds," wrote Mrs. Buckley.

Upper Adams School District provides each student in the Intermediate School with a laptop computer for use during the school day. The computers are an integral part of instruction, and the use of earbuds allows students to work without districting their peers. Using the guidance provided by Mrs. Buckley, the club found a source for the earbuds at a very reasonable price. With the amount of money the club had budgeted for this project, they purchased 475 sets of earbuds, which were recently delivered to the school. Each set of earbuds came in its own case, which was imprinted with the Lions Club logo.



The earbuds will be distributed to students by the teachers on an "as needed" basis throughout the school year.




