

A Message From the District Governor



Fellow Lions, Lioness/Lions and Leos.

Here we are in February already!! February is the third and last month of <u>meteorological winter</u> in the <u>Northern Hemisphere</u>. It contains special days such as Ice Cream for Breakfast Day, Valentine's Day, Super Bowl Sunday, and if you're considering going to Lions at the UN on the 3rd of March, NOW is the time to register. BUT here in 14-C, did you know, The Mechanicsburg Lions Club completed its **TEN THOUSANDTH** community vision screening during its recent screening of students at St. Joseph's school? The Mechanicsburg Lions Club has been providing free Vision Screenings to the community since 2017. The screening projects have included all of the district schools as well as at community events. The vision screening teams have screened 2,842 children under 6 years of age with 330

(11.6%) of them referred for follow up care. 7,370 screenings were completed for residents age 7 and older with 777 (10.5%) requiring follow up care. What an amazing story. WELL DONE Mechanicsburg Lions!!

I never realized that there are so many children who have trouble in school, and some cases, all they needed was an eye exam and glasses to make all the difference. Unfortunately, the agencies that are out there to do screenings do not have the time, resources, or capacity to help everyone in need of screening. This is why our Lions vision screening project is so very important. Let the Lions be the ones to make the difference in a child's life early on. If we can help to prevent total blindness in 1 child or 100, we are doing something great and where there is a definite need! This project could use more Clubs and members to volunteer to help out, and our age isn't a factor to providing this valuable service.

Why is it that there seems to be a correlation between the number of club members who attend zone, district, multiple district, and international events and the health of the club. The more members a club has attending these events, the healthier the club seems to be. Well, the answer just could be that these events provide opportunities to gain knowledge about our organization and exposure to what is working for other clubs. As I travel around the district and visit clubs, it becomes obvious that many of our clubs face the same challenges: how to raise more funds; how to attract younger members; how to engage in more meaningful service; how to keep our current members energized and motivated. Solutions to these and other challenges can be found by engaging with members of other clubs at events such as district cabinet meeting and conventions, state council meetings and conventions, district and state training seminars, international conventions, and the USA/Canada Forum.

A Message From the 1st Vice District Governor





A Message From the 2nd Vice District Governor

We are now in the Month of February. It is time, for not only the District, but for all Clubs to be considering a slate of officers for the 2023-2024 Club year.

The theme for this month's contribution is **CAUTION: OVERLOAD**. Let me explain; allow me begin with a couple of illustrations.

Decades ago, when we first visited Gatlinburg, we had the opportunity to take the big wheel, German-made, cable car to the top of the mountain. Apparently, it had no chance of overload. When we were loading, the guide said, "If you can look down and see your feet, you are not standing close enough." I think I remember counting about 50

people.

On the other hand, last month when I was at 2nd Vice District Governor training in Harrisburg, I took the elevator up to the 3rd floor. There's only so many things you can do as you wait the few seconds for the trip up. Looking at the wall I saw displayed **Maximum Capacity 2,200 Ibs**. You do the math and you know how many can go up at one time. It was an **OVERLOAD warning**.

In my office/studio I have 6 electrical battery UPS units. Their purpose is to provide backup power to allow items to be manually shutdown in case of loss of electricity. Their second purpose is to guard against spikes or brownouts. If I see a voltage drop off down to 114 Volts, I know I need to shut operations down. Either there is an overload or **not** enough incoming energy. To **ignore** and continue is not "healthy."

So, what does that have to do with being a Lion?

At all levels, but especially the club level, be cautious of overload. Pick your best talent and make use of it. It's easy to volunteer because the position is vacant. Or maybe, you ask someone to do a task and they don't do it or instead of mentoring, you just do it yourself. *Danger*, DANGER, **DANGER**. This is bad. Why?

Overload. Either you will *burnout* or run out of *"energy"*. The other thing bad is that you deprive someone else the opportunity to serve. Avoid overloads, burnout, and energy drains.



Time to Register for the International Convention in Boston

It's time to plan now for the International Convention in Boston from July 7 to 11. Registration is open. Join tens of thousands of Lions from around the world to be motivated and empowered for service. Oh, yes, and to have a lot of fun and make new friends.

Boston is a very walkable city, and in many ways the cradle of American liberty. The "T" as the transit system is called is easy to use to get around, and of course there are taxis and ride-share systems.

