A Message From the District Governor



Thank you again for all you do to make a difference. In November we have the holiday of Thanksgiving. In my opinion maybe it would be good to look back at the origin of this holiday. I don't think it started out as a day of football games, huge sales, parades and people overeating and eventually beginning to resemble the stuffed turkey that was the main course of the holiday meal, (I could be wrong, let us check the internet for an answer) From the History Channel: Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday in the United States, and Thanksgiving 2023 occurs on Thursday, November 23. In 1621, the Plymouth colonists from England and the Native American Wampanoag people shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies.

For more than two centuries, days of thanksgiving were celebrated by individual colonies and states. It wasn't until 1863, in the midst of the <u>Civil War</u>, that President <u>Abraham Lincoln proclaimed</u> a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November. This act by President Lincoln was spearheaded by <u>Sarah Josepha Hale</u>—author of the nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb"— She had launched a campaign to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday. It only took 36 years, for the national Holiday to be established (thanks Sarah-we can learn from you).

Back to the early beginnings:

Throughout that first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy, and outbreaks of contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March, the remaining settlers moved ashore, where they received an astonishing visit from a member of the Abenaki tribe who greeted them in English. Several days later, he returned with another Native American, Squanto, a member of the Pawtuxet tribe who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain and sold into slavery before escaping to London and returning to his homeland on an exploratory expedition. Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag, a local tribe, which endured for more than 50 years and remains one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans.

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest proved successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit. Now remembered as America's "first Thanksgiving"—although the Pilgrims themselves may not have used the term at the time—the festival lasted for three days. While no record exists of the first Thanksgiving's exact menu, much of what we know about what happened at the first Thanksgiving comes from Pilgrim chronicler Edward Winslow, who wrote:

Historians have suggested that many of the dishes were likely prepared using traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. Because the Pilgrims had no oven and the Mayflower's sugar supply had dwindled by the fall of 1621, the meal did not feature pies, cakes or other desserts, which have become a hallmark of contemporary celebrations. In many American households, the Thanksgiving celebration has lost much of its original religious significance: instead, it now centers on cooking and sharing a bountiful meal with family and friends. Turkey, a Thanksgiving staple so ubiquitous it has become all but synonymous with the holiday, may or may not have been on offer when the Pilgrims hosted the inaugural feast in 1621.




Today, however, nearly 90 percent of Americans eat the bird—whether roasted, baked or deep-fried—on Thanksgiving, according to the National Turkey Federation. Other traditional foods include stuffing, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie. **Volunteering** is a common Thanksgiving Day activity, and communities often hold food drives and host free dinners for the less fortunate.

I would ask everyone to pause and take some time, to reflect on all the blessings you have and gives thanks. (I am truly thankful for Lions and the opportunity to serve, and the difference Lions make in their community and the world).

Leader Dog Puppy Raiser Robbie Teal

8 Training Dog Tips

- 1. Be Prepared before you start. Make sure you have your treat bag full of Puppy/adult food nuggets or the puppy's favorite treat. I like to use freeze dried chicken breast. It really gets the Puppy's attention.
- 2. Find reinforcers that the Puppy loves. Not all dogs are food oriented. Some dogs respond well to verbal praise or petting and scratches behind the ear or the belly.
- 3. Set up for success at each step. I like bringing Future Leader Dog Puppies in to my business to meet customers. I teach the puppy to "Sit to Greet." I also slip treats to customers to use when the puppy does well with sitting. The customers love being a part of the training for the puppy.
- 4. Train one thing at a time. Don't expect to train sit, stay, down, go to your mat, all in the same day. Work on one thing and when you feel the puppy has that down pat, move on to something new.
- 5. Relax criteria when something changes. We have a relax protocol exercise that we use to relax and calm a puppy. If you find the puppy is getting excited about something, take a few moments to work at calming them down and refocus on training. I usually put my hand on their chest over their heart area and speak in a soothing calm voice until the puppy settles down and refocuses on the training.
- 6. Keep sessions short. I do a few minutes here, a few minutes there. I also like to look for training situations whenever we are out in public. In a grocery store, work with the puppy to do a down stay as you are looking on the shelves for something. At the park near a playground, work on relaxation protocol while watching children play.
- 7. Keep your attention on the puppy.
- 8. Keep it fun for both you and the puppy.

- No matter where across the globe disasters strike, Lions are there when recovery funds are needed
- For funds to be presented to a specific area, there must be a Lions Club (or Clubs)
 located in that area.they then become the distribution center for all Foundation funds

Did you remember that Lions Clubs International Foundation has been a part of Lions history for 55 years? In a little over half a century, LCIF has awarded more than 1.1 billion U.S. dollars in grants! Just think of the millions of lives you, and other Lions and Leos, have changed through LCIF grants! I'd also ask that you think about the scale of projects you and fellow Lions have been able to undertake with LCIF grant funds. They're larger! Quite simply, LCIF grants help us tackle larger challenges by taking on larger-scale projects... projects your club can't do alone, my club can't do alone, NO club can do alone.

You've heard it before. Where there's a need, there's a Lion. There's also LCIF, which offers a wide variety of grant programs to help you serve your community's needs and the needs of communities around the world. As you'll see here, LCIF's grant programs align directly with one or more cause areas You, your Club and District are most passionate about.

There are basically 9 distinct types of Grants offered by LCIF

- ✓ Matching
- ✓ Childhood Cancer
- ✓ Diabetes
- ✓ Disaster
- ✓ Lions Quest
- ✓ Hunger
- ✓ Sightfirst
- ✓ District & Club Community Impact
- ✓ Leo Service

Each grant has specific qualifying criteria relating to things such as:

- Matching funds required
- Club, district, or multiple district level involvement
- Project specifications
- Technical review
- ❖ Lion and Leos' participation in the project

Now that we've talked about LCIF grant programs available, I'll share a few resources to help you start the grant application process. First, PLEASE help yourself by taking advantage of LCIF's Grants Toolkit webpage, @ https://www.lionsclubs.org/en/lcif-grants-toolkit, which offers comprehensive information on applying for and managing your LCIF grant. As most grant requests must receive LCIF Board of Trustees' approval, make sure you know grant application deadlines (October/February/May). For most types of LCIF grants, applications must be submitted 90 days prior to board meetings to give staff ample time to review.

Just as a reminder ... you can participate .. It's actually guite simple !!

Mark November 28th on your Calendar. it is the **International Day of Giving**. Please consider a donation to your Foundation. Checks should be made out to "**LCIF**" in whatever amount you wish to donate. On the memo line write either Empowering Service Fund **or** Disaster Relief Fund. You can personally send the check to LCIF, but better yet, let me send it in and I will see to it that you get any and all recognition for your donation.

A fire can become life-threatening in just two minutes! Do you know what to do to protect yourself, your family, and your belongings? In 2021 2,840 people died and 11,400 were injured in home fires with an estimated loss of \$8,855,900,000.00. <u>Statistics from U.S. Fire Administration</u>.



Learn About Fires:

- **Fire is FAST!** In less than 30 seconds a small flame can turn into a major fire. It only takes minutes for thick black smoke to fill a house or for it to be engulfed in flames.
- **Fire is HOT!** Heat is more threatening than flames. Room temperatures in a fire can be 100 degrees at floor level and rise to 600 degrees at eye level. Inhaling this superhot air will scorch your lungs and melt clothes to your skin.
- **Fire is DARK!** Fire starts bright, but quickly produces black smoke and complete darkness.
- **Fire is DEADLY!** Smoke and toxic gases kill more people than flames do. Fire produces poisonous gases that make you disoriented and drowsy.

Lions Post-LCICON Group Tour of Australia



PCC Dan Swincinski of Swinston Travel is offering a post-convention trip after our Melbourne International Convention. The group will head to Cairns (air and hotel transfer included) and stay there three nights for a cruise at the Great Barrier Reef, and a tour around the Kuranda village in the rainforest including the Kuranda Markets and amazing "street art." Among other things, we will travel on 100-year old wooden rail carriages through the rainforest. In the area we can view koala and other native Australian wildlife, and then we will be flying to Sydney for three nights (air fare and hotel transfer included). Various activities are planned including a full day in Sydney for independent activities.

Depending on the number of people who sign up, the cost will range between \$2864 and \$3199 per person (double occupancy). Single occupancy is \$895 additional. These prices do NOT include travel to and from Australia, although Swinston Travel can work with you to arrange airline and transfer between the United States and Australia. Some meals are included.