My personal recommendation is that you take Amtrak to Boston and don't even try to deal with Boston traffic, which is legendary (not in a good way). That also avoids hotel parking fees, which you will find in any city. [You may have to buy a separate ticket from Harrisburg or an intermediate station to Philadelphia, and then from Philadelphia to Boston. (I can help if you want; I just had to buy a ticket to Boston for another purpose and the Amtrak website isn't that helpful.)]

I understand that our state office is looking to reserve a bus to go up and back, and I am still hoping that PCC Dan Swincinski can work something out with tours before and after the convention. If not, we will probably still stay in the area a little longer.



Some things that Killian is working on are:

- 1. Working with confidence in new and varied environments
- 2. Building strong curb stops (more assertive halt)
- 3. Focus on straight-line travel is improving but still an area of improvement

This update lets you know how Killian is doing at this point in training. We will provide you with advance notice to save the date for a possible visit with the client "if" the puppy you raised is matched with a client and they would like to meet. There are no guarantees of a match as our instructors train more dogs than needed for each class.

Without fail, clients excitedly mention the tasty food and excellent service provided by our kitchen staff. Many add, "I was amazed at the effort they undertook to meet my dietary requirements."

"As far back as 40 years ago, we provided a special menu for our clients who were diabetic," shares Sharon Dougherty, manager of residential and food services. "Today we support a wide variety of diets to meet individual religious or health requirements." Our kitchen team accommodates a large variety of diets including diabetic, Kosher, Halal, gluten free and lactose free, often providing several in addition to a standard menu in each class.

But our kitchen staff don't stop there, they include fun activities centered around meals. There is fiesta night with mocktails (alcohol free drinks) like margaritas, and Michigan-centric products like apple cider and donuts (a Fall treat), barbecue dinners and ice cream drinks made with locally produced orange and ginger sodas.



As mentioned, the theme of the 2023-2024 Peace Poster Contest is "Dare to Dream." (I am so excited about this coming year's theme and can't wait to see what creative ideas the participants come up with to showcase this amazing theme!) The Peace Poster Contest is open to children ages 11-13 as of November 15. Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme. Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district, and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, and education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners. One international grand prize winner will receive \$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony at the International Convention. Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

Lion Clubs around the world are, also, encouraged to sponsor students in the Lions International Essay Contest. The essay contest was created to offer the opportunity to visually impaired young people to express their ideas of world peace. The theme of the 2023-2024 International Essay Contest is "Dare to Dream." Students who are visually impaired and who are ages 11-13 as of November 15 are eligible to participate. The essay contest rules and application form are available on the LCI website.

Hello, and happy February Lions! If your Lions club is like my club, things are rather quiet at this time of year. But that doesn't mean we're not doing anything. These first few months of the year are a great time to plan your club's service projects for the remainder of the year, evaluate the effectiveness and relevance of last year's projects, and consider new ideas for service projects.

Service is the core of what Lions clubs stand for. Everything your clubs does should be driven by the service your club want to deliver to your community. It is important that you remain "tuned in" to the needs of your community and determine which of those needs can most effectively be addressed with the limited human and financial resources your club has to offer. Needs change, and a service project your club has been doing for 20 years may no longer be as relevant or needed as it was when it was first started.

Talk to leaders in your community (mayor, council member, commissioners, police chief, fire company chief, etc) to get a better sense of where your club's effort could have the greatest impact. Do any of the concerns they share relate to one of LCI's five global causes (vision, hunger, childhood cancer, diabetes, environment) or LCIF"s additional three causes (disaster relief, humanitarian service, youth)? If so, explore possible ways your club, either alone or by partnering with other organizations, could address this need. LCI's *Club and Community Needs Assessment* is a great tool to use for this purpose. It can be found on the LCI website <u>Service Toolkit</u> page.



Please keep this thought in mind - The impact and

relevance of the service your club provides to your community is a key factor in your club's ability to attract new members. Prospective members want to know that your club is willing to adjust to changing needs and open to taking on new projects that important to them. The more open your club is to growing your service with new, relevant service projects, the greater the likelihood it will attract new members.

As I have done in each newsletter this year, I am again providing a new set of potential service projects related to our five global causes. Look for that listing, and consider trying a new service project this Spring.

We are now into the 7th month of the 2022 to 2023 Lions year. Donations to LCIF are low compared to last year. Last year, \$27,560.00 had been donated to LCIF by District 14-C by 01-31-22. This year's donations total \$8,361.00. That is \$19,199.00 less. Only 19 clubs at this time have been able to make donations to LCIF. That is only 39.5% of our 48 clubs.

DG Keith has set a goal of 100% of our clubs to make donations to LCIF and a total amount of \$35,000.00 to be donated to LCIF from District 14-C during this Lions year. 