Australia requires an electronic visa to enter the country, which in most cases can be gotten online in a few minutes. If you have ever been convicted of a crime, you will probably not be granted a visa (interesting for a country settled largely by British prisoners). And of course a valid U.S. passport is required. Travel insurance is recommended, which is not included in the above figures. Swinston Travel will be able to secure this for you. Dan also has options for stopover packages in New Zealand, Fiji, Hawaii, etc.

PDG Steve Shipman (14-C International Convention Chair) will be more than happy to work with you, as he and Lion Linda plan enjoy this once-in-a-lifetime travel opportunity. PL4DG - What's That?

Most Lions are familiar with Leader Dogs in Rochester, Michigan, and the great work they do by pairing individuals who have vision impairments with guide dogs. Most Lions, however, are not familiar with a Lions organization that provides assistance to Pennsylvania residents who have or need a guide dog. That organization is *Pennsylvania Lions for Dog Guides, Inc.*, or PL4DG.

PL4DG is a non-profit organization whose mission is to render financial assistance only in Pennsylvania to the visually impaired for emergency veterinary care to any active, working canine trained by a recognized and approved dog guide school. Financial assistance up to \$1,000 is awarded at the discretion of the board of directors and paid directly to the veterinary facility for working canines with a career-threatening illness or accident.



PL4DG has given financial aid to many visually impaired people and their dog guides throughout the state of Pennsylvania as a result of canine career-threatening illness or accident. In addition, they have played a role in abuse and misuse of a dog guide court case, and they have been leaders in getting legislation for the rights of visually impaired people and their dog guides.

Financial support from contributors like you and your club are the organization's only source of funds. PL4DG has no paid personnel. The Lions board members are volunteers. Individual Lions, Leos and other interested parties can also support the organization by becoming members. Membership dues are \$5.00 annually or \$100 for a life membership. Members receive a membership card lapel pin and will also receive periodic news and updates.

From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

At the USA/Canada Forum in September, I had the opportunity to hear the inspiring words of our International President, Dr. Patti Hill. Her message elaborated on her theme for this year, *Changing the World.* She explained that change begins one step at time, and Lions can be the agents of that change.

Lions have the ability and opportunity to change the world one life, one relationship and one community at a time. International President Hill suggested that one way to start that change is to create a greener, cleaner environment. "Protecting and improving our environment is a great way to engage with our communities. By helping to protect and restore our nature resources, we can literally change the world. Let's act boldly, and let's act now."



District Governor Marty has embraced this challenge and set a goal to, "plan and hod District-wide service events with a focus on the environment through partnership with organizations like Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay." He invited representatives from that organization to speak at our August cabinet meeting.

Since that presentation, District 14-C Environment Chair Jodi Heffner and I have initiated discussions with Alliance staff to plan a service project for this coming April. Our discussions to date have resulted in two possibilities. One would be to conduct 3 reforestation tree-plantings (also know as riparian buffers), one in each county, on the same or recurring days; and the other is to provide support to the Alliance during its 2nd annual "Treelay," which is a 24-hour tree-planting event planned for April 5th and 6th. One of both of these projects will be explored in greater detail over the coming months, and we hope to have a definitive plan in place to share with you by the end of January.

At this stage of the planning we are seeking potential sites for tree-plantings. Ideally, these sites will be on private property, but they can also be done on public lands, such as at school, municipal parks or other township/borough owned property. The land area must be at least a half-acre. Additional details about the Alliance's tree-planting program can be found by clicking on this link: https://www.allianceforthebay.org/project/pa-riparian-forest-buffer-project/.

Individual clubs, or perhaps Zones, can go a step further and "adopt" an area that has been reforested and provide ongoing maintenance for a period of several years until the trees are well-established. Another potential club project would involve a stream clean-up, which would be a great way to partner with youth groups in your community. We look forward to sharing more detailed information about our District-wide environment project and hope every club will find a way to participate In the meantime, I encourage you to be on constant lookout for service opportunities in your community. Your club's willingness to engage in a new service project will also bring you in contact with new, potential members. Initiating a new service project is also a great way to help increase your club's "People Served" and "Service Activities Completed" numbers. Here are 5 more service project ideas for your club to consider. Each project relates to one of Lions Global Causes: Vision, Hunger, Environment, Diabetes, and Childhood Cancer. Perhaps these ideas will pique your interest and look like something your club could do later this Lion year. I am ready and willing to help in any way I can. Feel free to contact me by phone or email to start the conversation. Five new suggestions will appear in next month's newsletter.
